

Dear Friends

Happy Easter!

Are you a glass half full person or glass half empty person? A man was waiting at the bus stop and a friend stopped and offered him a lift in the car. "No, thank you," said the man, who was rather on the glass half empty side, "if I go with you the bus is bound to turn up! "

A church leader was once asked if he was a pessimist or an optimist. ""I am neither an optimist nor a pessimist. Jesus Christ is risen from the dead."

The answer showed that from his perspective he saw life through a very different lens that wonderfully saw God was at work through Jesus, both in his life and resurrection and also now by his Holy Spirit.

The resurrection of Jesus from the dead changes everything, a bold claim! Dr John Lennox, described on his website as "Professor of Mathematics at Oxford University (emeritus), is an internationally renowned speaker on the interface of science, philosophy, and religion. He regularly teaches at many academic institutions... and has written a series of books exploring the relationship between science and Christianity."

At the end of a televised debate between himself and Prof Richard Dawkins he spoke of his belief in the resurrection of Jesus' dead body from its stone tomb. If this is true (and I firmly believe it to be so) it does change the way we live and die since there is a miracle working God who gives life to the dead!

But people might say, "Faith is a delusion. I'd no more believe in God than I would in the Easter Bunny, Father Christmas or the Flying Spaghetti Monster".

These ideas have been made famous by people such as Prof Richard Dawkins. The only thing they are good for is mockery, said Prof Lennox.

"Statements by scientists are not always statements of science," said Prof Lennox. "Stephen Hawking said, "religion is a fairy story for people afraid of the dark". I said, "atheism is a fairy story for people afraid of the light".

"Neither of those statements proves anything at all. They're all reversible. What lies behind all these delusion claims is the Freudian idea of wish fulfilment [that we believe what we hope to be true.] This works brilliantly providing there is no god. But if there is a god, then atheism is wish fulfilment."

Christian faith is precious to believers. One of the 'books' in the bible is a letter from St Paul to a church in a city called Thessaloniki and in it explains that those who have died in faith in Christ are with him now and that all who trust Jesus will be reunited again one day. Because of this, he wrote, comfort and encourage one another with these words! We do.

May God give faith in his work through Jesus this Easter, that Jesus is alive! Blessings David



The Wonderful World of Water Voles

Have you ever walked by a chalk stream and seen a flash of fur? You may have been lucky enough to spot an elusive species – the water vole! These small mammals love the clear water and lush plant life that characterise chalk streams. While they are rather shy, staying quiet and still could reward you with another sighting; listen for rustling in the streamside undergrowth and the famous 'plop' of them diving into the water.

Water voles are known for the character of Ratty in 'The Wind in the Willows', and are often mistaken for their rodent cousin, the brown rat. Several features can help with this critter confusion: brown rats have a greyish hue, pointed muzzle, prominent ears, and hairless tail; water voles have a chestnut tint, short muzzle, small ears, and furry tail. Their way of swimming is another clue: if only the head is above water, it's probably a rat.

If you didn't get a good look, there may be other signs that water voles are present. They choose a special place for eating, so you might find plant stems nibbled at a 45-degree angle. You might also see a 'lawn' of shortened plants by the entrance to their bankside burrows. Another sign to search for is a latrine near the stream's edge; water vole droppings have a distinctive tic-tac shape, and can be green, brown, or purple in colour.

Once present throughout the UK, water voles have sadly become endangered in recent decades. Pollution and habitat loss have played a role, as has the spread of an invasive non-native species – the American mink. Originally introduced for fur farming, these voracious hunters can swiftly wipe out small mammal populations. According to one estimate, water voles have been lost from 97% of their former geographical range.

So, how can you help our furry friends? If you manage a chalk stream, leave a two-metre-wide margin of tall bankside plants, and do your habitat management outside the breeding season (spring and summer). If you walk your dog by a stream, keep them on a lead in places where water voles have been seen. In general, look out for American mink – you could even consider hosting a footprint raft or wildlife camera.

You can also monitor water vole populations in north and central Hampshire through the Watercress and Winterbournes scheme – contact winterbournes@hiwwt.org.uk to learn more. Our work is supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

I know a bank where the wild primroses grow, their pale yellow flowers a springtime delight even on a chilly March day under steel-grey skies. Well wrapped up, we are searching for signs of spring on Abbotstone Down and find the primroses tucked away on a grassy mound, the south ring of the Iron Age hill-fort. A great spotted woodpecker drums from its distant wooded retreat, despite the buzz of a woodcutter's chainsaw.

Heading through the trees towards the open chalk grassland, well knobbled with ant-hills, we meet some walkers taking a large mottled cat for an afternoon stroll. As it glares at us from the undergrowth, like a native wildcat returning to its ancestral habitat, they explain it's a Bengal cat, an engaging breed of great character.

Following the bridle path down to the old barn and back, we pass a bare field of cultivated soil. A feeding flock of winter thrushes, some two hundred or more, well camouflaged, are moving slowly over the chalk-brown tilth. The dance of the fieldfares, here with redwings and blackbirds, is a curious sight — with heads up, all facing forwards, one hops, they all hop; they pause and hop again. A buzzard flies down to join them. Looming over the others, he too searches for earthworms. Apparently the patter of their feet mimics the fall of raindrops, so luring the worms to the surface.

On another brisk afternoon, while crossing Northington Down, I pause to count the fallow deer that roam the arable fields here. As if on a parkland estate, some forty does in coats of charcoal grey are camped out mid-field. Among them are two bucks, each ghostly white and bearing splendid racks of antlers. Turning to watch a rainbow forming, I'm entranced as it lights up two roe deer grazing in the neighbouring field.

Heading down the hill to the post box, I find the Candover brook surging through the Swarraton water meadows. Two mute swans graze the banks. Scanning the splashy shallows, I spot my first blobs of frogspawn of the season.

The role of the GP Receptionist

The role of GP Receptionist has changed dramatically in recent years, they play a key part in helping patients get the right care, by the right healthcare professional at the right time.

Now more commonly known in GP surgeries as Care Navigators, Care Co-ordinators, or Patient Advisors, receptionists have a much wider role than just answering phones and making appointments.

There are currently unprecedented pressures across all health services in Hampshire. This is in common with most areas of the country and is leading to huge levels of demand for GP services.

Sometimes, seeing a GP isn't the best option for the patient. In fact, studies show that 25-40% of consultations with a GP are unnecessary. Some patients may receive more appropriate care and advice more quickly elsewhere - for example, a physiotherapist for back pain, or a nurse for a skin rash, a pharmacist for medication advice - freeing up the GPs time for those who really need it.

This is where our Receptionists (Patient Advisors) come in. They receive comprehensive training, and their role is to actively listen, to signpost people to sources of help, advocacy, and support, and to help people play an active role in managing their own health.

There is a misunderstanding that Receptionists (Patient Advisors) are being nosey when they ask for information from a patient, or that they are trying to gatekeep appointments. This isn't the case at all. By asking several specific questions of the patient they are able to make sure that they book them an appointment with the most appropriate healthcare professional, or if its more suitable, signpost them to other services in the area. They will still book an appointment with a GP if the patient feels they need it, but the patient may have to wait longer for this.

Swarraton and Northington WI

There was a good turnout at our March meeting to hear Jackie Dimmock, our speaker, who gave a very interesting and amusing talk= 'The Good, the Bad and the Downright Funny'. Jackie had served Hampshire Constabulary as

WPC 22 for almost 30 years until her retirement in 2011 and joked that a murderer would serve less time in jail for their crime.

She illustrated her talk with the beautifully quilted mats which she has crafted during her retirement.


Jackie described how situations can take members of the public from being vulnerable to being volatile and reminded us that 15 police officers have died carrying out their duty during those 30 years. A police officer needs to deal with, domestic violence situations, be a social worker and handle drug and alcohol abusers.

On the lighter side, she described the pleasure of finding a local bakery whilst on duty in the early hours of the morning and tucking into warm doughnuts, Jackie served on the Isle of Wight at Newport police station and of course the streets would be packed in the summer with tourists and their daily enquiries of 'Where is Marks and Spencer and the nearest toilet'?

She described the frustrations of appearing briefly as a witness at the Crown Court and the pleasure of the camaraderie and supportive friendships with fellow officers.

Dealing with the aftermath of explosive and poisonous gases from cannisters, which landed on the beaches, following Naval exercises in the Solent was hazardous and helping a victim of a stag party prank that went very wrong was among the stories she shared. Jackie also described the training she received

back in the 1980s, which included learning to swim and drive and amused us describing the restrictions of the uniform which WPCs wore. It was a very jolly afternoon as members asked lots of questions and thanked Jackie with warm applause. Tea was served.



Summary High pressure influenced the weather for much of the month. There was an unsettled start with a few days of dull and mild conditions, followed by fine sunny weather at the end of the first and beginning of the second week with some hard overnight frosts. The first daytime rain fell on the 15th which was the start of an unsettled period of mild, overcast weather with drizzle and light showers. The last few days were dry and brighter with below average temperatures. Overall, the temperature was above average due to mild days. Rainfall was exceptionally low for the time of year with only 0.20 inches or 8% of the long term average, the driest February here in over two decades. The winter was colder than the long term norm, with average rainfall.

On the Farm - Julian Gibbons

If you drive around the countryside, you should have already seen the first signs of spring – February sown, freshly emerged spring barley. As you read this our early March sown barley should be emerged.

As the spring progresses so we will increase seeds rates to allow for the shorter time the crop is in the ground. We also have peas to plant. These need to go in and grow so don't mind late March/ early April planting.

We are trying to get more nitrogen on the wheat slightly earlier than in recent years. This is especially true for the more backward crops. These have followed oats and spring barley so there is less residual nitrogen in the soil. We have ordered two thirds of our nitrogen for next year already. This is the earliest we have ever ordered, and delivery will be in the summer. Energy prices have fallen, and prices have fallen 25-30% from last summer prices. Next year there are new rules controlling the use of urea and after March all urea must be coated with a nitrification inhibiter to reduce losses to the atmosphere. This is always the reason we haven't used urea in the past, but with the effective closure of 50% of UK ammonium nitrate production, we have been forced down the coated urea route.

We have used our new no tillage drill. New drills are always slightly fraught when you start. Fortunately, we did couple it to the tractor in January and discovered we needed an extra hydraulic coupling, this was ordered and fitted. We also managed to get its electronics to talk to the tractor. Electronics and farm equipment used to be very problematic with different manufacturers equipment not talking to another's. This meant having loads of different displays in the cab at great expense. Now nearly all equipment uses a common isobus standard. You plug the implement into the isobus socket on the back of the tractor and the tractor immediately recognises the implement and will populate the display with all the controls and information required. You then just scroll between all the pages you wish to see depending on how much information you wish to be able to see.

We managed to get a couple of woodland edges coppiced back in early February. This should hopefully allow for fresh growth to thicken up the edge and improve the habitat. It has also removed the overhanging branches that tended to break tractor wing mirrors.

Grain prices have been steadily falling since Christmas. We did sell some in a brief price rally, but we still have some left to sell.

Council Tax 23-24: You will have received your Council tax bill for 23-24 by now. The HCC part of your bill is the major one. HCC manages children and adults' social care, disposes of the household waste that we put out every week, and manages highways, libraries, country parks, many schools and the footpath networks. For 2023/24, the County requirement from each Band D household is £1460.25. The lowest charge (band A) is £973.50, upper (H) is £2920.50. Other charges on your tax bill include the Fire, Police, City and Parish precepts which thankfully are much lower than the County proportion. If you are struggling to pay your bills, please don't wait but please seek help as soon as possible. Citizens Advice or your housing provider can help.

Several additional provisions for children with special needs are being built on the sites of mainstream schools. This is good news, especially for younger pupils. Children with SEND needs often travel long distances to school; this can be distressing and tiring. The County is building more units to improve life for parents and children, but SEND numbers are still rising, so there's more to do to satisfy everyone's needs. If your child has SEND needs, and you are concerned about which school your child will be moving to in September, please contact me by email.

The County Council holds decision days and one March decision day had several items which will be of interest to residents. One item was 'movable traffic enforcement' which allows the new wardens to act not just on parking breeches but other enforcement too. Take care: this may affect you in the Autumn when the County takes back their responsibility of Winchester's enforcement of on-street parking.

The second item of local interest was the decision to continue with Cala's plans to close a section of Andover Road to traffic (probably around 2025) which links with the Movement Strategy. I know this was not a popular decision for many, but I hope it will allow the site roads to build out now: they are in such a poor state at present. I have placed a link and comments to the paper on my website, www.jackieporter.co.uk.

This paper included the decision to make changes to the B3047/A33 (Cart and Horses) junction in conjunction with National Highways as they construct the new motorway junction (but not until they build, so likely to be 2024-27). I remain hopeful that some short-term safety improvements will be implemented soon, but so far, the Executive Councillor has not agreed to anything specific at the Cart and Horses, which is disappointing. Did you use the junction whilst the traffic lights were in place? What was your view of that potential solution? Many




