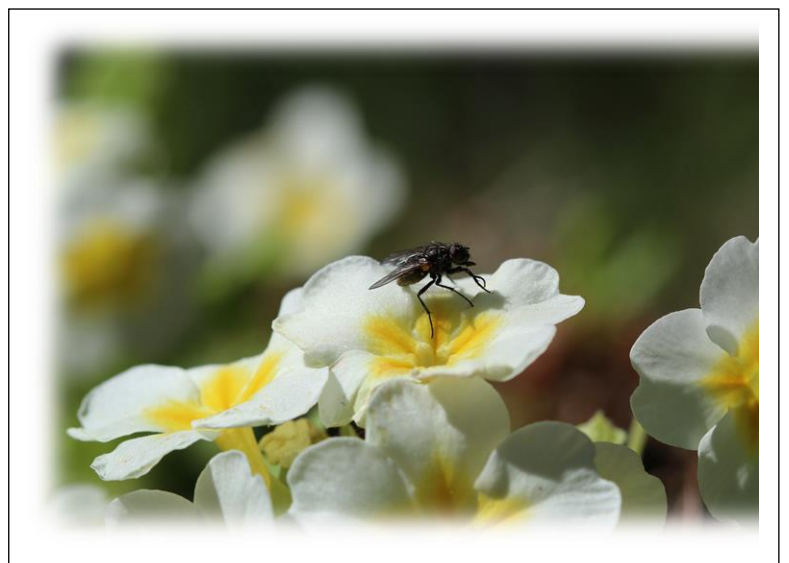

For the last three weeks we have managed to meet in Huntly Park, face to face, for games and organised activities, and soon we will be able to meet indoors.

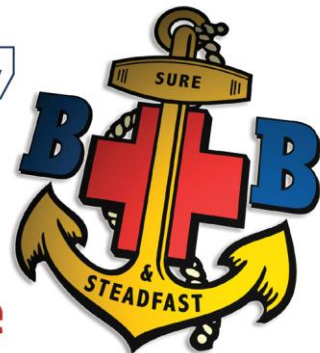
We plan to finish in June with a water night, which the boys should enjoy.

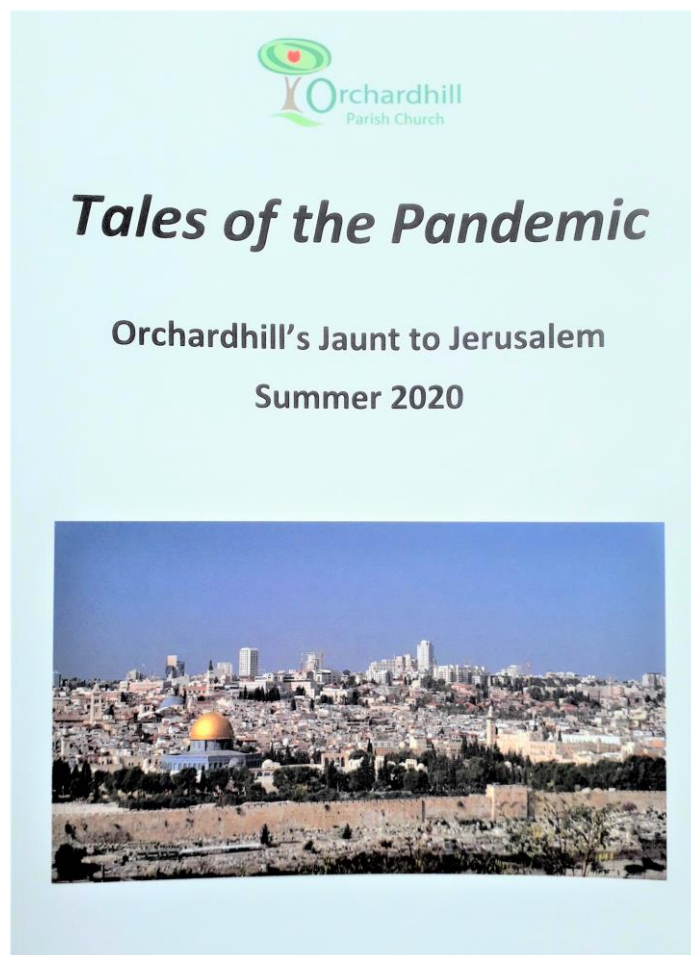
Jaunt to Jerusalem

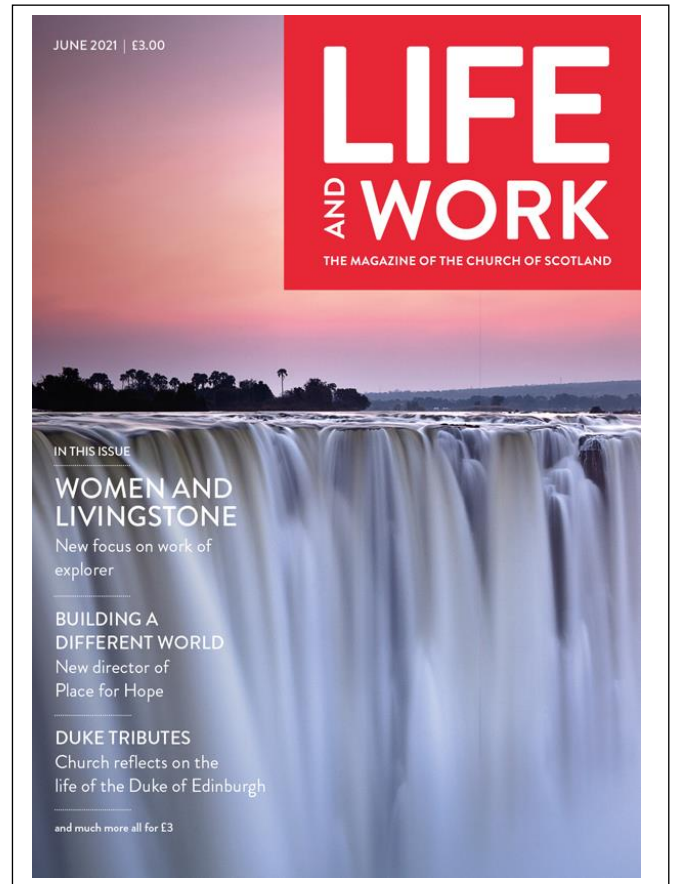

Our Trees:

Exploring Church Land with Citizen Science

“Our Trees: Exploring Church Land with Citizen Science” is a project developed jointly between the Church of Scotland and two Edinburgh Napier University MSc students (Maddy Richards and Victoria Cochrane). Trees in sacred spaces are seldom studied, yet they provide incredible benefits including, but not limited to, mental and physical health, regulating air quality and carbon storage, and providing safe havens for humans and wildlife. Currently there is no existing database recording the trees in our Scottish sacred spaces, and we are hoping that, with your help, we can create one. This would be particularly beneficial to congregations when looking at how to make your church carbon neutral, which the Church of Scotland is looking to achieve by 2030.

We are inviting congregations throughout Scotland to take part in this citizen science project - could you be one of the first congregations to be part of the database of trees? You will also help us learn more about your community's relationships with nature and the impact of environmental education. Taking part is quite simple - you will be asked to visit the land owned by your church to identify and measure trees and return the data to us. Before and after data collection, we ask that you also complete a short survey. Don't worry if you are brand new to identifying trees - we will give you all the tools you need.

‘Our Trees’ is expected to launch in late April and will run until mid-July. If you have any questions or want to participate and would like to be kept in touch with developments, please contact Maddy and Victoria at ourtrees.citizenscience@gmail.com.

Anyone who would like to be involved with this project to help the Church become carbon neutral, please contact Gillian and let her know.

Bible Puzzle Answers

Meanwhile, Jane was dating a guy named Gene who likes to share his talents. **Gene's is** the personality that more people should have, because he writes poems, essays, **proverbs**, and adventure stories for her. Love is strong between them. Her younger brother **jud**, examines and proofs this literature before it is sent to the publisher, for it's not often that someone cares for your sister like that.

Well, this exercise is just about over. It would be interesting to **chronicle** some of the many things that you have been doing while reading. Did you eat a **banana? hum** a tune? Drop a pen? Rejoice in the Lord while **licking** some candy? Hopefully, you had a good time and found the names of many books of the Bible.
