Dear Friends

Looking at the growing pile of pallets and materials dropped off on the village bonfire for firework night I hope combustion won't be a problem after the rainy weather.

Our annual bonfires and fireworks bear out the words of the old ditty, "Gunpowder treason and plot, shall n'er be forgot" and on reflection we could rewrite that doggerel in current terms about explosives, attack and stratagem.

Dear All

I am writing as we approach the mid-point in Hampshire County Council's ten-week public consultation on proposals to transform the Local Authority's nursing and specialist care provision.

If you have not had an opportunity to provide your views yet, please do consider doing so by following this link to our dedicated web page where you will find further information and the response form.

The consultation closes on 12 November. I would also ask once again for your support in **sharing the consultation** within your local communities to encourage feedback from as many people as possible.

The proposals

To recap, a number of suggested changes have been put forward to the existing older adults service portfolio as part of a planned £173 million capital investment over the next five to six years. If pursued, this would enable us to transform and expand the future of nursing and specialist care accommodation directly provided by the Local Authority for the county's growing older population.

The proposals recommend concentrating on the delivery of specialist nursing care, complex dementia care and short-term support – to either prevent a hospital admission or support a hospital discharge. This would not only meet the needs of a growing number of older people in Hampshire in the longer term but would be care that could be provided more cost effectively by the Local Authority in-house.

Transforming in this way would involve the closure of some of the Authority's existing older care homes and a move away from the provision of long term residential care.

Next steps


No formal decisions will be taken in relation to any changes to the County Council's existing residential and nursing care homes before February 2024. Members of a Working Group established from the Health and Adult Social Care Scrutiny Committee (HASC), continue to oversee, and are actively engaged in the consultation process, advising on the approach and process.

To date a series of in-person engagement events have been held or have been organised for each of the homes potentially affected, ensuring all those directly connected have, or will have the opportunity to talk to members of our senior management team, care staff and independent advocates to discuss any individual concerns and or issues.

Our Registered Managers and their teams for the homes affected by the formal public consultation, will continue to make themselves available over the coming weeks to answer any questions, concerns and provide any additional information that residents, next of kin or their representatives may require.

We would also like to welcome Sheree Villiers who joins us as a registered Nurse Associate & joins our Practice Nurse team. Sheree will be working full time across the week & has previously worked in a similar role but within a community setting.

On the Farm - Julian Gibbons

The first Saturday of October saw us hosting the Basingstoke and District Agricultural Society annual ploughing match. We could not have asked for a more glorious day of weather. We had more ploughman entered than we had had for several years with probably nearly 70 years between the oldest and youngest ploughman. It was lovely to see lots of spectators come to see the event, which was also well supported by trade stands from our various suppliers. Their presence is an important part of funding the event. Congratulations to Peter White for winning Champion Ploughman.

In addition to the ploughing match, we had the Annual Hay, Corn, and Root show in the barn and new for this year, a produce show. Congratulations to Charlie Tibble for winning the Gin and Tonic Drizzle Cake, which was limited to men only from a set menu. Hopefully his father Jeremy has got over being beaten by his son. My Damson Gin just got a highly commended ("packs a punch"), so will have to work harder next year. We didn't have any success in the hay, corn and root show, but did better at the Alresford Show where we had 3 wins from 3 entries.

Our society's annual farm competitions are drawing to a close. Well done to Moundsmere for winning the Milling Wheat, Oilseed Rape, Beans, Oats. The Foote family won the best Dairy herd. We managed to win best Winter Barley, Peas and Game cover. Congratulations to all the team at Newhouse Farm for winning the best large farmed farm class and being overall Reserve Champions

Our rape wasn't planted until the middle of September, but has generally established well, avoiding the worst ravages of cabbage stem flea beetle; but it still must grow all through the autumn to cover the ground before winter sets in. Most of it we drilled straight into the stubble. Direct drilling without any cultivations before is new to us and we are very much still in a steep learning curve especially with the cereals. What has been hard is keeping on top of the slugs that have been relentless. A wet summer always heralds a problem year for slugs. These aren't the large ones you get in the garden, but much smaller with a voracious appetite for cereals. Fields can disappear very quickly. Our green cover crops, that we planted post-harvest to provide soil cover over winter, have been hit hard in particular. We have a series of trial plots of different seed mixtures, and these give quite a guide to which species are more reliable to establish.

At the end of September, we had our first meeting of the new Candover Cluster Group, where we learnt more about the life and importance of earthworms from a speaker from the Natural History Museum and we looked through examples we had brought, learning to identify them.

Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

On a fine autumn morning of hazy sunshine, we head up to Axford, turning right along Berrydown Lane to find the bridle-path that runs from Wellclose Gate up to Bedlam and beyond. A red admiral butterfly, wings flashing in the sunlight, greets us as we arrive. Setting off, we tread with care among the fallen conkers, pausing to examine the high polish of these gleaming horse chestnuts.

Reaching the wooded slopes of Nutley Down, we find log-piles stacked either side of the valley trail. The aroma of freshly cut timber fills the air. A wren darts around the sawn ends, popping in to hollows, exploring cobwebby clefts and crevices, foraging constantly.

The tree canopy along the woodland edge flickers with shadowy birdlife. Although largely unseen, their calls reveal all manner of tits and finches, plus a chiffchaff, a nuthatch and a tree-creeper. Robins sing their wistful autumn song, while jays shriek. I glimpse an early winter visitor, possibly a siskin, so named apparently by its watch-winding call of 'siskin, siskin'. The Merlin Bird ID app confirms our observations, especially picking up the high-pitched song of a goldcrest.

A comma butterfly rests with raggedy-orange wings outstretched, a trail marker on our upward route. He poses quite unmoved on a leafy hazel hedgebank, guardian of his parish, ready to fly up and challenge any passing butterfly.

There's an intriguing spirit of place in this secluded peaceful dell, where the sequence of sheltered deer lawns running along the winding woodland edge adds an interesting perspective, sometimes revealing the unexpected.

We find some extraordinary fungal growths bulging beneath a solitary wayside oak: three hefty specimens of a particularly bulbous cep. Although slug-scooped and chewed, the pale brown velvety cap, whitish flesh and olive yellow pores indicate that these are most probably the yellow-cracked or suede boletes.

Striding up the grassy slopes of Cowdown, we stroll through the wood overlooking Ellisfield. Sitting on a convenient oak trunk, we sip coffee and nibble shortbread. Before heading back, we discover a patch of woodland floor bobbled with earthball fungi.



Summary High pressure dominated and after rain on the first day there was some fine, sunny weather with daytime temperatures in the mid to high eighties fahrenheit for six consecutive days from the 4th. The maximum of 87°F on the 6th was the warmest September day recorded here and exceeded the highest temperatures from the two preceding summer months. Except for a few unsettled days, the generally fine weather continued through to the middle of the month. Then it became unsettled with showers or longer outbreaks of rain. The second highest 24-hour rainfall total was recorded on the 20th, with 1.89 inches and accompanied by a fresh to strong breeze. There were then sunny spells with the occasional shower and temperatures dropped to around the seasonal norm in the second half of the month. Overall, it was the warmest September since 2006 and rainfall was 141% of the long-term average.



It was a warm day when we visited the archaeology site at the Central Winchester area in October. Every excavation is unique, but like many others, I was fascinated to see the 'dark earth' layer: a phenomenon which is always seen just above Roman remains. No one knows why it was formed: it's still a mystery.

But it's not a mystery that HCC has said that without fundamental changes to national policy and increased Government



funding it will be forced to make drastic cuts to local services to avoid bankruptcy. Councils are limited by how much they can increase Council tax, and it just doesn't cover the rising costs of care as our population increases and grows older. I know this contains a lot of figures, but I think it's important that readers understand the scale of the problem. This serious situation is fully occupying everyone at HCC right now.

The County budget (excluding funding to run schools) is about £1.1billion. The expected deficit revenue budget in 2025/26 year is expected to be £132 million. Added to that, there's still £70m worth of annual savings planned for 2021 and 2023 that haven't happened yet.

The Council Cabinet agreed to consider measures to reduce their budget by a significant sum, but they can't find enough, and it still leaves at least £57million income still to find.

All cost lines have been considered for reduction or rethink, including grants to charities. I am pressing for efficiency changes rather than reduction to services to deliver better quality for residents.

HCC is one of the biggest providers of social care in the UK. About 240 new requests for help come into the County helpline every week. A new Older Persons Accommodation Strategy is proposed: a new home could be built at Cornerways in Kings Worthy. Please comment on this consultation by going to hants.gov.uk; search 'consultation'. It's online until the 12^{th of} November or call 0370 779 8102 for a phone conversation or an easy read version.

So, it was good to hear the news that a sum of just under £8m over two years had been granted recently to HCC to implement the 'Bus Improvement Plans Plus'. And there's a lot of potential for improvement! I raised poor bus performance, mainly due to the lack of drivers, especially on 'The Spring'. I have been assured that by HCC that they will take up the matter again. Your stories have given this issue a real human face. The aim of the scheme is to provide good, reliable services which are self-funding even after the county budget is so badly hit in 25/26. School

HCC took over on-street parking in October. In answer to my question at HCC Council on the 28^{th of} September, Cllr Adams-King said that introducing charges to park on Alresford's shopping streets, 'wasn't on his current radar', which is good news. Let's hope it stays that way.

Following the changeover from city to county for street parking services, the County Council is now considering all 'yellow lines' requests too. This is welcome because there are hotspots (for example in Micheldever) that need lines for better parking etiquette. You can watch all the Council questions: go to www.hants.gov.uk, search 'Your Council', then 'Calendar,' then click on 'Full Council '28th September.'

Libraries are now within Children's Services Department and the service is going well with increased library take up, especially for children. There are also 'Chat-About' sessions at 23 of the 40 libraries for adults who want to talk with someone or meet others. Everyone is welcome, and many events at the libraries are free or low cost, so, with or without children, please use your local library if you can!



This included walking to Tesco for her shopping dragging at heavy car tyre and bringing the groceries home in the tyre! She also walked the 630miles of the

The Race to the South Pole started with a flight from Cape Town to the Russian base and she described the physical and mental challenge which she faced reminding herself constantly as she repeated the phrase, 'I will survive'. Tessa had written several books about her adventures which she sells for the Nepalese schools damaged during the earthquake.

Invited back for another season, the Basingstoke Young Archaeologists' (YAC), eagerly put trowel to earth in search of evidence of a bygone age, as they worked alongside Basingstoke Archaeological and Historical Society (BAHS). This year, we were given our own trench (Trench S), and it yielded some very interesting finds.



Situated possibly just outside the walls of a proposed structure, our task was to see what evidence we could find of habitation. After what



seemed ages, we began to come down onto evidence of a domestic building, as we unearthed pottery fragments (some fitted together), Oyster shell (proof of what was being eaten) and even hob nails – from the bottom of someone's shoe! One eagle-eyed YACster, on her first dig with us, spotted some

down, drew on validations from those who had been involved and supported Richard during his time on the School Board of Governors, his role in updating the tennis club and its facilities, his contribution to the sale of land and it's consequent creation of affordable housing in the centre of Preston Candover, the Chairmanship of the Preston Candover Allotment Charity (which was the main reason for me appreciating Richard's many talents), and more recently the phenomenal effort he and the CVS Committee put into campaigning for a high quality Village Community Shop.

Just after midnight on 4 October, officers responded to a report of burglary on London Road, Old Basing.


A silver BMW was stolen from a driveway and officers deployed to the scene. Our enquiries are ongoing as officers try to locate the vehicle.
