

From the Vicarage



My dear friends

“More Tea, Vicar?.....”

First of all may I wish you all a very peaceful and holy New Year. I know that for some of you, 2014 was overshadowed by personal tragedy, and I am sure that the pain continues to a greater or lesser degree. For you, I hope that this year will bring in some way, a form of peace and healing.

And for those of you who sailed through on a wave of euphoria, I hope that your state of well-being continues for a long time to come! Whilst for those of us whose last year was the usual bag of mixed blessings, I hope that next year's mixture is rich in content, yet balanced in distribution!

Talking of ‘rich in content’, the perennial examination of my ‘diet’ begins in earnest once again. I remember a few years back following Carol Vorderman’s detox routine – never again! Although the results were pleasing enough, the pain of giving up ‘tea’ was too much to bear. Caffeine was banned during the period, so my favourite drink was forbidden. But the headaches that ensued were just too hard to bear and after a fortnight, I gave in and had a cup or two of the golden nectar and within half an hour the headache had disappeared.

This whole incident reminded me of a story I read which involved a bishop presenting a teapot as a retirement gift to a clergyman, who like me, must have been another tea-oholic. In his presentation speech the bishop drew some interesting parallels:

“Perhaps I may point out to you some details that may have escaped your notice to show how appropriately your friends have selected this gift, and the useful lessons you may draw from a study of it; as typical of the calling of a clergyman.

It is as useful as it is beautiful (?), that is to say, not only does it faithfully carry out the work it was made for, but it lends charm and joy to any company into which it may be introduced. Among its most prominent features you will observe the spout, which discharges one of the primary functions, for what flows from it should cheer and gratify all that partake of it.

Again, you will remember that before anything is permitted to flow through the spout, a process of infusion must silently take place. The same should be true of that which flows from the lips of the clergy; if their words are to be effective, there must be a short period of thoughtful preparation.

The lid is another prominent feature, illustrating the importance of being able to 'shut up' at the right time.

You should also appreciate that which flows from the teapot does not originate there; it is only the instrument, the means, the channel. The water must be drawn from the eternal source and it must be pure. Sometimes, too, the plain truth will not be accepted by everyone who partakes of it until it has been sweetened or mixed with the milk of human kindness.

You may also notice that it is not ostentatiously paraded, though it will always be found by those looking carefully for it, and that is the stamp of its Maker. A clergyman declares himself to be an ambassador of Christ, and in the true ambassador the credentials are always to be discerned.

Finally, in some mysterious way, age confers a higher beauty and value and, although perhaps infirm in places, there is sanctity and reverence that Time alone can confer on vessels decrepit with service."

Well, I can't say that I'm anywhere near as venerable as the bishop's teapot, but if ever you would like me to pop 'round for a chat to share your tragedy or good fortune, then I would be delighted to join you in a cup of tea. And if you ever said 'More Tea Vicar.....?' then the answer would be a resounding 'Yes please!'

From the Benefice (or Joint) PCC.....

The Benefice PCC last met on 15th January 2015. Matters under discussion were:

Service rota – Reverend Chris Wingfield has prepared a service rota that covers the whole of 2015. This has been shared with churchwardens and a copy will be placed in each church vestry. It is being introduced on a trial basis.

Benefice finances – The honorary treasurer, David Fletcher, presented a quarterly report. Nearly all the churches have made a freewill offering for 2015. The deadline for making the offering for 2016 is the end of July 2015.

Replacement printer – Michael Harran, a member of the printing team, attended the meeting with a proposal to replace the current printer (which has suffered numerous problems during print runs) with a similar model, but using a different provider. The proposal was accepted unanimously, and plans will be made to purchase the new machine once this particular edition (February, March and April 2015) of the Circular has been printed. The treasurer has set aside a reserve sum of money annually to cover the cost of a new printer.

Preparation for Annual Parochial Church Meetings (APCMs) – Chris reminded members that these meetings should be held during April, and should be preceded by a meeting to sign off the PCC accounts. Chris will be circulating a sample agenda for use at the APCM.

Sharing information – this is a standard item on the Benefice PCC agenda where each representative gives a brief summary of the current situation in their own church. It has proved very useful for sharing ideas about church services, fund raising, building renovation, etc.

The next meeting of the Benefice PCC will be held at 7.30 pm on Tuesday 12th May at Orchard House, Gate Helmsley. Please send any agenda items to the honorary secretary, Wendy Holman.

First - an apology, in that the last report in our Winter Edition promised details of a reprint of the history of the church and of the review of parish records. Both aspects are still 'ongoing' but will 'surface' in due course along with a report of the Quinquennial inspection of the church following its presentation to the PCC.

The most exciting aspect has been the rebuilding of the perimeter wall between the two entrances to the churchyard. This was carried out with great interest and competence by P.H. Carr & Sons of Barton-le-Willows and is a wonderful tribute to Alan (Churchwarden for many years) and Margaret Leeves whose recent legacy enabled us to carry out the work. One day it might be possible to complete the appearance by providing a similar wall on the other side of the entrance gates.

We now have to replace certain headstones and trim the path - always something to do!

Funerals are reported elsewhere -formally - but both services for the old and the young were so appropriate and well attended.

Christmas period was an unusually exciting and hard-working time (but much appreciated) when more than three hundred people attended the services, two were weddings; a first time crib service on Christmas Eve, followed by Midnight mass attended by one hundred and fifteen people, the collection taken at this service was sent to the Ebola Appeal.

We enter the New Year in good heart. We are pleased to welcome all to our very special church of historical interest and all printable comments left in the church will be duly noted!

CRAMBE

The mild weather forecast by the Met Office hasn't materialised yet! Christmas was bitterly cold with a series of hard frosts, and marvellous crisp and sunny days. Little by little the days are getting longer and the snowdrops are starting to appear.

There have been three services at St Michael's in the past three months. Remembrance Sunday at St Michael's was, as always, well attended, the names of the fallen throughout the Benefice were read out, and the Last Post and Reveille were once again played by young Gage Andrews. Gage also played at the Claxton War memorial after the service.

Mike and Fiona were away in Namibia – in 1914 this was a German colony – and on 11th November they took part in an impromptu service in the northern deserts. A rough cross was fashioned out of twigs bound by strips of bark and adorned with a poppy which someone had in their pocket, and a dozen of us stood and remembered in that hot and far away land. A poignant occasion made all the more so by its ad hoc nature.



Our next service on November 16th was the baptism of Lawrence Borthwick and Gemma Taylor's daughter Lily Marian. The church was packed with family and friends who came to share in this joyful occasion.

The church was packed to hear the Christmas story told through poetry, prose and carols, and despite last minute extra seating many were left standing at the back. It was good to see so many children at the service. A marvellous evening was rounded off by mince pies and mulled wine at Kyreham House after the service courtesy of the Cook family. Very many thanks to all who contributed in any way.

Obituary: Maureen Parker

Sadly we must end on a more sombre note as we mourn the death of one of our parishioners, Maureen Parker. Maureen, who hailed from the East Riding, had lived in Gate Helmsley for over 30 years and was an absolute pillar of the community. She had served as Parish Clerk for a long period (and latterly as Parish Councillor) during which time she gained an encyclopaedic knowledge of all things to do with parish councils and other local authorities.

Maureen ran a craft group in the Village Hall, organised an annual Christmas dinner for the women of the village, and delivered the Circular to some of the houses. She was part of the flower rota and the cleaning rota at St Mary's Church and she enjoyed growing, using and sharing the produce from her beautiful garden, where she and her husband, Tony, hosted the annual Village Hall barbecue.

Before retirement, Maureen was a staff nurse on the Special Care Baby Unit at York Hospital, working the night shift. She still maintained the close friendships that she developed at work, and used to enjoy regular get-togethers - many of which she organised and hosted - with former colleagues.

Maureen totally refused to succumb to the limitations imposed by her long illness, carrying on as near normal for as long as she possibly could, although she had been forced to give up her hobbies of walking and golf. She was brave and generous, honest and straightforward, a real Yorkshire woman who definitely did not call a spade a digging implement, and just the sort of person to have as a friend. She will be greatly missed.

Since I last wrote we have received two further grants - £1000 from The Yorkshire Historic Churches Trust and £2500 from The John Pilling Trust. Unfortunately a third application was turned down. There are a couple more sources that might give small “top-up” grants once we have signed a contract for the work - the words “chicken” and “egg” spring to mind!

The fund has now reached £36,000 – just another £8,000 to go!

You may have heard the children, Mrs Mayhew, Mr Popplewell and Chris Cade interviewed about this on Radio York.



If I ruled the world.....

The following article is reproduced with the kind permission of the author, Claire Walker, Chief Executive of The National Churches Trust and that of The Field magazine where it was first printed in the February 2015 edition.



If I ruled the world I would end all wars, murders, crimes against humanity, torture and abuse of all kinds. Bullies would be a distant memory, neighbours would live side by side and life would be free of anxieties and hardship for all. Anger management would be on the national curriculum, as would setting the table for dinner. And before anyone bought a ticket for public transport they would have to pass a test to ensure they had good manners and respect for others. That would mean an end to those unthinking people who spill takeaway coffee over the floor for unfortunate passengers to slip on, put their feet on the seats so the next person has to choose whether to sit in mud and grime, or stand for the whole journey.

That test could take place in the UK's churches chapels and meeting houses, which do so much to help facilitate social cohesion. Enabling people from different walks of life, social and economic backgrounds to work, pray and live together. Churches also provide a place where it's possible to respect others, tolerate one another's differences and develop new skills. There is much to learn from their example. Churches could be holding the key to what I am looking for .

A tall order? To quote Margaret Mead, 'never doubt a small group of thoughtful committed citizens can change the world; indeed it is the only thing that ever has'.

However the number of people going to church has been declining: not just those attending services but also visitors to what are some of our country's oldest and most historic buildings (churches make up 45% of Grade 1 listed buildings in England with similarly high numbers in the rest of the UK).

So, if I ruled the world I would start by ensuring that a clean accessible lavatory was installed in every church. That's because nothing in this life is certain apart from death, taxes and the call of nature. In the modern era we expect to be able to go to the loo when we are out shopping, at work, at a concert, on most forms of public transport. Even portable loos are doing a roaring trade. And yet it is estimated that more than half the Church of England's parish churches are without loos.

That's why the National Churches Trust, which for more than 60 years has been funding the repair of churches of all denominations, is receiving more

and more requests for funding to install loos. Last year lavatories topped the list of funding requests to the Trust's Community Grants programme for the third year running.

I am willing to bet that there are few people who would not be worried at the prospect of going on a long journey, going to work, attending a function or taking part in a church service if they knew they would not be able to visit a loo should nature call. Indeed the anxiety brought on by the thought that there would be no loo could generate the need for one. And what about children, the elderly, and those afflicted by such conditions as Crohn's disease, irritable bowel syndrome or Parkinson's disease?

Lavatories allow churches to become more welcoming to worshippers of course, but also to guests attending weddings or christenings, parents with young children, community groups, choirs, charities wishing to use the space for meetings – even to voters (one sixth of polling stations at the last election were inside church buildings).

That said, it's important that loos are installed in keeping with the architecture of the building. But while it's true that churches, chapels, and meeting houses are full of history, the people looking after them know that buildings can't be stuck in the past. Many church buildings have adapted and changed over the decades and centuries. And installing modern facilities is essential to increasing their use and safeguarding their future.

Churches are at the very heart of communities and bring people together in a way that makes life better. That's especially true in our inner cities – think of their work helping the homeless – and in rural areas where, after the closure of local shops, post offices and even pubs, they are often the last building left in which people can gather together. So as well as installing a lavatory in every church, if I ruled the world I'd make sure there was adequate funding to keep churches repaired; too many still have problems with roofs and drains and once water gets in, then the building becomes damaged and you get a bigger problem.

Looking after church buildings usually falls to volunteers. In many of our villages, a handful of people look after priceless architectural masterpieces, many of them hundreds of years old. So, my final act as ruler of the world would be to make sure that the small battalions of churchwardens and lay people helping their minister, priests and vicars to look after places of worship were properly recognised as heritage heroes – because they are the people who are safeguarding our truly world-class religious heritage, enabling beautiful architecture, art, and history to be understood, interpreted and enjoyed for generations to come.

Together we can save Britain's churches from crumbling.

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
