Early Morning Listening

For some strange reason, for many months now I have been waking up at 4am and not being able to get off to sleep again. Rather than disturb Karen and the dogs I plug in my earphones and listen to the World Service until getting up time at 5.15am and I can well recommend it. There are some brilliant programmes on at that time, and I especially enjoy the Saturday Deep Dive into an hour long topic.



Over the last few weeks we have had some harrowing tales from around the world. Some are man made tragedies like Afghanistan and all that has been going on at Kabul Airport. Greatest respect for our Armed Forces who are doing a magnificent job in extremely difficult circumstances as well as see the harrowing stories right before their eyes of people desperate to escape as their lives will depend on it. They do it to serve Queen and Country, not for the pay. Thank God for such acts of selflessness, for not every former soldier behaves in the same way.

Other stories have been about the huge effects of climate change. The fires raging in Turkey & Greece (and many other places too) One farmer in Arcadia, a beautiful part of Greece, spoke of his heartache of losing a flock of 2,500 sheep and goats that were killed in the fires. Another saw his 600 Olive trees burnt to the ground. These were just two stories of many, and all concerned will take years to get back to where they were - if ever - as who knows what the future brings.

Fires are also raging in Brazil and their wetlands have lost 74% of their water making fires even easier. Brazil is now 15% drier than around 20 years ago as they have been clearing land for farming and burning down the forests. As well as the loss of habitat to many species, this is also equivalent to the lungs of the world getting Covid and not being able to breathe. These decisions affect more than Brazil.

It's the poorer countries that often see changes the most, even though they are the smallest contributors to the problem. Today I heard that Nepal have seen their monsoon season increase in ferocity, so it doesn't just water the

land, but washes it away. The dry season is now even drier and hotter than before giving many more problems.

Such tales are happening all the time, and like the Emperor Nero we still fiddle whilst Rome burns. Despite knowing we are doing irreparable damage to the world, our lifestyle continues without any urgency of change.

I can't get the World Service in my car so listened to Radio 4 talking about Recycling. Apparently many councils collect the recycling then pay for it to be shipped to a Third World country to be dealt with, thus salving our conscience, but often it is simply dumped. I don't know what our Council does, but hope we are doing better than that. Our oceans are getting full of rubbish. This was born out back on World Service a few weeks ago when a survey team came across a dead whale in the Southern oceans, farther away from land than the moon. They examined the carcass and found plastics inside it - yet it was no where near civilisation.

September is the month many churches remember Harvest or plan for it. We say *The earth has yielded its Harvest. God, our God, has blessed us.* This blessing won't last much longer if we continue abusing the world. We need a whole new mindset of how to behave.

We need to develop sustainable lives that reduce waste and consumption of goods, and recycle efficiently. There are now moves to ensure that spare parts are available for many products so we don't have to dump them when they break. Please Microsoft, develop an operating system that doesn't mean we all need new Computers yet again. We don't need machines with even more capacity we never use.

At the Tokyo Olympics all the metals used in the medals came from reclaimed metals from old mobile phones. What a good use.

What else can be done to make big changes? The biggest change needed is in our mindsets, for if we don't see the need then we won't do much at all.

And it's with hope and trust in God that we come to the next important stage in our Living Christ's Story consultation with parishes. Each PCC has been invited to answer a set of consultation questions (or as many of them as you can manage) by 3 September, using the link at the foot of this page.

One of the glories of the Diocese of York is our variety. We have communities of different sizes, coastal and inland, industrial and farming ... As the Church of England from the Humber to the Tees it's our calling to be people of worship, celebration and prayer, of care and service, learning and growth, of good influence in civic life and responsibility for the environment. We'll do this differently in different places, and it's been wisely

said that an effective church does a few things and does them well.

PCCs have been working hard on the consultation — thank you for everything that you have been doing, with special meetings

The poppies need to be all one colour with no coloured centres, this makes knitting them easier as you don't need to change wool or sew a button on.

Also we need people who can stitch the poppies onto the hessian. This is going to be quite a task as there are hundreds to stitch on.

Completed poppies can be left at the back of Christ Church.

The Climate Emergency: A cause for hope and a call to action

The meeting of the 26th UN Climate Change Conference of Parties (COP 26) will have a powerful influence on the future of the planet. It is being hosted by the UK and will be meeting in Glasgow from 31 October to 12 November. The quality of the leadership the UK brings to it will be critical and that depends not just on what we say but what we both plan to do and actually do. Fortunately, the Government has set itself a bold emissions reduction target of 63% from 2019 to 2035. Unfortunately, it still has to spell out adequately how it will achieve this target.

This is the conclusion of the Climate Change Committee in its report to Parliament **Progress in Reducing Emissions** published in June 2021. <https://www.theccc.org.uk/publication/2021-progress-report-to-parliament/> The Climate Change Committee is the official watchdog set up by the Climate Change Act of 2008 to ensure that the Government does not just do what is politically expedient, but what is necessary for the country and the planet.

The Progress Report offers more than 200 recommendations and places particular emphasis on the need **for the Government to produce its Net Zero Strategy before COP26**. The Report adds that the Strategy “will carry the greatest weight if it is accompanied by the **Treasury’s Review of Funding**.” This was due for publication in autumn 2020 but it remains unclear whether it will now be published prior to COP.

What we are asking you to do could be the key to giving the UK the authority and credibility it needs to guide the 197 nations at COP26 to agree to demanding decisions and commitments that are so desperately needed.

- I. Please contact your MP by letter or preferably in person to ask them to bring pressure to bear on the Treasury to produce the Treasury Review of Funding as soon as possible, so that COP 26 may be a cause of hope. If you would like support with this, contact Hope for

the Future <https://www.hftf.org.uk/mps> who have a brilliant track record in enabling constituents to have creative meetings with their MP.

2. Email Chancellor Rishi Sunak to urge him to put the money on the table to enable climate action both at home and abroad. You can write to him at rishi.sunak.mp@parliament.uk . Or you can add your name to the CAFOD petition making this ask at: <https://action.cafod.org.uk/page/85465/action/>

Suggestions for what to write

1. Save why you are so concerned that Cop 26 should be a success. Make it personal and as powerful as you can.

*2. Use the **Progress in Reducing Emissions** recommendations to make it clear how vital it is that the Treasury produce their Review of Funding to substantiate the U.K.'s Net Zero Strategy. Failure to do so could undermine the whole of COP 26 because the U.K.'s credibility as Chair would be undermined. Also say how brilliant it would be if the UK set a magnificent example and how much you hope that that will be the case!*

3. A letter would be great. Meeting your MP, perhaps with two or three other people would be even better.

If you want more background on, there is a pithy and informative Forward and an Introduction headed 'Overall progress on climate policy: Net Zero and adaptation' in the Climate Change Committee report *Progress in Reducing Emissions* pages 6 to 10 (see link above).

Cabbages in the churchyard

– how a family-friendly lockdown project took off

Upper Helmsley is a tiny village of only a handful of households, 8 miles northeast of York.

Hidden behind mature trees just north of the village, St Peter's church would be easily missed, if it were not for the cheerful roadside signs pointing to the 'churchyard allotment' and the vegetables for sale.

Where a year ago there was an uncared-for corner of the churchyard, now there are eight raised vegetable beds, brimming with produce. Children & Family worker Rachael Harrison explains: "When we were forced to close the churches in the Benefice due to COVID19, we started thinking about ways in which we could bring families together outdoors. A plan was hatched to start an allotment club for youngsters, as a Covid-safe alternative for Messy Church in the benefice. We thought the produce could be distributed to older or housebound residents in the community, or perhaps sold at the roadside."



The project caught the imagination of the local community. Two farmers provided fertile soil, friendly villagers brought spare gardening tools, the vicar donated an old greenhouse, local gardeners shared plants and good advice, and a churchwarden salvaged wood to create the vegetable beds and produce stall.

Even the Fire Brigade volunteered their help, filling the water storage tank behind the church (St Peter's isn't connected to the mains). "The response from the local community has been incredible", say churchwardens Phil and Mari Richards, "everyone has been so positive and helpful!"

Throughout the churchyard allotment verses from 'All Things Bright and Beautiful' are displayed on colourful A4 posters. A simple log seating area surrounds a wooden cross. Meetings start with a prayer: "Dear Lord, bless this sacred place, our precious church allotment space. Show us your care from up above, help us to work with united love." The work at St Peter's churchyard has been blessed: the vegetable beds are overflowing with produce, and since the start of the project three months ago, no fewer than 21 families and over 30 young people aged 1 year to 14 years have visited and taken part – tilling, planting, weeding, and finally, harvesting!

Recently, the allotment team has sought advice on how to make other areas of the churchyard more wildlife friendly.

Some areas are now left uncut, to encourage wildflowers. The next project is to build a 'bug hotel'. The church building itself is not forgotten – planned improvements to the facilities will make the building more accessible and user-friendly. The allotment project has given the church a great reputation - no doubt the local community will respond positively to fundraising initiatives.
