## Is there a future for the church? Part 2

In my last article in the Orchardhill Record, I posed the question: "Is there a future for the church?" I gave some historical background, and then I pointed out some of the good things within our church and in the wider Glasgow area. Coincidentally this week's article by Bishop John Shelby Spong cites some American examples of the same thing.

So where then is the new life I referred to? The "Dandelions in the cracks of the institutional concrete".

First, there are some wonderful examples of new life in many churches that are intentional and publicly positioning themselves as churches that endorse a "new way" of approaching their Christian tradition. The ones that seem to experience the greatest energy and even growth in this declining market start with a more contemporary theology and Christology and move from there to an emphasis on values, relationships and spirituality rather than on beliefs and creeds. Some of the qualities that we can easily identify in these churches include things like active pluralism: real connections with communities of other faith traditions, shared space and the use of combined rituals. Another characteristic we have observed is a comfort, acceptance and even affirming relationships with people from the GLTB

communities. In all of these vital churches there is no sexual orientation issue.

While many of these models tend to show up in "new start" churches, real change does occur in several older mainline denominational churches. This usually happens with a congregation that has decided that it wants to re-identify itself as a new kind of church. Most of these churches have been led by an inspired minister through a process of discovery. Probably the most consistent quality that can be seen in these change agents is their ability to articulate a clear redefined purpose of the church. They are usually spiritually grounded and have a positive vision for the future. It helps to have some skills in dealing with conflict.

Some of these talented folks have their own creative ideas and are entrepreneurial. Others have used one of the dozen consultants that are now available, some with more success than others. Some are using a whole new operating system in order to view not only the church but their faith and even their world perspective as well.

Rev Dr Tom Thresher, author of a new book, *Reverent Irreverence*, has used his experience with Integral Theory to create new possibilities for the church and Christianity. His book tracks his experience in a church that

he ministers in and offers a vision for change in the future church. He provides a model that integrates Eastern wisdom and Western enlightenment, yet leaves room for traditional as well as progressive Christians and anyone else who would like to experience what he refers to as "Christ consciousness". When those in leadership realise that the purpose of the church is to help others experience the Divine at the deepest levels then the focus of the congregation is on practices and behaviour and not on beliefs and creeds. I believe that Thresher is on to something very important.

As I have written before, I am hopeful that the young people in the "Emerging" movement will continue to offer something substantial to a new and vital understanding of the Christian faith. Phil Snider and Emily Bowen, both ordained clergy in the Disciples of Christ church, certainly believe that there are plenty of opportunities in the

Emergent movement to help the whole church evolve. They have written a book called, *Toward a Hopeful Future*. The subtitle of their book is "Why the Emergent Church is Good News for the Mainline Congregations".

As ministers of a church, they speak and write from experience. Like Thresher, they offer not only a vision but a model. Best of all, they provide tools and many tips garnered from their own experience of trying to accommodate young people from this changing spectrum.

They make it very clear, however, that our mainline churches cannot keep doing things the same way and expect these young people to conform to our ways, our theologies and Christologies. "Emergents" are as uncomfortable with absolute certainty as they are with our typical mainline worship services. But they certainly represent Dandelions in the cracks of our church institutions.

We are a very friendly group of singers who enjoy each other's company and singing praises to the Lord. Please come along and join us.



## Tax Dodging Hurts the Poor

From 24 August to 15 October, Christian Aid's Tax Justice Tour will take to the road to raise awareness of the impact tax-dodging has on the poor. It is hoping to send a strong message to the Government that it's time for MPs to take action to end it.

Christian Aid is running the tour in partnership with UK campaigners, Church Action on Poverty, who bring the perspective of the impact tax dodging has on people in the UK.

The Tax Justice Tour will take Christian Aid's red double-decker bus across every region of England, Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland. The bus will provide a space for you to learn more about tax dodging and its impact on those living in poverty.

There will be talks with local and national politicians as well as church leaders and campaigners. The tour will

also provide the chance to hear from people who have first-hand experience of the impact tax dodging. It will, of course, provide the opportunity and tools for you to help tackle this gross injustice.

Tax dodging costs poor countries an estimated £110 billion a year. That is 50% more than the UK's international aid budget, and it deprives poor communities of money that should be funding development: paying for schools, hospitals, infrastructure and other vital services.

Christian Aid's 2009 report, False Profits, explains the maths and the kind of damage this does to development: you can download it from the Christian Aid website.

## Orchardhill Olympics

After many months of planning by the Fellowship Task Group, our summer outing, the Orchardhill Olympics, went ahead in Huntly Park on Sunday 10 June, just two days after the real Olympic torch passed through Giffnock. The rain stayed away for most of our day, and when it did come it neither stopped play nor dampened the spirits of those who came along to join in the fun.

A huge thank-you needs to be said to the large group of helpers who got our "Olympic Stadium" ready for the "Opening Ceremony" in time. There was a very real spirit of fellowship among the folk there, and with everyone pulling together, we soon had the registration marquee and the refreshment tent in place along with the miles of bunting which decorated Huntly Park.

At 1.30 our first torch-bearer set off from the church with our magnificent torch based on a lovely design created by two of the Brownies from the 2nd "A" Giffnock unit, Madi Callander and Sophie-Kay Black. The torch was passed from one runner to the next all the way up Church Road and down Huntly Avenue to the park. It was fantastic to see people cheering on our torch-bearers, some of whom overcame walking difficulties to proudly carry the torch.

Once we reached the park gates we had a short opening ceremony. We were very pleased to have Andrew Mullen with us to help us get the games under way. Andrew is a fifth year pupil at Mearns Castle High school who attended the Parent and Toddler Group here many years ago. He is a fantastic swimmer and has been selected to be part of the GB Paralympic team this year in London. We, of course, congratulate him on his selection, wish him well later in the

summer, and will follow his progress with interest. He said a few words of welcome for us and then introduced "Her Majesty The Queen", who cut the ribbon and got the games going. Many thanks to Anne Anderson for her magnificent performance.

We had clearly marked areas for field and track events, and we had a large number of activities for the children, the adults, and the less active adults who participated in five teams representing the five continents of the Olympic symbol. Events ranged from the three-legged race and the space-hopper race to croquet and boules with speed-knitting and jigsaw completion against the clock along the way. There were many other games like fling the wellie, toss the biro, juggling, golf-chipping and an all-ages quiz to mention just a few. Our participants all had great fun and whether they were five or seventy-five they took part with gusto and smiles on their faces and, in some cases, more than a normal level of competitiveness!

The teams in the top two positions at the end of the scheduled events then went head to head in a "Tug-of-Friendship" with Europe as our overall winners after the rope had broken twice. We clearly don't know our own strength. I like to think it was a very clear sign of how much stronger we are together than apart. Our Olympic champions then were awarded their gold Cadbury's medals, and the games were over.

Throughout the afternoon we had great support from members of Bridges, who ran a tuck shop, and Thorntonhall Farmhouse Ice Cream, who came along with a variety of their delicious ices for us to enjoy.

An especially big thank-you must be given to Wholefoods Market who

It has been a busy year in the Orchard Community Café, and we have particularly enjoyed having the mums, toddlers and babies from the Imagifun class plus a few dads, grannies and grandpas with us on a Tuesday. It's a very child friendly atmosphere: so if you're a child-minding grandparent, why not come and join us?

As a result of our busy time, we have been able to donate a record amount to charity this year. £250 each has gone to Macmillan Cancer Support, Starter Packs Glasgow, Robin House, Bliss Scotland, Values into Action Scotland, Hazelwood School, Glasgow SE Foodbank, Malcolm Sargent House (Prestwick), and Orchardhill Church. Also, £200 to Glasgow the Caring City, £350 to Scottish Love in Action, and £252 to Compassion UK, through which we support a small boy in Ethiopia at the rate of £21 per month. That makes a grand total of £3052.

The charities that we support are mainly local or ones with which someone has a connection. If you would like to nominate any particular charity, please let us know.


