William Booth, founder of the Salvation Army was in the habit of giving the Army a different motto or challenge every year. For one of those years his motto was simply, "Others."

If I have learned anything through the last few months, it is surely that this is one of the great mottos of the Christian faith. We have had to look out for others and even by our self-isolation, that was an act of concern and love for others in order to stop the virus spreading – it seems to me that we are again facing the question of whether we are going to put our own wants and pleasures before the greater good of society, or not. This is in particular a challenge to younger people under the age of 35 who might catch the virus but it will not have the same impact on them but in the process of careless and one might say, selfish living, spread it into the older more vulnerable community.

Others! Will that be our motto going forward? The other day I was speaking with a young man outside the church. I invited him to come along on Sunday. "What if there is not enough room for me if your numbers are limited." The man standing beside me who is an elder in our church said this to him – "In that case, you can have my place!" That is what it means to put other people first.

Over the whole of this pandemic we have had our food trolley out and filled twice a day. I was speaking to someone outside the church the other day and he

said to me "this has been a life saver for some of us." This too is what it means to have as our motto, "Others."

If you think of the heart of our faith, Jesus struggled in the Garden of Gethsemane, only hours before his trial and crucifixion. He had two choices. He could have escaped from Jerusalem and saved his life. That was not only a very real option, it was also deeply what he felt like doing. It was not, though, the option he took. He knew that to go into the Hell of the Cross and all it implied, would mean salvation for many. He put "Others" before himself. He literally put us first and submitted to the will of God.

This is perhaps summed up in one of the greatest and best known verses in the Bible – "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only son so that whoever believed in him would not perish but receive eternal life." Wow! Is that not the essence of putting "Others" before himself – yes even the Creator God. He could have chosen differently but in love his choice was made.

To put "Others" first is always a choice – sometimes a very difficult choice but surely as we come back into church and look towards the future, this is going to be our battle cry.

To put it in the wonderful words of the apostle Paul, "Your attitude should be the same that Christ Jesus had. Though he was God, he did not demand and cling to his rights as God. He made himself nothing; he took the humble position of a servant and appeared in human form; and in human form he obediently humbled himself even further by dying a criminal's death on a cross. "Others" first, Himself second and our salvation guaranteed!

### What is love?

It is silence--when your words would hurt.

It is patience--when your neighbor's curt.

It is deafness--when a scandal flows.

It is thoughtfulness--for other's woes.

It is promptness--when stern duty calls.

It is courage--when misfortune falls.

Sacrificial love has transforming power. Genuine love is volitional rather than emotional. The person who truly loves does so because of a decision to love. This person has made a commitment to be loving whether or not the loving feeling is present. It is, so much the better; but if it isn't, the commitment to love, the will to love, still stands and is still exercised. Conversely, it is not only possible but necessary for a loving person to avoid acting on feelings of love. I may meet a woman who strongly attracts me, whom I feel like loving, but because it would be destructive to my marriage to have an affair, I will say vocally or in the silence of my heart, "I feel like loving you, but I am not going to." My feelings of love may be unbounded, but my capacity to be loving is limited. I therefore must choose the person on whom to focus my capacity to love, toward whom to direct my will to love. True love is not a feeling by which we are overwhelmed. It is a committed, thoughtful decision - Dr. M. Scott Peck
