The new Bishop of Winchester, Rt Rev Philip Mounstephen

The Rt Rev Philip Mounstephen was announced as the new bishop in July 2023, and officially started in January. His service of welcome was held at Winchester Cathedral on Saturday, January 13. Bishop Philip will serve as the 98th Bishop of Winchester Diocese, which covers 255 parishes across most of Hampshire, parts of Dorset, the Isle of Wight and the Channel Islands.

Philip was educated at Southampton University and Magdalen College, Oxford, before training for ministry at Wycliffe Hall, Oxford. He served his title at St James', Gerrards Cross and St James', Fulmer, in the Diocese of Oxford, and was ordained priest in 1989.

In 1992, Philip was appointed Vicar of St James', West Streatham, in the Diocese of Southwark. Between 1998 and 2006, Philip worked for the Church Pastoral Aid Society during which time he held several roles.

From 2007, he served as Chaplain of St Michael's, Paris, in the Diocese of Gibraltar in Europe and, in 2012, he was appointed Chief Executive of the Church Mission Society.


In 2019, Philip took up his current role as Bishop of Truro. He is married to Ruth, a former strategic planner, and they have one adult daughter.

Speeding has reached epidemic proportions and calls for a paradigm shift in the way we tackle it. In rural areas where fatalities are four times more likely to happen than in urban areas, the discussion about road safety tends to focus on the number of collision casualties alone. In most areas where Speedwatch operates and where speeding is evidently a concern to the communities, the quality-of-life issue as well as feeling safe when using the roads recreationally, are equally important to the affected areas' residents. This is not an attempt at diminishing the dismay of the high number of fatal and seriously injured victims but a reminder that the problem of speeding goes well beyond quantifying its consequences with casualty statistics alone.

Inconsistently applied enforcement methodology is not likely to change socially perceived acceptable behaviour if the majority of those caught speeding either are not, or consider themselves not to be, habitual speeders. Increased compliance with the law can be achieved with means other than enforcement. Speedwatch, personalised education is a methodology that is just as efficient to help bring the problem under control.

Preston Candover & Nutley Parish Council are investigating the purchase of a set of Speedwatch equipment and are looking for volunteers to be trained to operate it.

On This Day in Wield (compiled by Jonathan Enderby)

27 January 1939

RAF Sergeant's End (this refers back to the item in January's Oxdrove about the Hurricane crash at Manor Farm, Wield.

No explanation was offered at the inquest, held at the Public Assistance Institution Alton for the RAF single seater plane crash at Wield near Alton on Tuesday week, when Sergeant Pilot L. Griffiths (23) of No3 Squadron, Northolt was killed.

The County Coroner (Mr A.L. Bowker) sat with a jury and commented that it was "another most regrettable flying accident". Frederick Leonard Newman, Lower Wield, said he saw the plane when he was working in a field. It was not very high and had the appearance of going at a very fast speed. He watched it until it was out of sight. He could still hear it, however, his impression was that the pilot was looking for a landing place. When the machine came back into his view it was still flying low, and it completed a short turn when it crashed into the field. Presently he heard an explosion. Later he found the body some distance from the machine.

Replying to the coroner, Newman said when he saw the plane first it was flying at about 500 feet, and it was only about 300 feet when it crashed.

Pilot Officer Walter Bruce Skinner said Griffiths had had 140 hours' flying experience and had done 3 hours flying in this particular machine. His flight that morning was from Northolt to Bournemouth and back, and when he left the aerodrome visibility was about 3,000 yards. He could give no reason for Griffiths circling in that particular spot. The jury returned a verdict of "Accidental Death" and sympathy was expressed with Griffith's father who was present.

21 February 1885

Board School Examination- The annual examination of the Board School Wield took place on the 19th January and was conducted by T.W. Greene Esq and Mr E Hicks, Her Majesty's Inspectors. The result, which has just been received, is highly satisfactory to all interested in the schoolwork. The percentage of passes this year is greater than that of last year, which was 91.2, this year being 96.8. There were only three failures on the whole school, two in writing and one in arithmetic. The Government report is as follows: - "The generally quality of the work continues to be highly satisfactory, arithmetic being particularly creditable. This result is the more commendable as it has been arrived at in spite of irregular attendance". On the Government Certificate of Mrs Day, the school mistress is the following sentence. "Further progress has been made, and the result is most creditable. Discipline is also good."!

28 February 1885

Presentation: On Wednesday afternoon a very pleasing incident took place in Wield Schoolroom. For some little time past Miss Cordery and the Misses Earwaker have been active in calling upon the children attending the school, and their friends, to assist in giving Mrs Day, schoolmistress of Wield, a present, for her indefatigable efforts in promoting the education of the children. These ladies met with such success, that sufficient donations were received to enable them to buy a beautiful, floral album. This was presented to Mrs Day by Miss Cordery, in the name of the children on Wednesday afternoon. Mrs Day, in accepting the gift, heartily thanked the children, Miss Cordery, and all kind friends.

Estelle Sanderson. 'Bobbie' 1927-2023

'For the first time in 109 years there won't be a Sanderson living at Abbotstone' These were the final words of the eulogy for Bobbie at her service of thanksgiving in Alresford Methodist church just three days before Christmas.

Bobbie was born in Heathrow in 1927. It was then a small market gardening community not the great hub of aviation we know today. She was an only child but grew up within a large family of aunts' uncles and cousins. Her great love of the countryside and all things rural stemmed from the holiday visits to family in the Vale of the White Horse. After the village school she won a grammar school place and cycled five miles each way because she loved school. Exams were sat in air raid shelters for this was the height of the Second World War. Bobbie then gained a place at Reading University and had a placement year in post war Strasbourg. It was quite a challenge. She enjoyed all sports but was particularly talented at tennis and hockey.

Teaching was to be her career and she was appointed to the staff at Winchester County High School. She joined the local Hyde Abbey tennis club where she met John a farmer who farmed at Abbotstone. Her first visit to the farm meant a bus ride from Winchester to Itchen Stoke and a mile and a half walk to the farm. She fell in love with that beautiful countryside and, married John, had two sons and never left her beloved Abbotstone. She loved the farm and would milk the cows and help raise the piglets even coping when they invaded the farm kitchen.

Bobbie and John were active members of Alresford Methodist church where Bobbie was a steward and preacher. Bobbie was a member of the Churches together in Alresford group and even packed a shoebox for the annual appeal just weeks before she passed away. Bobbie was also a keen member of Swarraton and Northington WI where she was President and a lively committee member. She played in the tennis matches until she was 84, set quizzes, came up with clever definitions for Call My Bluff games and worked with the sewing team to pack feminine hygiene kits for Days for Girls.

Bobbie spent her final years in a beautiful, thatched cottage in Abbotstone close to the Candover stream where she enjoyed all the things that are so special about the Candover Valley.

She was much loved and will be greatly missed.



Summary There was a cold start to December with freezing fog on the 2nd which persisted throughout the day and the following night recorded the coldest temperature at 22°F. Thereafter, a succession of Atlantic fronts brought mild, wet and windy weather. Some of the overnight temperatures were more akin to the average daytime figure, with the mildest at 51°F on the 25th. Two storms named as Elin and Gerrit brought strong winds on the 9th and 27th/28th. The year ended with another Atlantic low-pressure system bringing further wet and windy weather. The temperature in December was over 3°F above the long-term average and it was the second mildest recorded here. Rainfall for the month was almost a fifth higher than normal and it was the

Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

On a rare day of blue skies and bright sunshine, we head up the Candover valley for a brisk ramble around Home Farm, the Woodland Trust's reserve at Burkham. Setting off from the car park at Burkham Lane we follow the waymarked white trail, squelching along in welly boots as the paths are soggy from winter rains.

The tree canopies seem transformed when flooded with sunlight. Their branches are lit up to reveal splashes of pale lichens embellished with rampant clumps of damp shining mosses. Somewhere deep in the woodland, a song thrush seems to be singing in the New Year as we pass through the gateway leading to Bishop's Common. Formerly a downland pasture, a mosaic of chalk grassland and regenerating woodland is now revealed. Young oaks, huddled under their coppery cloaks of crinkled leaves, mingle within a landscape of hawthorn domes, some still glowing deep red with their huge harvest of autumn berries.

Pausing to look and listen, we hear the laughing call of a distant green woodpecker, the wistful song of a robin, and spot the tiny prints of a muntiac deer crossing the muddy path. A kestrel now lifts off, silhouetted against the sun, and begins to float on pointed wings, riding the breeze to hover head down, as it scans for voles. From the wooded skyline beyond, three buzzards and a red kite, vast wings outstretched, rise on the morning thermals, lit up as they turn into the sunshine.

Heading on, following the woodland trail that leads to Burkham Lodge, we glance up to find the three buzzards cruising low overhead, as if on morning patrol. Crossing the lane, our walk takes us to the viewpoint overlooking Lasham Hill. Sitting at the magnificent wooden table sited here, we scan the skies to see not buzzards, but a great white stork of a sailplane gliding high over Lasham Airfield.

Strolling back via Tickley Bottom, a flock of goldfinches catch the light with their amusing antics, constantly flying up and down from the woodland edge in tight formation.



On the Farm—Ben Robinson

January has been a busy and challenging month. The incessant rain flooded not only many of our grazing fields, but also my office in two inches of groundwater that bubbled up from below. This then gave way to a hard freeze. Frozen ground allowed us to get on with some much-needed hedge cutting. Usually, we'd take the opportunity of frozen ground to muck out some sheds but the early arrival of our second son meant I was otherwise engaged in Winchester hospital during the weather window. Mother and baby are doing well, even if the cattle could still do with being mucked out!

Early in January I took delivery of a new JCB rough terrain forklift- a key farm workhorse which we use on a daily basis to feed bales and bed up cattle. Our old one was 15 years old and really starting to show its age. The cost of machinery is pretty frightening these days. Every additional mod con, safety feature or added extra to help the environment is all very laudable but they add thousands to the price of the machine. This new telehandler will have to last at least 15 years to pay for itself.

The working capital requirements needed in modern agriculture are substantial. I can fully understand the appeal of the wildlife schemes some landowners are signing up to, even if they do nothing for the wider economy of UK plc. There is an element of de-risking the business, as long as you trust HM Government to pay up when promised. Historically this hasn't always happened on time, though they do seem to have improved recently.

We have recently joined the sustainable farming incentive scheme. This supports the farm to improve management of the hedgerows, permanent pasture land and arable field margins. Particularly interesting to our mixed farming system is the payment for herbal grass leys. These benefit bees and other pollinators whilst providing good quality forage for the sheep. There is anecdotal evidence that herbal leys reduce worm burdens too, especially in lambs. My lambs in the Autumn did seem to finish well on them.

I sent a lorry load of lambs to Salisbury market this morning. Storms Isha and Jocelyn have been affecting the country meaning many farmers further North have struggled to draw lambs in the storms. The bad weather reducing supply coupled with shipping issues in the Red Sea affecting the arrival of lamb from Down Under has meant the price of finished lamb has suddenly shot up. Hopefully I will be able to send a few more before a deal is brokered with the Houthi rebels!

What's on in Wield?



A good number of Wield residents attended the first meeting of the Wield History Group, took place at the village hall on Thursday 18 of January.

Below is a summary of majority of views expressed.

This defines what the WHG is going to become.

There was a lot of interest in the History of Wield and Hampshire, and a strong desire to delve into "the Wield/Hampshire mix". With the occasional meeting with a speaker on Wield /Hampshire and wider historical issues. Day trips out to interesting places was also a popular choice.

Most people thought that four per annum was good timing, or perhaps meetings during the winter months only – (October to End of March). Scope to encourage additional ad hoc meetings throughout the year for interested research groups was also suggested.

Offers of help with administration was called for and some have already expressed an interest in helping.

An annual subscription fee to cover the cost of hiring the hall and fund guest speakers and events.

It is hoped to set up a second meeting in March if there is continued support

A meeting of the Wield Social Group is planned for February when more exciting events will be planned.



For some months now, I have talked about the financial position in which HCC find themselves and the revenue cuts they must make.

Have your say on the 'Future Services' consultation which continues until the 31st March 2024.

The consultation is online or can be viewed at a library; call 0300 555 1375 for a paper copy. Responses are submitted online: www.hants.gov.uk/future-services-consultation or to Freepost HAMPSHIRE

These are just some of the topics where the county council is asking for views:-

- · Adult Social Care changes (contribution changes from 95% of income to 100%)
- Adult Social Care grant schemes (eg: withdrawal of grants to Voluntary Services, Citizens' Advice)
- Hampshire Cultural Trust grant (reduce £'s to manage and deliver culture/arts)
- Highways Winter service (reduction in priority one salting and snow clearance)
- Household Waste Recycling Centres (running on a reduced budget resulting in less hours of opening, possible closure of Alresford HWRC)
- Passenger Transport (withdrawal of all funding for community transport schemes, including supported bus routes, and concessionary travel hours. This affects all rural bus services, Cango etc)
- Rural Countryside Parking (charging for parking at countryside sites like Crab Wood)
- Street Lighting (To dim street lights further and switch off for additional 2 hours.)

Please consider these changes and respond if you can. You can complete one or all sections as you wish.

Last month I wrote about broadband and many of you replied- thank you. I have asked again what Hampshire is doing to help the 'last 5%' of you that don't yet have fast broadband. The County isn't leading on the schemes now- but you can register your interest for better broadband speeds: go to www.cityfibre.com who are the supplier for Hampshire. More details on www.iackieporter.co.uk.

If all else fails, I have heard that signing up to 'Starlink' isn't cheap but it can give speeds of up to 200Mb and reaches rural 'notspots'. Go to www.starlink.com for details.

Hampshire County Council has also opened the consultation on the Minerals and Waste plan: Partial Update, Reg 19 Proposed Submission Consultation. This runs from 9th Jan 2024 to 5th March 2024. Many constituents have contacted me in recent years about the challenge of finding an **NHS dentist**. It is by no means a problem for everyone but, if it's a problem for you, it's a real problem.

As Chair of the Health Select Committee, I am right in the middle of this vexed issue and doing my utmost to press Ministers for a comprehensive – sustainable – response.

Last Summer we published what turned out to be a landmark report setting out, based on the evidence we received, what the Government should do. That report was described by the British Dental Association as an "instruction manual to save NHS dentistry" and Ministers responded to it just before Christmas.

My committee concluded that NHS dentistry is facing a crisis of access, resulting in a worrying decline in oral health. And we challenged the new Secretary of State to set out how she intends to realise the laudable ambition that everyone who needs one should have access to an NHS dentist.

Last month I spoke in a high-profile debate in the Commons about the issue and didn't pull my punches.

On the contract dentists have with the NHS – which is critical to why so many are leaving - I recognise that the Government has taken action. Some initial changes were made to the dental contract in 2022 - and we have assurances of further fundamental reform – but this has to represent a move away from the current system known as 'Units of Dental Activity' in favour of a contract which provides financial incentives for seeing new patients and those with greater dental need. One that prioritises prevention and person-centred care.

But contract reform alone is unlikely to bring back dentists who have already left the NHS or are considering leaving. We must urgently provide compelling incentives to attract new and existing dentists to undertake NHS work.

And we must see the long-promised 'Dental recovery plan' which incudes a short-term set of actions to help those suffering real pain today and a fully funded plan that brings NHS dentistry back from the edge.

Finally, I wrote last month about now published plans for the possible **new hospital** between Winchester and Basingstoke (near junction 7) and the implications thereof for the Royal Hampshire. That consultation continues and you can find links to it plus years of my work on this issue at stevebrine.com/prioritynhs

Chalk stream poetry competition and literature festival

Hampshire's chalk streams are some of its most precious wild places. These globally rare habitats are home to iconic species like the otter, water vole, brown trout, and kingfisher. With their serene beauty and vibrant wildlife, it's no surprise that chalk streams have inspired authors like Jane Austen, Thomas Hardy, Richard Adams (*Watership Down*), and Charles Kingsley (*The Water Babies*).

This year, there are several exciting new ways to discover our chalk streams. The Watercress and Winterbournes Landscape Partnership Scheme is teaming up with Hampshire Library Service to continue a literary tradition that spans centuries. We'll be sharing our favourite river-focused books and celebrating creativity through a poetry competition and literature festival.

The poetry competition, which is free to enter, asks 7-18 year olds to write a short poem inspired by the wonderful world of chalk streams. Winners will receive National Book Tokens worth up to £75, and have their poems published in a special commemorative booklet. Entrants must live within the scheme area, which includes the Candover Valley, and submit their entry by midnight on 31st July 2024.

Both children and adults can also enjoy a watery literature festival this summer. Participants can expect to hear talks by prominent nature writers like Amy-Jane Beer and Tom Moorhouse, and to explore their own creativity with chalk stream-themed writing workshops. The events will be held this June in Andover, Whitchurch, Overton, and Alresford.
