We will be continuing with our live streaming, so if you are concerned about returning to church at the moment, you are still able to worship with us. We do ask that, in line with government regulations, everyone attending in-person worship, takes a lateral flow test prior to coming to church. The big news is that from the 31st January, coffee and tea will be served after the service!

It has been a trying time for us all, and we look forward to better times. Our theme for the next few weeks is that God is holding our lives, and I am finding this helpful as I look to the next weeks and months. We are focussing on the Psalms and seeking to consider the ways that our God carries us - both in the good and in the bad of life. TEA & COFFEE AFTER THE SERVICE

As we get back into having tea and coffee after the service, we are looking for people to help serve and clear up after everyone has gone. The tables and trolley will be set up beforehand, and we just ask that you come out during the singing of the last hymn to be ready to serve people who sit at the tables.



FLOWER DELIVERY

It is good for someone who is dropping off the bags to be welcomed, therefore we are asking, if you can spare 2 hours on a Wednesday morning, please add your name to the list at the Claremount door or speak to Gillian or Isabella.



All of these duties may seem like small things, but it makes a **huge** difference to those receiving the flowers, just to let them know we in the church are thinking of them, serving the teas/coffees which allows people to have fellowship, and opening the doors to help the community.



COVID UPDATE – RECORDING ALL WHO ATTEND SERVICES FOR TEST AND PROTECT

As intimated on Sunday 5th December, from the 12th December last year, we started recording everyone who comes into the church for morning worship again.

The difference this time is that it is not mandatory that you reserve a seat on the website.

You now can either use the NHS QR code at the church entrance and about the church, or you can pre-enter your details on the website as before, and print your QR code to be scanned on entering the church, as before.

We are returning to this system after a trial of putting names on paper in the hall, where we found that not everyone remembered to fill in the forms. Although the legal requirement is only for the teas and coffees, the Church of Scotland have recommended that everyone who attends church should be recorded for Test and Protect Scotland.

Zoom

Just a note to say that we will be updating our Zoom security settings so there may be some changes in how we access our regular Zoom meetings.

ERGC and the Love Your Neighbour Club

Throughout the pandemic, Family First have requested LYNC packs for approximately 70 families.

These families were identified due to the difficulties they were experiencing financially, practically and emotionally with the impact of lockdown and the pandemic, and the additional stress this placed on family life, routines and money.

The families fell into a number of categories, including:-

single parent households, families in receipt of benefits, those affected by recent redundancy, families with ASN children, and families experiencing poor mental wellbeing.

Family First worked with a variety of agencies to support these families through these difficult times, including MART, Citizens' Advice, Social Security Scotland and Work East Renfrewshire, but the practical, prompt and personalised LYNC had a very positive impact on families, and complimented the other supports they received. Feedback from families has been exceptionally positive.

In particular, families told us that receiving a LYNC pack:

- ➤ Reduced pressure on their income/benefits, which went a little bit further.
- > Provided them with items they had often had to go without, during the pandemic, in favour of food (eg. Toiletries)
- ➤ Reduced shopping pressure of carrying bulky items, especially when shopping with young children.
- > Helped restock their cupboards and made their grocery items last longer.
- Gave a much needed boost to their wellbeing.
- ➤ Made them feel valued and cared about, especially having this pack delivered to their door by caring volunteers.

And finally, feedback from one recipient of LYNC;

'I am a single parent with 2 girls, struggling with the pandemic. Thanks so much for the work you do for struggling families. The LYNC helped pick me up when I was at my lowest point. Realising that people cared so much about me and my girls was so important. Having these items took pressure off my limited budget for several weeks. Thank you so much for helping my family and for making a difference. Keep up the good work.'
