Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

The darkling days of late winter shroud the wooded downlands and valley trails in misty monochromes. The shadowy form of a silver birch, that most elegant of trees, plays host to a flock of engagingly agile little birds, tucking in to their breakfast buffet of birch seed cones. Silhouetted in the low light, I can make out the dangling forms of streaky-brown finches with forked tails and white wing bars. They are rather a Garden Birdwatch conundrum, until I spot the ruddy smudge or red thumbprint on each forehead. These are redpolls, specifically lesser redpolls, as somewhat confusingly the common redpoll is larger, quite rare and described as 'frosted'. The scientific name for lesser redpolls is *A canthis cabaret*, which may allude to their entertaining acrobatics.

In complete contrast, the bright mornings around Candlemas, strangely mild, light up waysides of breezy hazel catkins. Drifts of snowdrops now crowd the shady banks and verges. Intrepid honeybees flicker through the blooms. Fresh soil-heaps of molehills erupt across the grasslands, as male moles pause in their solitary quest for more earthworms and begin to extend their territories, tunnelling by scrape, scent and squeak towards the favoured abodes of fragrant lady moles.

Great globes of mistletoe, olive-green, reveal themselves in the winter tree canopies. With mild winters and few frosts, the march of the mistletoe proceeds apace, spreading far and wide. Hereabouts, they seem to favour lime trees as a host. Both the mature limes lakeside at Avington Park and the splendid lime avenue at Grange Park, Northington are festooned with cascades of mistletoe.

Blackcap warblers, enchanting summer singers, feed on mistletoe berries and spread the sticky seeds by wiping their beaks on the bark of trees. This seems to be a more effective means of seed dispersal than by mistle thrushes or redwings, who tend to gobble the berries whole. Blackcaps are remarkably adaptable: recent studies have shown that wintering blackcaps, tagged with lightweight geolocators, fly here from central France and Germany. They feed on hedgerow berries before topping up from garden bird feeders.



On the Farm - Ben Robinson

The stratospheric price of fertiliser price has shown no sign of falling, kept high by the presence of Russian tanks on the Ukrainian border. The combination of the locally dry winter and Mr Putin's military antics have led us to try something new on the farm, a demonstration of quite how interconnected the world now is.

Along with some neighbouring farms we have received an application of digestate from the Biogen anaerobic digester near Farleigh Wallop. This is food waste that has been allowed to break down at a high temperature to produce methane under controlled conditions. This methane is used to produce electricity for the National Grid.

The digestate product provides the equivalent of 90kg of Nitrogen per hectare, along with Phosphate, Potassium and Sulphur, reducing the need for manufactured 'bagged' fertiliser. A crop of winter wheat for example requires around 220kg/ha of Nitrogen through the growing season to reach its potential, so 90kg/ha is a significant saving with fertiliser at £650/t. On the grassland I am hoping not to need to spread any artificial fertiliser at all as later on in the growing season the nitrogen requirement for grass is provided by white clover. The spreading equipment was quite spectacular- I don't think I have ever seen an agricultural machine so large. I'm glad it wasn't me navigating the end of the 36 metre boom around our mid-field telegraph poles.

With the Net Zero agenda products such as food waste, treated sewage sludge, slurry and muck will become ever more important in agriculture. Hopefully the days of water companies discharging raw sewage into rivers will be coming to an end. Increasingly these denatured sewage products will need to be spread on farmland to nourish crops. There isn't another viable option. The key is to use these products wisely and efficiently at the correct time of year and in conditions that allow machines to travel and the crops to take up the nutrients.

I always find it frustrating when you hear sensational headlines in the press such as 'the average age of farmers is 66'. It's complete rubbish. The name of the business might be Grandad's but often the children or grandchildren are working on the farm and regularly making the management decisions. I recently advertised a full-time role on the farm as Jeremy is moving on in April after securing a job with a hunt in Shropshire. I am happy to report I received a dozen applications, mostly from people under the age of 25. There seems to be no shortage of youngsters passionate about farming in Hampshire.



Summary

Constituents sometimes say to me, "I just wish politicians in London would get on with the job", so I bring good news. The media may not report such but that, alas, is something we cannot control.

Since my last update for the Oxdrove, I have spoken in Parliament about the new ten-year Cancer Plan. As a former Cancer Minister, I know huge strides have been made in cancer care recent years – indeed in the last fifteen years, one-year survival has increased by more than 10% and for patients diagnosed in 2015, their survival rate was 72% after one year.

Now we need to go further and make a reality of the ambition to see three-quarters of cancers are diagnosed at stage one or two. We know early diagnosis is cancer's magic key so this is a must. You can see more on this at stevebrine.com/prioritynhs

Secondly, I have been doing a lot of work lately – which came together with a big Commons debate in **children's mental health** week – around local CAMHS services and, in particular, for families who have a child with special educational needs.

I spoke in the debate of the despair many of my constituents feel at ongoing issues accessing children's mental health services in Hampshire; reading out a series of personal, anonymised, stories sent to me by constituents.

While strong advances have been made by the Government – a new SEND plan is imminent and huge sums of money continue to be invested – I still regularly hear from parents angry and desperate for help that is just not there. None of the personal stories I received ahead of this debate made easy reading but they all showed a sense of despair at where to turn next. Here too, early diagnosis is often what's missing and as a result children are falling further down meaning they're helped later and, as a result, the intervention they need is significantly more acute.

Too often families are waiting for a referral from CAMHS which is not forthcoming and, worse than that, they're told not to ask how long the wait might be so they're unable to plan accordingly. Covid has been a disaster for children and young people's mental health so none of this is getting easier.

I want the new 'My Planned Care' website, launched last month to keep patients up-to-date on their wait for surgery as the NHS tackles the Covid backlog, to include information on CAMHS referrals which is the least that should happen if we want to properly realise parity of care between physical and mental health. I plan to meet with the new Integrated Care System covering Hampshire & the IOW in the coming weeks given its' new role holding services, including CAMHS, accountable across the NHS.

Finally, I have written a lot about Green Winchester and events leading to – and since – COP26 in Glasgow which I attended. Our focus now shifts to holding Ministers to their promises made and delivering our Net Zero Plan. Further to this, I will be holding a very special AskTheMinister event in Winchester on the evening of Thursday April 7 with COP President Alok Sharma MP. 
At our February meeting our speaker was Ian Margetts, the Farm Manager from nearby Malshanger Farm, Oakley.

Ian gave a really interesting, illustrated talk about the diverse crops grown on the farm where the Black Mitcham Peppermint is grown and the oil distilled. The oil is then used to make the Summerdown chocolate products. Lavender is also grown and harvested and the oil distilled for cosmetic products. The farm also produces camomile for tea and wheat, beans and barley. Straw is sold to West Country farms for their livestock. This project to grow Black Mitcham peppermint was started by Lord Colman, formerly of the mustard company and is now a family run business with younger members of the family fully engaged in this award-winning enterprise. Members enjoyed sampling the products produced by Summerdown at teatime.

The WI started in 1915 to give women a voice in the community but also to encourage them to grow vegetables during the First World War. It is now the largest women's voluntary organisation in the UK and all generations are welcomed to meet and make friends. Tips When Buying a New Build Property

Jo Francis, Senior Associate in Residential Property at Phillips, is a specialist with new build purchases, including purchases under the Help to Buy Scheme. Buying a new build has many benefits but, from the legal side, the conveyancing can be complex. The potential for something to go wrong is higher with a new build, which can be costly if not addressed. Jo fully under-

stands what is required and highlights key points to consider:

- Ensure your finances are in order developers often insist finance for the mortgage is secured before contracts are exchanged.
- Most mortgages are only valid for six months, if completion is not within this period, you need to apply for an extension from your lender or you may have to reapply for the mortgage, depending on circumstances. However, some lenders offer specific new build mortgages lasting for 9 months.
- Check the property specification details carefully before reservation. Pay attention to the landscape drawings and development plans. Visit other sites built by the developer to see if the properties meet your requirements.
- Reservation fees are paid when making an offer or a sale is agreed, ranging from £500 to £5,000 or more depending on property value and usually set for 28 days, covering the period leading to exchange of contracts. This fee is non-refundable, if you fail to exchange contracts in time or you decide to pull-out of

purchasing. Your mortgage should be agreed in principle before making a reservation

- A deposit is paid of 5% or 10% of the full purchase price, depending on whether the Help to Buy Equity Loan scheme is being used.
- Usually, mortgage lender valuations are taken at the beginning of a new build project but sometimes after construction is completed. A long period between exchange and completion could risk the property value decreasing, affecting the mortgage offer and amount your Lender agrees to lend you. You would still be contracted to purchase the property for the price agreed upon exchange.
- At completion, there will be an official handover. Ensure you are given copies of all the guarantees for the property.
- Before handover, check for defects, i.e. 'snagging', which the developer should rectify.

Cllr Jackie Porter County Corner - March 2022

Many of you ask me why a road is being dug up, or when a diversion is due to end? The County Council is encouraging all road users to connect to **one.network**. It is really useful. After

signing up, you can activate layers, and by diving in at a greater magnification, you can see the roadworks and details of it. You can also request alerts: I now have alerts for my division daily- they arrive at 4am! You can define the boundary of interest. I recommend this for your journey to work?

Three other matters for road users:

- The Highway Code has changed. You can see more at www.gov.uk
- Don't forget to check your driving licence: it may need renewing after the pandemic.
- The new proposal to introduce 20mph zones is a complete change of attitude from HCC towards 20mph speed limits. To work out how and if this proposal is to go ahead, a working party has been set up to look at the options, and review results of the Pilot schemes, including those in Winchester and Micheldever. Importantly, it includes seeking the support of the Police in its remit.

The County council has confirmed a booking scheme for their HWRC's for the foreseeable future. This was the result of a survey of users: 89% liked the scheme. I think they missed one important point- it didn't include those who don't use the tips! I have asked again for on-the-day booking. I was reassured that it is an aspiration, but at the time of writing is not in place because of a software issue. We also asked for equity for cyclists-who can now book as road users, and argued for better pedestrian access in Alresford.

The Dever Society has published a useful statement to clarify information on housing numbers in the district. They were dismayed to see the ridiculously huge figure bandied about: this is the developer's aspiration figure. Winchester needs to agree to the release of land or brownfield sites to provide space for around 2700 homes in the new Local Plan to 2038. You can see more about this on my website: search 'scare stories'

Meanwhile, the County Council continues to upgrade the Minerals and Waste Plan. I am proposing that oil and gas extraction licences are not renewed in this County. One impact of the Climate emergency is the conscious public and industrial increase in recycling, and many recycling companies are seeking cheap land with large areas of yard space for waste management activities. These sites are often



poorly situated on rural roads. The increasingly heavy lorries destroy the roads and make it dangerous for other road users. With the changing emphasis on pedestrian, horseriders and cyclists, I have argued for a long time that this is unacceptable. This is a current concern for the Worthys, Stoke Charity and Sutton Scotney.

I have been working with the officers to raise awareness of this problem in the road planings site at Three Maids Hill. The entrance has now been moved away from a narrow road to connect directly with the main trunk network, with other protections for the environment. As I write, I am hopeful that the outcome of the Ecogen application will reflect this new hierarchy too: walkers, bikes, horses, cars and lorries.

Sale of land at auction underneath the adopted roads. This can be very worrying for residents. Alerted to the sale at auction of a road in Alresford, this is a useful reminder of what road adoption actually means. The developer usually retains the land, but the County Council takes ownership of the 'top two spits' -two spades' depth, and gives full rites of passage over it. Using the County solicitors, I could reassure the residents that auction of the land beneath will not change their rights of access. This seems to be a new trend. Please contact me if you are informed that your road is 'up for auction' so we can clarify the picture.
