Yes we can!

I clearly remember the first-term election campaign of President Barak Obama where he very cleverly used the slogan "Yes we can!" to inspire the nation. Whether he has or has not delivered I cannot say, but there is something about having a go that I admire and conversely drives me to despair when people simply say it cannot be done. Doing nothing as Christian people is never an option. The Bible is simply full of stories of people overcoming incredible odds.

You may recall that on the longest day of the year I played 101 holes of golf. Why? Because it has never been done on that course in over 100 years and people said it was not possible given the difficulty, particularly for a senior golfer on the wrong side of 50. We raised £1268.20 before we recover gift aid, and we should end up with a total in excess of £1500.00. So thanks to everyone who supported their crazy minister's endeavours that day.

The experience was life-changing and has been a deeply spiritual experience for me since. I have reflected on it and drawn inspiration from it for the challenges that lie ahead both for me and for us as a church. We are living in an increasingly secular age and in some cases a hostile age. Being part of the church and followers of Jesus make us a peculiar minority.

I do believe that there are lots of people who simply do not have time for church or for God or Jesus. But I also believe that there is a significant number of people who follow Jesus and have a deep sense of God in their lives but feel the church has nothing for them or that it has betrayed the Kingdom of God by the way it has conducted itself. In truth there is very little we can do to rewrite history or correct the wrongs of the past.

Having said that I am still positive and I do believe that the impossible is possible. I believe we need to be faithful to the teaching of Jesus not to be afraid to change in the light of new truth. The church does not cope well with new understandings and evidence that contradicts its long held dogma. Today we are still wrestling with the consequences of Darwin and the enlightenment, let alone the new understandings of our faith and texts gleaned from scholarship and discoveries over the past 200 years. We need to let go of past traditions that no longer sustain us or truths that we know are not valid in a 21st Century world. Jesus and the early church did it when reforming their understanding of the Old Testament.

Can we heed the call to integrity in worship and act justly in the world? Can we be the light in a world plagued with war, injustice, hopelessness, and selfishness? I believe we can. God is not finished with me and is certainly not finished with the church. I believe the impossible can become possible. Can we do it? Yes we can!



BISHOP JACK SPONG

TO DELIVER TWO SEPARATE BUT CONNECTED LECTURES LINKED TO HIS LATEST BOOK

"The Fourth Gospel: Tales of a Jewish Mystic."



Bishop Jack Spong was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1952 and received his Master of Divinity degree in 1955 from the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Alexandria, Virginia. He has received honorary degrees from the Union Theological Seminary in New York City, Yale Divinity School, Harvard Divinity School and the Universities of Edinburgh, Oxford and Cambridge.

Before being appointed bishop, Jack served as rector of several North American parishes and has held visiting positions at major American theological institutions, most prominently at Harvard Divinity School. He retired in 2000.

Recipient of many awards, including 1999 Humanist of the Year, Bishop Spong is a contributor to the Living the Questions DVD programme and has been a guest on numerous television broadcasts.

He is a prolific writer. A prominent theme in his writing is that the popular and literal interpretations of Christian scripture are not sustainable and do not speak honestly to the situation of modern Christian communities. He believes in a more nuanced approach to scripture, informed by scholarship and compassion, which can be consistent with both the Christian tradition and contemporary understandings of the universe. He believes that theism has lost credibility as a valid conception of God's nature.

Jack Spong has also been a strong proponent of feminism, gay rights, and racial equality within both the church and society at large. Towards these ends, he calls for a new Reformation, in which many of Christianity's basic doctrines should be reformulated.



Painting the Stars



On 12 September I will be starting a new group on Thursday nights at the manse at 8.00. Painting the Stars: Science, Religion and an Evolving Faith is a seven-session course covering themes like:

- Toward Healing the Rift
- A Renaissance of Wonder
- Getting Genesis Wrong
- An Evolving Faith
- Evolutionary Christianity
- Imagining a Future
- An Evolving Spirituality: Mysticism

We will meet every two weeks around food and drink to consider one of these themes.

“Mystery is a condition of awe, of resting precisely in an unknowing, long enough for the silence to have its way with us. The goal of this curriculum is to create some space for us to inhabit this mystery more deeply, and explore the relationship between science, particularly evolution, and religion. Perhaps most importantly, the hope is that each participant will feel from the inside what it is like to be the presence of all this creativity showing up after 13.7 billion years as him or her. Without this felt sense of being one with the creative process that is ceaselessly animating life, the conversation will remain objective and academic. We invite you to engage these seven weeks with an awareness that you are not separate from the creativity that produced you.”


