
HAPPY Christmas! Yes, I do know this edition of *The Parishes' Paper* is for January, and there is another greeting being used which is 'happy new year'!

Both apply equally, as indeed the year will have turned from 2021 to 2022, and in the calendar, we are moving into January – so, happy new year!

In the church, we like to work on a seasonal basis, and so the season of Christmas extends for all 12 days (remember the carol?), before giving way seamlessly to the season of Epiphany which leads nicely into Candlemas, when we remember the presentation of the infant Jesus in the Temple.

In our household, this is the weekend we take down our decorations and cards, as does the Royal household. Hence, it is still 'happy Christmas'.

This picture always helps me to join up the dots between the seasons and the months — and



helps me to receive the story of Jesus afresh each year.

PSALM OF THE MONTH

PSALM 40 - chosen by DAVID WILSDON

EARLY in St Luke's Gospel, we learn how the widow, Anna, and the elderly Simeon, were well rewarded for their patient waiting for the Lord.

Here, in Psalm 40, the psalmist, with a new song in his mouth, shares the same experience, and attempts to live up to what is required of him.

It is not straight forward; on the one hand he feels that he is poor and needy, and — along with surrounding troubles — that his own sins are more in number than of the hairs of his head.

And yet, deep down, he knows that the wonders and designs of the Lord are more than he is able to express.

PSALM 40

1. I waited patiently for the Lord; he inclined to me and heard my cry.

2. He brought me out of the roaring pit, out of the mire and the clay; he set my feet upon a rock and made my footing sure.

3. He has put a new song in my mouth, a song of praise to our God; many shall see and fear and put their trust in the Lord.

4. Blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord, who does not turn to the

proud that follow a lie.

5. Great are the wonders you have done, O Lord. my God. How great are your designs for us! There is none that can be compared with you.

6. If I were to proclaim them and tell of them they would be more than I am able to express.

7. Sacrifice and offering you do not desire but my ears have you opened;

8. Burnt offering and sacrifice for sin you have not required; then said I: 'Lo, I come.

9. 'In the scroll of the book it is written of me that I should do your will, O my God; I delight to do it; your law is within my heart.'

10. I have declared your righteousness in the great congregation; behold, I did not restrain my lips, and that, O Lord, you know.

11. Your righteousness I have not hidden in my heart; I have spoken of your faithfulness and your salvation;

11a. I have not concealed your loving kindness and truth from the great congregation.

12. Do not withhold your compassion from me, O Lord; let your love and your faithfulness always preserve me.

13 For innumerable troubles have come about me; my sins have overtaken me so that I cannot look up; they are more in number than the hairs on my head, and my heart fails me.

14. Be pleased, O Lord, to deliver me; O Lord make haste to help me.

15. Let them be ashamed and altogether dismayed who seek after my life to destroy it; let them be driven back and put to shame who wish me evil.

16. Let those who heap insults upon me be desolate because of their shame.

17. Let all who seek you rejoice in you and be glad; Let those who love your salvation say always, 'The Lord is great.'

18. Though I am poor and needy, The Lord cares for me.

19. You are my helper and my deliverer; O my God, make no delay.

KNOWN BURIALS OF STOCKLAND

WHILST the history of the Stockland Church exterior offers an impressive account that of the interior captures the essence of those who lived, worked and were finally buried and honoured in the village – many finding their resting place inside the church. The Monmouth Rebellion, the notorious Judge Jeffries, the Battle of Sedgemoor, local dignitaries, wealthy merchants and their families are all in written into the burial citations inside the church – revealing the vibrant social and economic life of the village - past.

Local historian BRYAN DREW offers some insight into this wealth in this, his article on those who are celebrated inside the church.

UNDER the chancel lies John Kyte (Kite), buried in 1573. He was born in 1500; his will lodged at Somerset House, dated 1573, lists all his children and grandchildren and records he left considerable property. In 1548 he purchased Church Lands (Ed. VI) in and around Stockland and Dalwood, also Vicarage Tithes. John was patron of Stockland Church and his heir was his grandson, George, born 1555.

The earliest Kyte of Stockland was born circa.1400 and is mentioned in a very early Stockland Manuscript held in the British Museum. He is stated as being married to the daughter of John in whose will dated 1445 he leaves "Money to my daughter Grace, wife of John Kyte of Stockland and to my grandchild Agnes". The medieval property, dated 1500 in Stockland Village is named Kites Cottage. It is believed to have been a venue for discussions leading up to the arrival of the Duke of Monmouth and his disastrous intentions. Thomas Kite joined the Duke and after the fateful Battle at Sedgemoor had to sell all his lands in Stockland to pay for his release to Judge Jeffries in 1685. The release in Taunton was signed by the Judge himself.

There are others buried within the Stockland Church, stipulated in their wills, including William Huchens as stated in his will of 1588. The first paragraph states; "In the name of God Amen.

The 8 and 20th day of March in the year of our Lord 1588. I Willmi Huchens of Stockland, sick

in body but whole of mind and in good memory, thanks be to God,

make my last will and testament in manner and form that followeth. First, I bequeath and recommend my soul to Almighty God my creator and redeemer and my body to be buried in the parish church of Stockland". Then to the end; "Also my will is that the Queen's Arms and my Lord Markques Arms be set up over the aisle door, and my name underneath at the cost and charge of my executors, whatsoever it cost".

The will of Walter Turner, 1600, has the following statement included; "And my body to be buried in the parish church of Stockland aforesaid. Item, I give and bequeath towards the maintenance of the church, 12 pence of like money". Other wills do not specify their burials but to have a Christian burial at the discretion of their executors.

On the wall in the Broadhayes Chapel is a neat monument for the memory of Amos Callard Esq of Ford. Amos died in 1747 aged 68 years and is said to have been buried in the Stockland Church. He lived at Ford, Stockland and was a member of the New Inn.

The stone slab underneath the lectern has always intrigued me as to who is buried there.

The lettering has become almost illegible but certain words can still be deciphered. It is certainly a member or members of the Davy family who were an influential family from the 1500s onwards in the parish. From the will of John Davy, Merchant of Stockland, we can get a clearer picture as to who is interred here: "In the name of God Amen, the 4th day of January in the year of our Lord God a thousand 500, 92 (1592) and in the reign of our sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth, the five and thirtieth. I, John Davie of Stockland in the county of Dorset, merchant, do make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following:

First, I give and bequeath my soul to Almighty God my maker and redeemer. And my body to be buried in the church of Stockland aforesaid,

in the aisle there in which my father and mother were buried". In this very lengthy will John also states; "Item, whereas I stand and am possessed of and in an interest of certain tenements or cottages and divers parcels of lands, meadows and pastures with the appurtenances in 'Colompton' in the county of Devon for a term of 3,000 years by a lease bearing date the 20th day of October in the 14th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth, which term is to commence and take effect immediately after the death, forfeiture, surrender or other determinator of the estate of Alice my now wife of and in the same promised premises".

I believe this grave contains the remains of Alice Davy, buried in 1634, who was laid to rest with her husband, John Davy who had died in the late 16th century. The wording that is legible states; Here lies the body of (Alice, wife of) John Davy, (Gentle) man and (- - - -) es Combe, January (1634).

Just before the chancel step, a slab in the floor informs us that: 'Here lieth the body of HONER the wife of JOHN TROTT and the daughter of MR JOHN DAVY of this Parish who departed this life on the 28th December 1776 aged 15 years and 10 months'.

Honor Trott nee Davy was indeed the daughter of a subsequent John Davy and his wife, Joan, and married John Trott at Stockland on September 6th 1753. A son, James, was baptised in 1756. Honor was born in 1727 and although the inscription appears to read her age at 15 years 10 months, it is actually 43 years 10 months, which is correct with the Burial Register.

Its rather doleful poetic message goes on to warn that; 'Under this stone in sweet repose, My body lies in dust, My friend most dear pray prepare, For follow me you must'.

The above information is taken from old wills and documents of which photocopies are in my possession.

I HAVE been asked by Mark and Carol to say a few words about Ron's love and commitment to this village.

So, what can I say about my mate Ron?

His love, commitment and involvement with all aspects of village life was plain to see and very soon he became a stalwart of the community.

He was always keen to volunteer and offer assistance wherever he could and therefore became an important part of many groups and organisations.

Pat and he were both keen gardeners so he soon became involved with the KVPA, now the gardening club, as a committee member and later chairman.

He ran many of the shows organising, physically helping and entering different classes. I'll long remember clearing up the show ground with him late in the evening after the event.

Ron and Pat were very generous always offering villagers plants that they grew in their garden. Sydie Bones still has some morning glory in her borders which he supplied many years ago. He also refurbished and sold many garden tools at the plant sale and many of us were persuaded to buy items which we really didn't need.

They also opened their garden on many occasions for the village open gardens. At all events his wife, Pat, and Carol provided

refreshments and items for sale.

Early in his village life, Ron was a member, with Gerry and Pearl Hurford, in the Cotley Hunt skittles team which played home matches at the New Inn.

Later, he was a popular long-term member, secretary and treasurer of the short mat bowling club. He was good at both, but because of his failing health as he got older he sometimes got frustrated that he was not as good as he used to be.

Because of his military service at the end of the Second World War he was a loyal member of the British Legion and enjoyed all the events.

In 1975, Ron was presented with a Certificate of Merit by the Addiscombe and Shirley Park branch before he came to Kilmington. When he and Pat moved to the village in 1997, he joined the Kilmington branch serving on the committee for many years eventually as secretary and vice-chairman before retiring after 54 years of legion service.

I have particularly warm memories of our table at the Remembrance Day meal at Hazelbury Mill where, every year, he fought unsuccessfully with Bill Kerslake, John Playford and me to buy the wine.

As a long-standing, and the only

male, committee member for Kilmington Village Hall, he was very involved in organising things such as seating before events and doing maintenance using his expertise from his life in the building industry. He even cleaned the gutters and drains when he was well into his 80s.

He was a loved and loyal member of our church and served on the PCC fabric committee for many years doing carpentry, woodworm treatment, painting and changing locks in the church as well as offering practical advice on projects.

He always said that he regretted coming to faith late in life and wished he had been involved in the church from a younger age. He did, however, attend many services and was a loyal and loved member of our Bible Study Group, hardly ever missing a meeting which he greatly enjoyed and found very instructive.

So, there you go, Ron was a loved member of our village who will be sadly missed. Personally, I believe I was privileged and blessed to be considered one of his many friends. Well he is now free from pain and grief in a better place and I am sure if the Almighty needs any help on the fabric of heaven, Ron will be the first to volunteer.


