CHRISTIAN AID WEEK

War rages on in Ukraine costing billions of pounds. The knock on effects of all this money spent and the inevitable rebuilding when it all eventually stops, as one day it will have to, will have far reaching consequences for us all. One thing we can be sure of with certainty is that it will hit the poor of the world even harder, and there are so many who struggling to survive now. How will they cope?



I wonder how the people of the Horn of Africa feel looking on at Europe when millions of their children face starvation due to the failure of rains for several years, a situation most probably exacerbated by Global Warming - another Western gift. They desperately need our help, but how much help will we be able to give them now when the costs of war are so high and our prices are shooting up daily? What a mess humanity makes of things.



This month sees Christian Aid Week, and it's more important than ever that we remember it.

Here is Jessica's story

Jessica Mwedzi smiles with love for her children as she stirs a single bowl of porridge for them...

...But she knows they're hungry for more. This one bowl of porridge is all she and her family can eat today: 'My children crave a decent meal, but I can't provide. We often go to bed on an empty stomach. It pains me to send them to bed hungry.'

For Jessica, drought means every day is a struggle for survival. Like many women in rural Zimbabwe - 7 out of 10 rely on farming for income and food - she toils on her farm, but nothing can grow on her ashen, dry land. Drought starves. Intensified by the climate crisis, and the effects of war in Ukraine on global food production, it drives families into hunger.

Jessica recalls that 'One year, we had no rain. The scorching sun burnt my crops just as they were about to bloom. It was so painful and disheartening.' You can help this loving mum turn hunger into hope

It's unjust that drought - exacerbated by the effects of conflict and the global pandemic - robs Jessica of the power to provide for her family. Her husband is unwell, so she's the only breadwinner. Her children look up to her, but she has nothing left to give.

Once before, when things were desperate, Jessica asked her neighbours for food but she came home with nothing. Jessica is anything but helpless. In the face of drought, her love for her family gives her courage to stand strong - and we stand with Jessica.

As the golden sun fades across the sky, Jessica watches her much-loved sons and daughters sing, dance and play outside. Can you imagine how it feels for her to know her children are hungry, but have nothing left to give?



She finds a ray of hope that she will overcome this tough time - and be able to provide her children with good food, and a full life, free from hunger.

Could you give today, and help this loving mum provide food and hope for her family?

A Good Easter at Saint Oswald's

Many thanks to all who turned out to Spring Clean Saint Oswald's last month and to all who decorated the Church building so beautifully for the Easter Services. We are fortunate in having a dedicated and talented congregation.

The best decoration of all for services in a Church are the people sitting in the pews and we were thankful to see the biggest Sunday congregation since Christmas 2019 with 36 adults and 7 children.

We opened on Easter Monday for visitors between 10am and 2pm. It was a far colder day than the Sunday but we had around 20 visitors.

On Easter Tuesday we had our first wedding of the year with a beautifully decorated lychgate and a colourful milk churn adding to the super flowers in Church.



John Retires after 40 years on the Parish Council

On Thursday 5th May we will be going to the Polling Stations to elect our local Councillors, but one name will no longer be there for the Parish Council as John Fletcher has decided to retire after 40 years service. Given this huge amount of time and effort dedicated to our village, we didn't want this time to pass without the chance to record our thanks and remember some of what John has done.



Like all who service on the Parish Council, this is a voluntary position but entails a lot of work behind the scenes. We grumble when we don't think things are right, but how often do we say thank you for all the occasions that run so smoothly that we didn't even notice them? Christmas Floats, Carols on the Green and Summer Fetes are the icing on the cake that help bring the community together, but behind all this is care for the cemetery, the village surroundings, the maintenance of the Greens and green spaces, playground and much more.

Hours of work and commitment can go into furthering many projects and arranging village occasions. The Parish Councillors are often the first to arrive and the last to leave, and I thank them for their work.

I asked John what particular projects he was proud of, and after 40 years it was unsurprisingly a very long list, so here are a few edited highlights.

In 1984 sorted the parking on Low Green where the spare soil was then made into a mound to keep cars off and floodwater in, and also proposed and managed the removal of the Alder trees from Low Green to bring the green back to how it used to be,

With volunteers and recycled stone, built the retaining wall upstream of Holly Garth Bridge on the north side of the river. The wall, built of sandstone provided a foundation for the first 25m of the riverside footpath. The pathway then had "grasscrete" installed alongside the river to the Whitbread to give a solid path to walk.

The replacement of the Whitbread Bridge giving better accessibility to Waterfall Park.

Arranged for the planting of many trees and bulbs around the village over the years, enhancing many green spaces.

Helped develop flood management schemes around the village with Neal Waters that included the lower playing field as a flood area to protect the village.

Accepted the flag staff and has raised the Union Flag, village flag and St George's flag on many occasions.



John has also served on North Yorkshire County Council and Hambleton District Council, serving as Chairman to the latter before stepping down in 2007.

There are always highs and lows when on committees, so I asked John what funny memory did he have from his time.

"Cllr June Imeson suggested the village should have a Christmas float. Peter Greenwell had self decorated a farm trailer belonging to Cllr Brian Winn. After a number of years the float was improved with lights and the Parish Councillors dressed up to present a nativity tableaux rode on the trailer. Unfortunately the village ne'er do wells had cottoned on and chased the float causing a nuisance, North Yorkshire Police provided and escort.

Turning around in Langbaugh Close there was a communications failure when Peter acting as a banksman told Brian Winn the tractor driver to stop. Brian stopped dead with the result all the tableaux found themselves in a heap on the on the floor of the trailer and the police car one inch from the rear of the float.

A shepherd - Cllr Mrs Greenwell at the bottom of the heap declared dire consequences will befall the banksman. The Banksman however was in close contact with the tractor driver as the amplified music played "peace on Earth... to assembled onlookers



The whole episode was a bit like "the last of the summer wine"

Thank You John, for all the service that you have given to our community over so many years, and to Anne for all her support. Well done!

As you sew so shall you reap

Some of you may have noticed these words at the end of the finance bit of the annual report for 2021. Now I think it was a typo, but it got me thinking. You may remember back in the March edition of Spire I told you about A Mark of Faith. The #weathercrossstitch project which I started in January. Each day I have recorded the temperature and weather for that day. Below is how it has progressed in the intervening two months up to 21st April .

But I wanted to explore the phrase at the top of the sheet. As I have sewn, so have I reaped. In a few different ways!

Sitting down each day has forced me to relax and take my mind off things I was worrying about. Each daily block has taken 15 to 20 minutes to complete and in that time I've focused on the task in hand. What was the temperature today, so which colour should I use? The excitement of the first really warm days in March which allowed me to use the darker green. Then the surprise of then going back into the pale blue of very cold. Then the weather, and the absolute joy of using white backstitch for snow the very next week. Immersing myself in this has been healing and brought peace.

Also, it has continued to be, as I described it in March, A Mark of Faith. Each block of crosses and backstitch line has represented hope. I may not reap anything good today; I may only encounter difficulty, pain or struggle. But by faithfully putting my cross on



the fabric I am stating that I am trust God that 2022 will be a year worth remembering and he will walk with me day by day, whatever the weather. I am pleased to report that 2022 is turning out to be much better than the previous 3 years. Not necessarily easy, but I have been able to find God's peace and strength in all needed to do.

But thirdly, looking back, as I have sewn so I have reaped. I get great pleasure looking at how the year has changed. The joy of consecutive days with different temperatures so I can change the colour of the thread and make a pretty pattern. For example, the plan means the last block at the end of each line is a Friday or a Saturday. It is fascinating to observe that Fridays and Saturdays on the right hand side have been (until Easter weekend) really cold, whereas the ones on the left have been much more varied. As I look at this richness in variety I consider what has happened and how 2022 has also been rich in variety of emotions, possibilities, difficulties and experiences. And even if they were hard at the time, the pattern they are creating causes thankfulness.

And finally, at Easter I can't ignore the fact that this is a CROSS stitch. Each day I am creating 28 crosses. 28 representations of the sacrifice that Jesus made for me so that I may have life in all its fulness and rich variety. And as I sew them, I affirm my faith and trust in him, and my willingness to continue sewing and sowing. To walk in the paths that he has laid out before me and to continue to weather the weather, with him, day by day.

Tree Work at the Church Hall

Managing three large buildings in the village is a big job, and we rely very much on volunteers. Our Church Hall is a brilliant facility for social events, but we need to ensure all is working and gutters and gullies are regularly cleared.

Last month we called in an arborist to remove some branches overhanging the Hall and to remove a dead branch over the Scout Hut. This work was done with permission received from Hambleton Council after an amazing degree of consultation with neighbours. I realised how thorough they were when I received a letter at the vicarage addressed to the Owner/Occupier of the Cook Family Grave!



The work was to reduce the number of leaves and debris that blocks the gutters leading to leaks in the roof. Thank you to Robin Harmar, our Hall Manager for arranging this - and even more for sending a photo.

Marwood School Receives Global Neighbours Bronze Award

Pupils at Marwood Infant school have been presented with a Bronze Award from Christian Aid's Global Neighbours Scheme for their global citizenship work.



From recycling, saving energy and litter picks to donating food and care packages for local Afghani refugees, pupils and staff at Marwood Infant School have been working hard to take their place as global citizens.

Marwood Church of England Infant School has achieved Bronze Award status in Christian Aid's [Global Neighbours scheme](#) in recognition of its

wide-ranging steps to love their global neighbour.

The accreditation scheme celebrates schools that are helping pupils learn about global poverty and the Christian responsibility to tackle it, as well as giving them the tools to play a confident part in creating a fairer world.

Headteacher, Dorothy Walton said *"We are thrilled to be recognised for the work we have done as a whole school community to raise awareness of the extreme inequalities across our globe and perhaps more importantly, the steps we can take to address these. The pupils learn about global issues regularly and gain an understanding of injustice in our world. Our recent fundraising effort to support Ukrainian refugees was a wonderful community effort. Our 'Trinity Group' of pupils helps to lead our thinking and action about how we can make a difference in the world such as our 100 Challenge inspired by Captain Tom Moore.*



"We have a partnership with a school in Sri Lanka which is informing, amongst other things, our pupils' understanding of the impact of climate change. This has



been reinforced by our participation in Christian Aid's 'Letters for Creation' project. This focusses on climate justice and has led them to write to Rishi Sunak, our local MP, to share their concerns. Pupils have been making personal pledges in response to learning about global issues. This learning challenges the whole school community to think about how each of us can make a difference in

our local community and globally. We took part in Christian Aid's scheme because it gives us a practical way of living out our school value of loving our neighbours.

"Our world is increasingly connected and our hope is for our children to grow as responsible global citizens who care about issues such as the environment and access to healthcare.

Alison Brown, Global Neighbours Schools Programme Officer at Christian Aid, said: "The Global Neighbours Scheme was launched in partnership with the Church of England's Education Office with a vision of helping young people understand more about the inequalities in this world and helping them to become courageous advocates for those who have no voice.

It's wonderful to see how staff and pupils at Marwood Infant School have taken this to heart and are seeking to tackle injustice.
