I am an expert in the rules, the shots to play, and how to move my feet — and I often tell the players what to do and give them the benefit of my coaching skills.

How do you pray? Where do you pray? Whatever your personal preferences or situation, why not make today a day when you pray?



WHAT a beautiful hymn, the words and music make the hairs on the back of your neck stand on end.

It sits in my head as one of those pieces of music that I hum out loud!

*I, the Lord of sea and sky
I have heard my people cry
All who dwell in dark and sin
My hand will save*

What a powerful reminder of God's power! There is so much truth in the opening to this song. The Bible tells us that God is the Lord over the seas and sky: You alone are the Lord. You made the heavens, even the highest heavens, and all their starry host, the earth and all that is on it, the seas and all that is in them.

You give life to everything, and the multitudes of heaven worship you. Nehemiah 9:6

The Bible also explains that He listens to our cries: I waited patiently for the Lord; he inclined to me and heard my cry. He drew me up from

the pit of destruction, out of the miry bog, and set my feet upon a rock, making my steps secure. He put a new song in my mouth, a song of praise to our God. Psalm 40 1-3

The Bible also reminds us that God will save us from darkness and our sins!

For he has rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son He loves.

The chorus is a response to the Lord's calling us into action! It is not enough to simply hear the word of God. He wants us to act! He wants us to serve Him and each other each in our own unique way.

Step-by-step guide to appointing next bishop

WITH Bishop Robert's retirement planned for the end of September, a discernment process is already underway to find the next Bishop of Exeter.

The process is being overseen by the Diocese of Exeter's Vacancy in See Committee. See is from the Latin term for 'seat' and historically refers to the bishop's throne (centre of authority and jurisdiction) which for hundreds of years has been in Exeter.

The committee is a standing committee of the Exeter Diocesan Synod, but only becomes active when the retirement of a diocesan bishop is announced.

It is made up of around 30 people, including the diocese's General Synod representatives, the Chairs of the House of Clergy and House of Laity, the bishops of Crediton and Plymouth and elected lay and clergy representatives from across Devon. Exeter's MP Ben Bradshaw was also nominated by the Bishop's Diocesan Council to be on the committee.

The committee has two tasks — to write a Statement of Needs for the diocese (a document similar to a parish profile) and to elect six of its members to sit on the Crown Nominations Commission (CNC).

The CNC is a national Church of England body, which will be responsible for compiling a shortlist of candidates and discerning which nominee should be recommended to the King and Downing Street to be the next Bishop of Exeter.

Anne Foreman is Chair of the Vacancy in See Committee. She said: "The Statement of Needs is [an illustrated document] saying what the Diocese of Exeter is like, what the challenges it faces are and what people hope the new bishop might be able to bring to it."

Anne said she was hoping to hear from people across Devon about what qualities they would like to see in a new diocesan bishop. She explained: "The ordinal* says a bishop should know their people and be known by them, so for people in Devon to say what they think and about what they hope for a new bishop would be really good."

To that end, an online consultation survey has been launched. This is an

opportunity for anyone share their views and aspirations about the appointment of the new bishop. The responses will help inform the Statement of Needs. If you would like to add your views please go online to <https://exeter.anglican.org/who-we-are/new-bishop-4-devon> and click on the link to complete the online form. Alternatively, paper copies of the consultation form will be available in each church for you to complete and return to the church by August 31st 2023 so they can be submitted to the panel.

Anne said her message to the prospective candidates to be the new Bishop of Exeter would be: "Come and join with us and help us to continue being the sort of diocese that is inclusive, that has room for all sorts of different views and help us continue in

that way."

The Bishop of Crediton, the Rt Rev Jackie Searle, will be Acting Bishop of Exeter from October 1st 2023, as well as continuing her duties as Bishop of Crediton.

Anne Foreman added: "One thing to remember is that we are not choosing a new bishop, we are trying to discern who God is calling to do this role.

"Please pray for the Vacancy in See Committee, pray that we make the right decisions, that we listen carefully to what people are saying and that we are really careful and thoughtful about what we are doing.

"It is a big responsibility, but it is a joy as well."

Too long a night in Paris for book club readers

ON Stockland Book Club's agenda for this month was *A Long Night in Paris* (Dov Alfon), author and a former Israeli intelligence officer.

This is listed as a spy thriller and cited by Amazon reviewers as a thrilling, authentic spy thriller and winner of several prestigious book awards adjudged as equating with the espionage thrillers of Mick Herron and John Le Carré and perfect for fans of *Homeland*.

The first chapter promises such — an Israeli tech entrepreneur disappears from Charles de Gaulle airport with a blonde formidably dressed in red, plus red shoes, his body soon discovered — but is this a case of mistaken identity that leads to the long night in France's capital?

The early chapters move at speed. They are short and initially they add to the pace of the action but eventually this ploy becomes invasive of the narrative causing loss of the momentum of the plot. This all promised well and indeed there was much to be appreciated in the detail and thoroughness of the writing and the insider knowledge of the author, but all this eventually proved daunting and detracted from what promised to be a 'good read'.

The response of the group was close to unanimous — good plot but marred by too many characters, too much detail and difficult to keep with storyline. It was almost as if each chapter could be reduced to a one line-thread development of the story.

Despite it being a modern text, some of the material was seen as Bond-esque with stereotyped protagonists of a dated era and indeed some of the text was viewed as somewhat passe — it is worth a try, perhaps.

Members' recommendations included: *The Love Song of Miss Queenie Hennessy* (Rachel Joyce), *Still Glides the Stream* (Flora Thompson); *Redemption Falls* (Joseph O'Connor); *The Famished Road* (Ben Okri); *The Housekeepers Tale* (Tessa Boase) and *The Tin Man* (Sarah Winman).

EASING OF BURDENS AT ALL AGE SERVICE

YARCOMBE had a lovely full church for the all age service on Sunday, July 9th.

The topic for the service was 'Who will ease your burden?'

Mary Smith introduced the service and spoke about how everyone has to carry burdens and how we can overcome them.

How sorrow and trouble come alike to everyone.

There is no respect of persons; the rich have their share as well as the poor, the old and the young.

Some have to carry heavier burdens than others, and some of us have little conception of the hidden burdens that some, maybe our own friends, are carrying. Often the deepest and most poignant burdens are not seen.

At the end of his life, Sir Winston Churchill said: "When I look back on all these worries, I remember the story of the old man who said on his deathbed that he had had a lot of trouble in his life, most of which had never happened!"

Churchill was speaking about the burden of worries that never materialise. However, there are many different types of 'burdens' in life, and some of them are very real. Jesus said: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you... and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30).

A drama was performed based on this reading from Matthew where three journalists; from the Capernaum Chronicle, the Galilee Herald and the Nazareth News, were excitedly promoting

the stories and features of their newspapers whereas Jesus's words — taken from the Bible reading — were spoken simply and gently.

A talk was given about different burdens and what Jesus meant about carrying our burdens. Jesus is the helper. Sometimes people hold onto their burdens and try to carry them themselves, but Jesus will help, if they let him. Besides just making everyone feel less worried about their problems when they pray about them, God will often send friends to help with whatever is bothering them.

Paul said in Galatians: "We should carry each others burdens, and in this way we would fulfil the law of Christ."

There was a short time of reflection, listening to music and spending time simply being with God — no expectations, no burdens.

There are so many people to thank who helped with the service: Peter Wright in the drama and Phyllis Manning who read the Psalm.

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Prestigious ECO Church award

ST Michael and All Angels Church, Stockland, has obtained a prestigious bronze level award as part of the ECO Church scheme.

ECO Church is a scheme for churches in England and Wales to identify and award how each church is caring for God's earth in different areas of their life and work. The certificate can be seen hanging up on the left-hand column as you enter the church.

The church team is very excited to claim this award as a reward for their efforts spent in improving the ECO credentials of the church.

"The Bronze award is just the start and we are aiming for Silver next year," reported Andy Howard. "The ECO Church process shines an eco perspective light on all aspects of the church's activities. It has been very informative to the church team and as a result we will now include any eco considerations in all future decisions."



Alongside the ECO Church scheme, the Church of England has an aspiration that all churches will be net carbon neutral by 2030. The carbon footprint of St Michael and All Angels Church has been measured and the majority of carbon produced comes from the dual boiler oil-fired heating system.

The Stockland team has been working with the other churches of the Five Alive Mission and the diocese to find an affordable and acceptable carbon neutral replacement heating system when the time comes to replace our ageing oil boilers. The team is to be applauded for its efforts so far to ensure

the necessary reduction in the church's carbon emissions and also in promoting not only the church's contribution but an awareness in the village of the vigilance of those managing one of the main buildings of Stockland.

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Plastics are classified into one of seven categories, each one a different material that is either easily recycled or more difficult or impossible to recycle.

1 = PET: Polyethylene Terephthalate is widely recycled. It is mostly used for food and drink packaging purposes like drinks bottles, food bottles and jars. Collected kerbside. Also in fabrics such

as polyester (not collected kerbside).

2 = HDPE: High-Density Polyethylene which is also widely recycled and collected kerbside. It is used to make milk jugs, lids, shampoo bottles. Also used in grocery bags, buckets and playground equipment (the latter three not collected kerbside).

3 = PVC: Polyvinyl Chloride is capable of being recycled but harder to do, so check with your local authority. Used in pipes, window and door frames, wires, medical equipment, teething rings and credit cards.

4 = LDPE: Low-Density Polyethylene, also capable of being recycled, but not usually kerbside. Not by East Devon District Council. Used in plastic bags, in the rings that hold packs of cans, plastic film, bread bags.

5 = PP: Polypropylene, hard or not possible to recycle, so try to reuse or avoid it. PP is used in food containers,

car parts, disposable cups, thermal vests, yoghurt containers, hangers, even disposable nappies.

6 = PS: Polystyrene or Styrofoam, hard or not possible to recycle, so avoid it. PS is used in disposable drinks cups, takeaway trays, plastic cutlery, insulation, packing foam. Highly flammable. One of the worst types of plastic for the environment, birds, animals and fish.

7 = other: This is usually a mish-mash of lots of different plastics which are pretty tricky, if not impossible to recycle and which don't fall under the named categories. Glasses and eyewear, CDs and DVDs are included in this list.

For kerbside recycling, always check with the local council. Rule of thumb — stick to the items printed on the side of the bag or box. Remember single-use plastic is no-use plastic!

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


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
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
