Church Finance or Who pays for your Church?

There is a common misunderstanding that the cost of running your local parish church is paid principally by the Church of England and that Sunday collections just add to the pot.

Parish Churches across the country, but especially in rural areas like ours are funded entirely by the generosity of the congregations, to whom we are all very grateful and whose gifts we never take for granted.

The Winchester Diocese has a budgeted expenditure for this year of £11.8 million and a budgeted income of £11.7 million. £9.1 million comes from the Common

Mission Fund (CMF) which is the money paid by parishes to a common pot. The amount each parish pays is determined by the average church attendance numbers (pew persons) and the area's average level of affluence. The rest of the income comes from investments, rental income and grants from the national church central funds.

The Diocese doesn't pay for the cost of Bishops and their housing and it doesn't pay for Winchester Cathedral. Those costs are paid by the Church Commissioners.

The biggest cost is the cost of ministry support: clergy stipends (salaries), their pensions and housing costs, cost of appointments, training expenses and clergy

support. At £8.248 million it accounts for 95% of the CMF income. The other 5% is made up of parish support (there is always someone on the end of the phone if you need help).

Everything else including support for the 100 CofE schools, safeguarding, Communications, the cost of running the diocesan office and finances and the diocesan share of national costs comes from investment and rental income, from fees for weddings and funerals.

The CMF request for our benefice is £115,155. We are part of the Alresford Deanery, and we are the most affluent deanery in the diocese, average weekly giving for the Alresford deanery is £12/week. Southampton is the least affluent deanery but has the highest level of giving per regular giver at £26.14/week.

The Alresford Deanery has the smallest population in the diocese (14,503) and has an average on 1 stipendiary clergy to 3626 of population. Southampton has the largest population (235,542) with a stipendiary cleric ratio to

population of 1:16,356. Of course, in Southampton there are many more other churches besides the CofE.

Alresford Deanery has the highest percentage of population attending church at 2.9%, more than 4 times the level of Southampton.

Besides our CMF request we must maintain and repair our churches, insure, and heat them. Every 5 years we must employ an architect to inspect the fabric of the church and to produce a report listing priorities of work to be carried out.

Who pays for your church? (Cont.)

We have the cost of maintaining our church yards, everyone who lives in the parish has a right to be buried in their church yard or burial ground (they also have the right to get married in their parish church). We have the cost of services, printing, candles, organist etc.

For the Parish of the Candovers with Bradley that includes St. Mary's Preston Candover, All Saints' Bradley and St. Peter's Brown Candover. We have partially re-roofed both All Saints' and St. Peter's in the last 8 years. The cost of this has been funded either by generous donations at the time + grants (All Saints') or from legacy investments from previous benefactors (St. Peter's). A legacy enabled us to renew the heating and lighting system and install an audio/visual system at St. Mary's. In total over £240,000 was spent making sure the churches were in good order for the future. This is in addition to the £19000 annual running costs and the £36000 we are supposed to pay the diocese in CMF.

All the churches in the valley have the same challenges. If you would like to help all our churches use a scheme called Parish Giving (parishgiving.org.uk). You can donate online as a regular giver or one off and, if you are able to gift aid your Donation, Parish Giving will claim the tax back on behalf of the parish.

We are a local charity which provides friendship, emotional and practical support to parents with at least one child under five years old. We are an independent charity affiliated to Home-Start UK, the country's leading family support charity. We help families from all backgrounds through their most challenging times by offering one to one home visiting support within the home as well as supportive groups which are nurturing and accessible. These are run by paid staff members and volunteers.

We work in a 12-mile radius of Winchester and a large proportion of Home-Start families live in the most deprived areas of the city including Stanmore and Winnall.

We receive referrals from health visitors, GP's, mental health practitioners, early years practitioners, specialist workers and therapists and some families self-refer.

Our volunteers are recruited from the local community. They come from different backgrounds and range from 24 to 84 years. All have parenting experience and are DBS checked. They are thoroughly trained, supported, and supervised to exacting Home-Start UK standards. They receive safeguarding training every year.

The charity is overseen by 2 patrons and a board of trustees drawn from the local community. The board meet 4 times a year and are responsible for the overall management of the scheme.

In order to give children the best possible start in life, Home-Start aims to:

- improve children's health, well-being and development
- reduce family isolation and increase social support networks
- encourage parents physical and emotional well-being
- affirm and develop skills in parenting
- enrich the home environment
- increase access to health, education and community services

COVID- Spring boosters

Remember, even the tiniest steps matter, and collectively, they build a stronger foundation for mental well-being. If you're feeling stressed, consider checking your stress levels and explore ways to manage stress throughout the month. \Box

The surgery will be closed on Friday 29th March and Monday 2nd April. If you need urgent medical care you can access the Out of Hours service for advice, a face to face appointment or, if it is necessary, a home visit & the number to call is 111.

e-Consults will not be able to be submitted after 6.30pm on Thursday 28th March & will not restart again until 8am on Tuesday 3rd April.

Veteran Practice

This means that, as part of the health commitments of the Armed Forces Covenant, we have a dedicated Clinician, Dr. Hannah Harring, you can read Hannah's statement here, who has specialist knowledge of military related health conditions and veteran specific health services. This is important in helping ex-forces to get the best care and treatment. If you are ex-forces, please let your GP know to help ensure you are getting the best possible care.

A veteran is someone who has served in the British Armed Forces (Regular or Reserve) for at least one day. Veterans also include any member of the Merchant Marine who has served in a war zone. This includes crew from convoys in World War 2 and more recently in the Falklands conflict and Gulf Wars.


Åbout 18,000 service people move back into civilian life every year and whilst most of these individuals have similar levels of health to the general population, around 2,000 leave on medical grounds. The top reasons for medical discharge are for issues relating to back, knees, mental health, and hearing.

Being accredited means that a practice can better identify and treat veterans, refer them, where appropriate, to dedicated NHS services (such as the Veterans' Mental Health Transition, Intervention and Liaison service (TILS), the Veterans' Mental Health Complex Treatment Service (CTS) and the Veterans Trauma Network) and capture better epidemiological data to improve future health provision. It also means that the NHS is better able to meet the health commitments of the Armed Forces Covenant, whereby the Armed Forces community, including veterans, should face no disadvantage in accessing health services and should receive priority care for military attributable conditions, subject to clinical need.



Summary There was a bright start with sunny weather and light frost on the first of the month, but dull and mild weather followed with drizzle and light rain at times, and over an inch of rain on the 8th. This theme continued but with more sun in the middle of the second week and sunny spells in the third. It was wet and windy on the 21st and 22nd then more rain on the 25th with a cold northerly fresh to strong breeze the following morning. Temperatures dipped below average for a few days from the 23rd with the coldest at 25°F occurred the following night. The average temperature was 4°F above the seasonal norm and the second mildest in over two decades. There was rain on most days and the total was over twice the normal figure for February. The winter season was mild and wet with a third more rainfall than usual.

Vox Lucis Concert, Sunday, April 28th 2024 5.30pm St John's Church, Northington

For this final concert in support of the organ restoration fund at St John's, Northington, Vox Lucis has chosen a handful of pieces from the most influential and innovative composers of the 15th and 16th centuries. We begin with Guillaume Dufay – *Urbs Beata Jerusalem*.

Settings of two Marian Antiphons, *Alma Redemptoris Mater* and *Ave Maria*, represent the work of Josquin des Prez – the most famous composer between Dufay and Palestrina. Our selection of *Miserere Nostri* and *If ye Love Me*, by Thomas Tallis illustrate the very different styles in which he was accomplished. *Sicut Cervus* must be one of Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina's best loved works so could not be left out and his setting of *Alma Redemptoris Mater* is a Vox Lucis favourite. Orlando di Lasso (Lassus) stands with William Byrd,

Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina and Tomas Luis de Victoria as leading composers of the later Renaissance. The pieces we have chosen – *Veni dilecta me*, *Justorum Animae*, *Miserere Mei* and *O Quam Gloriosum* – represent their mature polyphonic styles.

We are joined, for this concert, by Sam Brown, a renowned lutenist, who will perform pieces by another genius of Renaissance music, John Dowland. His works – written mainly for

accompanied or unaccompanied lute - are ideally suited to the beautiful setting of St John's and complement Vox Lucis' polyphonic pieces perfectly.

Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

On Valentine's Day, the blackthorn bloomed - a key event in nature's calendar, occurring quite early this year, being mild and wet. The wayside winter hedges, clipped and trimmed, were sprinkled white with blackthorn flowers, while blackthorn shrubs defy the drizzle to billow chalk-white from sombre woodland edges.

A few days later, dodging the showers, I head along to Micheldever Woods to check the pools and puddles for early frogspawn. The low winter sunshine lights up the smooth grey-green trunks of the beech trees. Flocks of chaffinches, plus a few bramblings, lift off from the leafy woodland floor as I walk up to a favourite pool – to find it blobby with fresh frogspawn.

While carrying out farmland bird surveys, both at Northington Down and along at Chilton Down, we were intrigued to find wintering woodlarks. Along with the spring songs of robins and a song thrush, a woodlark sang from a perch high in the trees at both locations. Although found mainly in the New Forest and over in the Thames Basin Heaths, woodlarks also occur on our wooded downlands and are noted for their melodious song, reflected in their scientific name Lullula arborea.

Common yews feature strongly in the winter landscape of the Candovers; being native to the chalk downs, they are widely spread in local woods and hedgerows, as well as some solitary specimens on the skyline. Some are planted to create avenues of great character as at Chilton Manor Farm or those leading from St. John's to Northington Grange. Each tree is generally either male or female. In February, the males develop a yellowish tinge as masses of their tiny flowers become laden with pollen. It is quite a sight to view clouds of pollen drifting from these trees on the slightest breeze, as if smoke from a bonfire.

While taking a lunchtime stroll, I was amused by the antics of five brown hares chasing each other at top-speed across a back field. Two large doe hares seemed to be able to easily outpace their ardent suitors.



On the Farm - Ben Robinson

Lambing is now in full swing and has mostly been going well. We man the lambing shed 24 hours a day for around 17 days- the ewe's first cycle. After the 18th day the lambing frequency drops off significantly. At the peak 35-40 ewes a day will lamb, requiring penning up and turning out after 36-48 hours inside.

Though wet, the weather hasn't been cold, and lambs have been turned out into the fields in decent enough conditions. On more inclement days we have trialled 'lamb macs', a piece of biodegradable plant-based plastic that provides protection for lambs at their most vulnerable stage. The jury is currently out on them, but it is worth testing out new ideas and products as and when they become available.

We have had around 25 fit and healthy ewes who have had strong lambs but whose milk has dropped off very quickly a few days after birth. Following blood tests on the ewe by the vet this was confirmed as Schmallenberg, a midge borne disease that has become prevalent in Western Europe over the past decade. The ewes would have been bitten back in September/October. Luckily for us this is a very mild manifestation of the disease compared to other farms. Many early lambing flocks have been much more adversely affected with substantial numbers of newborn lambs born severely deformed and having to be euthanised at birth. The Schmallenberg also explains our disappointing scanning results; 160% rather than the 180-190% that we normally hope for. The ewes that have had Schmallenberg are now immune to it for around four years. However, it is debatable that it is worth keeping on ewes without enough milk to rear a lamb for a whole year. Usually, ewes that do not rear a lamb are sold as culls as soon as they are fit.

The incessantly wet weather has made it impossible to drill any Spring crops. Frustrating as this is from an arable perspective the silver lining is that it has allowed me to leave the hoggets on the stubble turnips for much longer than is normally possible. At a time of record sheep meat prices every kilo put on a hogget carcass at this time of year is well worth it.

I am writing this while waiting for the inspector to arrive and carry out our annual inspection for the JCB forklift and its associated attachments such as muck grabs, grain buckets and bale handling equipment. Regular checks ensure the machinery will perform effectively and remains safe to use.

Ferrets wearing bandanas and pink frilly skirts, a drunken goat and snakes and lizards - just a few

of the more unusual patients treated by veterinary surgeon Gillian Taylor who described her work in an entertaining talk to members at their March meeting.

Although her parents hoped that she would become a lawyer or a teacher, the books by James Herriot inspired her and she qualified in 1984 when few women became yets.

In a 38-year career working with small animals, 18 of those with PDSA, she encountered many pets with strange tastes, notably dogs who enjoyed eating towels, dishcloths, stones and pegs and cats who favoured needles. After what was obviously an enjoyable career Gillian is now a trustee of Canine Partners, finding puppies suitable to become 'help dogs' trained to help with up to 70 tasks.

It may not have been the wettest March on record but water has been everywhere again recently courtesy of **Southern Water**.

Whether it be the ongoing national concern about combined storm overflows (where the system does exactly that in heavy downpours to prevent waste material coming up your bath/toilet), water supply problems - or the cyber-attack which saw customers personal data stolen by criminal gangs - it's been another difficult period for our water company.

Through my casework of course, I maintain extremely close contact with Southern Water but periodically I sit down with their top team to look them in the eye and put many of the issues constituents bring to me.

I met with CEO Lawrence Gosden to see how the 'Storm overflow discharge reduction plan', brought about by the Environment Act is being made real in our area. It requires water companies to make their largest infrastructure spend in water company history to increase capacity and is backed by up to £56 billion capital investment.

The Environment Agency and Ofwat have launched the largest ever criminal and civil investigations into waste-water treatment works and they've dramatically increased funding for EA inspections via the 'Plan for Water'. See my explainer stevebrine.com/factorfake-waterquality

On a connected issue, the past two Winters have seen constituents hampered by disruptions to the water supply, stemming from issues at Otterbourne and Easton Water Supply Works. I robustly criticised Southern Water at the time so am now welcoming the investment which hopes to reduce chances of a repeat. And to that, SW have announced the 'Southampton Link Main' which seeks to connect Otterbourne Water Supply Works with Andover and Testwood, ensuring water can be swiftly moved around the network in line with demand as part of what's called the 'Hampshire Grid'.

I can shout and grandstand on these issue but my job is to secure openness and honesty from providers such as Southern Water while leaving them in no doubt we need to see significant progress in all areas. I've left them with plenty of homework for the coming months and will be keeping extremely close tabs on it all.

Finally, as I know many of you will have seen, I was at the centre of a very high-profile story recently as the Health Select Committee I chair, published a long-awaited report on **assisted suicide/assisted dying**. Our 14-month inquiry aimed to produce a comprehensive report to inform MPs as/when/if we are asked to formally consider any proposals to change the law. Like all village shops, the best and only way to make sure they thrive is to spend money there. These oranges were delicious!

Train journeys have been fraught this month with a lot of cancelled trains, delays, and

broken journeys, so it was a pleasure to be at the first anniversary of the Platform I café at Shawford Station. The renovation was carried out by the Community Rail Partnership, using capital from several funders including Southwestern Railway and Winchester City Council. It's a great place to visit, even if you aren't catching the train. Marco sells ice cream too; it's a lovely spot to start a walk back to Winchester, and again, good to support an independent local business.

School Crossing Patrols provide so much more than just a safe crossing point. The SCP's watch out for children and keep an eye on the area too. They know the school environment and the families who cross there regularly and can pick up the concerns if there's a stranger on the scene, or a child is unhappy. Hampshire County Council is proposing more cuts to these patrols including at the Church Lane crossing point in Kings Worthy. I hope that HCC sees sense so the 'Lollipop Gang' will still be at school entrances in future years.

Good news: Perin's School will have a new unit for five SEND children in September, growing to 15 pupils in the next three years. But I am becoming increasingly concerned at the pressure that is mounting on parents of children with Special Needs whose needs can only be served using an Educational and Health Care Plan (EHCP). I am asked to intervene in too many cases of children who are left to learn at home, schooled online for a few hours a week, because Hampshire's Education Authority doesn't have a suitable place for them in a Hampshire school. Despite being an outstanding authority, too often, social work support just doesn't work well enough with education to get children into school, nor enough hours in the day for the social workers to work with the children frequently. HCC must challenge the schools to provide the best support they can for a good education. The price of this support is mammoth-and Hampshire seems to be sinking under the cost and availability of staff, putting lives of children at risk. If this affects your family, please contact me.

The Flood Action Group in Sutton Scotney has worked hard on their plans to protect the village I'm sure that residents are grateful for their reassurance and others are inspired to re-establish Flood Action Groups for other communities affected in this way..
