From the Rectory

As many of you will know by now, I have been offered, and accepted, the post of *Interim Priest in Charge of St Nicolas*, *Pevensey*, In Chichester Diocese. My last Sunday in Cornwall will be 18 February, with the licensing in Sussex on 13 March.

It will be a very different kind of ministry, in that although Pevensey is technically a village, it's connected in all sorts of ways to the nearby large town of Eastbourne, which is where we will be living. And instead of having responsibility for eight churches, there are just two – and one PCC, rather than five.

Within the next three years, the parish will join with the adjoining one – which is of a very different tradition. A lot of work needs doing to prepare the ground – and is why the interim ministry post has been created (and why it is time-limited).

I'd not been looking for another job, but was approached and asked to consider it – and it felt right. We know the area well, as it's where I grew up, where all our children were born, and where I taught for 24 years.

When I was little, I remember being told that you should always leave the table feeling you could eat some more. It seemed counterintuitive – but was a point well made.

And it's true in other respects – which is why it makes sense, if possible, to move on whilst whatever it is you're doing is still enjoyable and interesting – rather than waiting until it's begun to pall.

But change invariably involves challenge, as it means leaving your personal comfort zone – which is what I will be doing, by beginning a new phase of ministry, when most clergy of my vintage have long since retired.

Because although I certainly want more time for things that have for many years got rather squeezed out, I'm not looking to hang up my cassock just yet. So the fact that this a half-time appointment makes it particularly attractive.

But I've not gone yet – and our main focus over these coming weeks is obviously going to be on Advent, followed immediately by Christmas. The story of the birth of Jesus is such a profound exploration of the many facets of our humanity, that there's something desperately sad about the way it's become seen as simply a bit of escapism – of interest primarily for children.

As a result, huge numbers of intelligent and thoughtful adults only engage with it in a cursory way, rather than looking to embrace and enter the mystery and wonder that come so naturally to the young, but which tend to get lost, as world-weariness sets in.

Most of us find the tradition and sheer familiarity of the Christmas celebrations (not excluding the gastronomic elements) immensely important. In a fast-changing world there's a need for at least some reglious and cutural anchors – which is why doing (and singing) pretty much (if not exactly) the same thing as we always do at this season, helps to root us, helps us to find something solid on which to stand.

But the crucial thing about Christmas is not that everyone understands it in the same kind of way – but that everyone is able to find *some* way of engaging with it that works for them.

The problem is that this 'something' can't be put into words of one syllable (or even two), and is only available to those who give themselves over wholeheartedly to the spirit of the season.

This is why it is (surely?) well nigh impossible to celebrate Christmas in anything other than a superficial way, without getting involved in the sort of stuff that goes on in churches. Many people try (just as I used to) – but the outcome is rarely entirely satisfying.

It's the difference between peering through the windows of a restaurant and watching the diners – or being one of those actually enjoying the food.

Given how well we're able to dine (spiritually!) at Christmas, our task is to do all we can to make the idea of going inside seem <u>positively</u> <u>irresistible</u>.

As the liturgical current carries us merrily along, I wish you all a reflective Advent, and a joy-filled Christmas!

Persecuted Christians in Turkey December 2017

Turkey is familiar to us in the Rible as Asia Minor. Here Paul. Barnahas and others in the early Church established Christian groups in many of the towns and cities. In Arts and the nastoral letters in the New Testament we read about the spread of Christianity in this area. In spite of frequent bouts of persecution Christianity became established, eventually becoming the main religion of the Roman empire under Constantine in the 4th century. With the arrival of the Islamic faith in the area, the rise and spread of the Arabian empire and the decline in the Roman empire in the 6th and 7th centuries, the Christian presence and influence shrank. This led eventually to the establishment of the Ottoman Empire in the 14th century ruling the area till it collapsed during and soon after the turmoil of World War 1. During this turmoil some 3 million Christians were killed or deported mostly from ethnic groups potably Armenian Assyrian and Greek With the establishment of the modern Turkish state, the antipathy towards Christians and non-Turkish communities has continued to this day, and the number of indigenous Christians is now only about 160,000, out of a population of some 80 million.

Under the present government, Turkey has taken a further swing towards becoming an Islaim: State in splate of Its supposed secular stance and constitution. Under cripping government restrictions, the rights of churches to own property, conduct services, open other facilities, train leaders, manage its own affairs and carry out evangelism and education are severely limited, especiably for non traditional denominations.

In spite of this, there has been a gradual increase in the number of new converts to Christianity from Islam, even though they can be viewed as traitors by hard line Muslims.

The plight of thousands of Iraqi and Syrian Christian refugees is uncertain, and many report that they are ignored and actively suffer discrimination by the Turkish authorities and much of the population.

Prayers

- Give thanks to God for the small remaining Christian groups and churches, and pray for their protection from Islamic extremism.
- Pray for the new Converts to Christianity from Islam for strength of faith and fortitude as they come under pressure from their families and friends.
- Pray the government's programme of Islamisation, particularly among the young, will be restrained by bold opposition voices.
- Pray that restrictions on Christians will be reversed, and that believers will no longer be portrayed negatively in the media and in school text books.
- Pray for all the Christian refugees from neighbouring countries that they will
 receive the help and shelter that they seek and need. Michael Davey

THE CHURCH YEAR: Thoughts for December

The month begins the Season of Advent, four Sundays leading to the Celebration of the Birth of Critics Long this period we are asked to 35xy awake' by Mark on the first week. On the second week, Mark gives us the ministry of John in the wildenses and leasus coming to be Baytiset. The third week, in the opspel, we have the first chapter of John who gives us another way of understanding the coming of Jesus. The fourth Sunday Luke writes of the angel coming to Mary and then we have Christmas Day with all its relicion and worder.

If we look at the story from a different angle it is about two people who

had to go to Bethlehem to be registered. They find themselves homeless and have to sleep in a squalid (by present day standards) stable. Mary gives birth without all the 'modern day help and a baby boy is born...

The story goes on to tell us how Herod the King was visited by three wise men. We read, Joseph took Mary and the child and fied to Egypt. They become refugees returning to settle in Nazareth after Herod had been succeeded by his son Archeleus (Matthew chapter 2).

Homelessness and refugee status is prevalent in this present time. So many people have had to flee and would love to be able to return to their own country.

Most of you know the story backwards.

When we see our Churches with the stable scene, let us remember the children that have field from their countries, the mothers who weep for their children, and the fathers who have brought their families to our country hoping to be able to start a new life.

Christmas is about new beginnings.

Christmas is about rebirth

Re-determination to make a home in our hearts for Christ to grow.

Changing our thinking. Changing our behaviour. Being reborn

So we can say 'I am no longer mine but Thine. I am no longer here to do my will but Thine. Send me out in the power of Thy Holy Spirit to live and work to Thy praise and glory'

Enjoy the celebrations but don't leave Jesus in the Church stable. Take Him home with you.
