#### MINISTER'S LETTER

DEAR FRIENDS,

This year is proving a thrilling year for Craigsbank, and I hope that all members and friends, without exception, are on the alert to share in the opportunities and challenges which are opening up before us.

For one thing the General Assembly at its meeting this month will be considering our position for full status, which, if granted, will mean, that as a Congregation we will no longer be a Church Extension Charge under the Home Board, but entrusted with full congregational responsibilities and on the same footing as any other Quoad Sacra Church in the city and Presbytery of Edinburgh.

Then as we have rejoiced to welcome back about half of our members serving with the Forces, and as we look to the early release of many more, we are seeking to plan together for the development of our congregational activities along new lines. It is much to be hoped that what we propose calling our "Social Centre," will not only make a worthy appeal to Service folk who have been accustomed to mix together regularly in friendly fellowship, but will make its mark as a community effort in our parish. I would ask for the interest of all in an experiment which may have profound social and spiritual significance.

The staffing of our Youth Organisations is already being helped by those who are now free to offer their services, but we still require further assistance. Accommodation may in the near future be somewhat taxed, and that problem is also receiving attention. Though it may be several years before the Church itself is built, we will have to be prepared for the expansion of our existing work.

In view of all these developments, and because Christians everywhere reading the signs of the times know that they have a great chance to bear their witness, let us strive to take a more active interest in all that prospers our heritage of Chistian faith and fellowship, and determine that though we may feel heavily committed, the opportunities of the present will not be missed, for they provide us with a real venture in which all can play a part.

Our greetings are extended to those still serving abroad, and to our younger members recently enlisted. To all, not forgetting those whose ways have been darkened by affliction or sorrow, we add the word—Rejoice in hope. "The God of patience and consolation grant you to be like minded one toward another, according to Christ Jesus: that ye may with one mind and one mouth glorify God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ."
