THE last few months have seen each of the parishes which make up the Five Alive Mission Community holding their annual parochial church meeting.

These meetings are open to all parishioners as a way of us being open, sharing in the vision and mission of the church, holding one another accountable for the actions we take, and the money we spend which is donated to us for the work of the church in the community.

Each church has a Parochial Church Council (PCC) which operates under the Charities Commission, and each PCC member is a trustee.

The annual meetings allow us to thank all our donors — all of you who give of your time, energy, skills, expertise, money, voices, equipment and so on.

At the recent meeting in Kilmington, we started to list the groups and the individuals who volunteer and are involved in the life of the church in many different capacities. When we got to 16 different groups we realised just what a generous bunch of people you all are, and this is repeated across all five of the communities we serve.

all of you — the readers of *The Parishes' Paper* — which is in itself pulled together by a great team of volunteers who work every month to gather stories, photos and other information to share with over 750 households.

PSALM OF THE MONTH

PSALMS 13 & 14 — chosen by DAVID WILSDON

THERE is none that does good; no, not one - but I put my trust in your steadfast love.

These two psalms have a lot in common with quite a number of others in the Hebrew psalter, even if they are unlikely to remind present day readers of any Christian hymns. However, in the psychological field, they may not seem unfamiliar to us, as outbursts of depression, tempered with some wishful thinking for the Lord to restore the fortunes of his people.

PSALM 13

1. How long will you forget me, O Lord; for ever? How long will you hide your face from me?

2. How long shall I have anguish in my soul and grief in my heart, day by day? How long shall my enemies triumph over

me?

3. Look upon me and answer, O Lord my God; lighten my eyes lest I sleep in death;

4. Lest my enemy say, 'I have prevailed against him,' and my foes rejoice that I have fallen.

5. But I put my trust in your steadfast love; my heart will rejoice I your salvation.

6. I will sing to the Lord, for he has dealt so bountifully with me.

PSALM 14

1. The fool has said in his heart, 'There is no God.'

Corrupt are they, and abominable in their wickedness; there is no one that does good.

2. The Lord has looked down from heaven upon the children of

earth, to see if there is anyone who is wise and seeks after God.

3. But every one has turned back; all alike have become corrupt; there is none that does good; no, not one.

4. Have they no knowledge, those evil doers, who eat up my people as if they ate bread and do not call upon the Lord?

5. There shall they be in great fear; for God is in the company of the righteous.

6. Though they would confound the counsel of the poor, yet the Lord shall be their refuge.

7. O that Israel's salvation would come out of Zion! When the Lord restores the fortunes of his people, then will Jacob rejoice and Israel be glad.

Five Alive parishes celebrate

STOCKLAND

THERE is a long and unbroken tradition in the UK of celebrating royal jubilees, weddings and coronations with the lighting of beacons. The ceremony dates back hundreds of years when beacon chains were used as communication tools and warnings of impending danger.

Today, they symbolise togetherness at key moments of national significance.

Thus, on June 2nd, the nation celebrated an achievement no other British monarch has managed, the Queen's Platinum Jubilee with over 3,200 beacons being lit simultaneously throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man, the UK overseas and all the capital cities of the Commonwealth territories in recognition of her long and selfless service. HM The Queen began the ceremony by touching a globe representing the Commonwealth nations, symbolically sending a chain of lights from Windsor Castle to Buckingham Palace. The parish responded with the Stockland beacon, pictured on the front page, lit spot on the 9.45pm cited time joining the 3,000-plus — all at once!

Over 100 made the route up to Beacon Hill in Heathstock to watch the Beacon bonfire being lit. The climb was worth it, even before with the revellers being treated to absolutely stunning 360-degree panoramic views, along with a beautiful sunset. There was some debate about which of the other local beacons could be seen from the Beacon Hill vantage point but bonfire smoke was spotted from Dalwood friends on Danes Hill, followed shortly by a very impressive fireworks display from neighbours in Membury.

A big 'thank you' to the Patch family for organising the event and welcoming the community onto their farmland.

ON a cold Monday evening in May, Dalwood Community Shop shareholders turned out to attend their annual general meeting. The meeting heard about the work of the shop over the last year and the overwhelming question we wanted to ask is: "Could you buy one more thing when you shop?"

The committee reported that during the Covid restrictions the shop flourished as residents could still buy goods in short supply in the big supermarkets and people didn't want to use supermarkets. The brave and dedicated team of volunteers manned the shop as usual and provided a vital service to the community. However, when the Covid restrictions lifted and with the change of post office opening hours, fewer people are using the shop whilst at the same time the running costs are increasing. Everyone is all too aware of the rising cost of electricity and fuel in general. This combination of events resulted in the shop making a loss in the year ending March 31st 2022.

Could you buy one more thing?

This must be a cause for concern for the residents of Dalwood.

The committee emphasised the benefits that a healthy local shop provides to the community. As well as stocking essentials and those little extra treats, the shop acts as a focal point for the wider community. People who are lost and looking for places like Burrow Farm Gardens can collect printed directions, walkers who forgot to bring a drink can buy water. The shop runs a lottery paying out over £1200 last year in prize money as well as raising funds for Dalwood charities, it is also the collection point for charities including the Ukrainian appeal. You can get your shopping delivered to your door and much

more. Not forgetting, of course, the Post Office which opens every Friday helping those who might struggle with internet banking, prepaid online postage or going to Honiton sorting office to collect a parcel.

The committee ended the meeting by reminding everyone of that well known fact that is we don't use local facilities we risk the fear of losing them. Sometimes we don't really appreciate what we have until it's no longer there. So the committee is appealing to everyone who can to buy one more thing, this will help to ensure that the shop thrives and continues to provide a vital service to the whole community.

TKC produces royal book

THIS year's Thy Kingdom Come (TKC) ran at the same time as preparations for the Queen's 70th Jubilee and so the TKC team came up with the great idea of producing a Cheeky Panda story book with the theme of what a queen needs to rule her people fairly, based on Queen Elizabeth's 70 years of service to this country and the Commonwealth.

The Open the Book Team were able to give one of these story books to all our school children at the last storytelling assembly before the spring half-term in which we enacted the Ascension of Jesus to heaven. We also gave our local preschools and nursery copies of the story books for their older children to enjoy.

Thy Kingdom Come was launched at the Mission Community's Ascension Day Service in St Peter's Church, Dalwood. Rev Julie Lomas preached on the Ascension of Jesus to heaven. Prayer books and prayer diaries were photocopied and made available in all our churches and we were delighted that Rev Julie had to photocopy many more booklets than we originally thought!

On Sunday, May 29th, there was a Mission Community Service at Kilmington with Rev Julie and Gill

Heighway leading the service.

Gill spoke about the disciples waiting for the arrival of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and how they spent their time in prayer. This period between Ascension and Pentecost inspired the archbishops of Canterbury and York to launch a time of prayer based on the phrase 'Thy Kingdom Come' from the Lord's Prayer which most of us pray when perhaps not thinking too deeply about its significance.

To mark the halfway point of TKC on Wednesday, June 1st, 29 people from across the Mission Community participated in a prayer chain praying individually or as couples for 12-and-a-half hours from 6am to 6.30pm, joining a global wave of prayer as part of Thy Kingdom Come. Many prayed for five family members or friends to come to know the love of Jesus.

During half-term, all the Mission Community churches had a Cheeky Panda trail in their churchyards for children to enjoy.

Pentecost Sunday on June 5th marked the end of Thy Kingdom Come and the celebration of the Queen's Jubilee at a joint-outdoor service with the Beacon church at Kilmington.

ON Sunday, May 22nd, at 3pm, a merry band set out from St Giles's Church to complete a short Rogation walk around Kilmington.


We stopped at the Jubilee Green, the allotments and at the primary school during the walk up The Street, along George Lane — just a little way along — and then back down The Street again.

ON Friday, June 10th, the Open the Book team gathered at St Giles's Church.

Catching up on reading

THERE are two book club meetings to catch up on for April and May. With Jane Eyre finally returned to the library shelves, ample time has been given to discuss the books selected by members.

It's just amazing how many books have been read and how much information is offered to the group.

April reads included: A Thousand Acres (Jane Smiley), A Poisoner's Bible (Deborah Blum), The High House (Jessie Greengrass), The Lamplighters (Emma Stonex), Smalltime (Russell Shorto), This is Happiness (Niall Williams), and Never (Ken Follett). The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch (Rhonda/David Armitage), The Lark (Anthony McGowan), The Glorious Life of the Oak and Meadowland and The Private Life of an English Field (John Lewis Stempel) provided a child/adult selection of outstanding reads.

A Thousand Acres transposes Shakespeare's King Lear story to the modern day – as per the original it proves a strong gnarled shocker of a novel in which moral dilemmas and torrid relationships interweave.

Blum's text offers an analysis of mysterious deaths by poison – what forensic science can reveal today but sadly failed to in the past. The High House addresses the all-topical self-preservation amid ecological catastrophe scenario. Inspired by a haunting true-life event the novel is about the mysterious disappearance of three lighthouse keepers from a remote tower miles from the Cornish coast and about the wives left behind on New Year's Eve, 1972 – a touch of the Marie Celeste with so many unanswered questions regarding the impossible.

This is Happiness may not be the case: Infatuation/romance in youth has a lot to answer for; a text full of rural Irish humour, typical rhetoric, fantasy and deeply sentimental; a lengthy but worthy read. Ken Follett's Never proved more than the norm of a Follett thriller; it provides a gripping high stakes human drama with a

'what if?' premise – sublime and masterful storytelling and finally Shorto's story of his family and the mob offers an irresistible memoir akin to 'a who do you think you are expose' and not all good!

Having addressed the 'adult' reads it is somewhat salutary that members of the group allow themselves into the world of children's story-telling.

The texts referenced here are exceptionally varied in their content – from the fun novel to that of emotional crises: to the delight in Mr Grinling's lunch and his battles with the local seagulls to The Lark – an adventure which sadly turns into a desperate battle for survival for brothers Nicky and Kenny. And for children and adults alike, Lewis Stempel renders just sheer delight for all nature lovers. His many books provide such insight into the life of the country side and its animal inhabitants – all provide exquisite reads for all ages.

May's readings included: The Paris Architect (Charles Belfoure); The Thursday Murder Club (Richard Osman); The Language of Food (Annabelle Abbs); How to Kill Your Family (Bella Mackie); The Enemy (Lee Child); The Green Road (Ann English); Mother's Boy (Patrick Gale); All the Frequent Troubles of our Days (Rebecca Donner); The Burning Chambers (Kate Moss); The One Plus One (Jojo Moyes) and I Could Read the Sky (Timothy O'Grady). A lot of books offering a great mix of genres – fiction/non-fiction accompanied by lively discussion to whet or not the appetite to read. The Book Club offers an excellent route into books to be read – members views and the discourse that ensues gives the chance to be selective in a market brimming with new books. The current book for discussion, a slim volume of poetry - Inside the Wave (Helen Dunmore).

Please feel free to join us – listen, take part and share your current bedtime reading. The next meeting will be on July 16th, 11am at the King's Arms.

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

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
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
