On the same day the Junior Sunday School presented a Carol Service in the afternoon. In the evening the Youth Club took part in Praise Services at the Convalescent Home. With such talent we look to increasing development of Church Praise in the days ahead.

The Woman's Guild Dramatic Club present their Concert on the 22nd and the 23rd March. Those who have attended previous performances are already looking forward to this year's programme. Tickets will be on sale in due course.

The Youth Organisations have resumed their meetings after the Christmas break. A New Year Service of Dedication was held on 14th January.

The Intercessory Services on the first Thursday of each month (7-7.30 p.m.) are being continued, though the attendances could be greatly improved. Though the weather has not been favourable, it is hoped that the meeting will gain in numbers, and that as many as can attend will remember to keep those dates free. Prayers for victory and peace and the remembrance of our Service folk is a trust that we are all called to fulfil both individually and as a congregation.
