#### **ALL CHANGE**

Dear Friends,

In July I attended both Farewells to Bishop Paul, the first one in Northallerton Church and the second one in York Minster, where Bishop Paul & Bishop John of Selby, who both started together as Bishops, both retired at the same time.



Two very good services and both with lovely relaxed and joyful atmospheres, as can be see left. Archbishop Stephen preached in the Minster and then presented both Bishops with leaving gifts, which we had contributed to on your behalf. We wish them both well in their retirements. Bishop Paul had just got married a few weeks before this, so truly a new beginning for him.

You don't stop loving and caring for people when you retire, especially if you have been in a place a long time - 13 years as Archdeacon & 10 as Bishop, so it was no surprise to see Bishop Paul (and Archdeacon Amanda) in Middlesbrough following the riot holding a sweeping brush ready for the big clean up. So many issues in the world could be sorted if people would only talk to each other and listen to their concerns - whether they be problems at home or abroad.





The announcement has now been made as to who will succeed Bishops Paul & John. The new Bishop of Whitby will be **Rev'd Barry Hill**, 45, from Leicester Diocese. Former Team Rector of Harborough Anglican Team, alongside roles leading mission, fresh expressions of Church and church planting across the diocese. Barry is married to Stephanie (Pep), who is also ordained, and is father to Greg and Katy. Their dog, Tilly, is considered the "fifth member of the household."

The new bishop of Selby will be **Rev'd Flora Winfield**, who has served in the Dioceses of Oxford, Gloucester, Winchester, London, and Leeds. Ordained deacon in 1989 and priest in 1994, Flora was among the first women to be ordained in the Church of England. Since 2022, she has been the Third Church Estates

Commissioner, among other things chairing the Church of England's Net Zero Carbon Programme Board. Flora is married to Jonathan, and they have a black Labrador dog. We wish them both every blessing in their new roles in the Diocese.

We are facing changes in these Parishes too, as my retirement is now just a few weeks away. The Churchwardens assisted by the Parish Staff and the Area Dean, will be maintaining the mission and worship of the Church, but inevitably some things may not be possible or not be as frequent.

The 8am Service of Holy Communion from September onwards will just be on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month, but for Prayer Book lovers you could pop along to Saint Oswald's at 11am on the 1st & 5th Sundays, or the 10am Wednesday service. I am by nature a Lark. I have always loved the early mornings and having the peace and solitude to think and pray as I walk my Labradors, so arriving to set up Church at 7.15am on a Sunday has been something positive for me - but I know there are far more Owls around, so to ensure the continuation of the 8am through winter, it has been decided to reduce its frequency. I have also advised Fry Court that the monthly service there will be suspended until a new Vicar has been appointed, and they can then decide what to do.

Rev'd Jon Dean is kindly looking after weddings and funerals, and Rev'd Geoff Jaques will be taking care of any baptisms in the vacancy.

Sadly this is the penultimate edition of *Spire*. So many regular contributors have disappeared over the years, and our founding editor and most faithful contributor, Malcolm Race, has finally retired at 98! Whilst we now have Facebook to communicate with, I am sure there will be many people, near and far, who will miss *Spire*. Thank you for your loyal following over these years. Thank you also to Jean Goat who has organised the distribution of all the paper copies since it began and to all our faithful volunteer deliverers, many of whom have also been there from the beginning. Also many thanks to Quoin Publishing who persuaded us to go colour and have been so reliable and efficient.

It has been decided to replace the Vicarage, as the house - although lovely - is very expensive to heat and maintain and the garden is far too large for what people want today, so a new home has been bought on Newton Road near the garage which will be far more attractive to a new Incumbent. The Diocese still have to sort out what will happen to the present vicarage. We are very grateful for the 30 years we spent there, but it was on the replacement list when I arrived and our personal situation with our son David's disability has saved it for these last 30 years - and been one of the reasons we have stayed so long. I am pleased that we did.

# **Christ Church Hall News**

We have had good news for the Church Hall this summer. A grant was received from Impetus Environmental Trust to cover the full amount of the installation of solar panels, so now we are generating electricity and helping reduce our bills.

Also a grant of £2,000 has just been received from the Jack Brunton Trust to replace the disabled access door into the link corridor at the rear of Church which has become warped and difficult to use, and also to re-varnish the main hall floor and renew the badminton court markings.

Further good news is that Northumbrian Water are also going to replace water pipes into the coffee lounge free of charge, to replace the original lead pipes. This is part of their policy of upgrading, and our thanks to them for this.

Our big appreciation to Robin Harmar, who has sought out the grants and managed the projects

Thanks also to the Jonathan Parkin Concert that raised £581, as well as a most enjoyable evening, and also to Wendy Appleyard who has so far raised £400 from her book of Granny's Rhymes.





# Find Time to Say "I Love You"

After 21 years of marriage, my wife wanted me to take another woman out to dinner and a movie. She said, "I love you, but I know this other woman loves you and would love to spend some time with you."

The other woman that my wife wanted me to visit was my mother, who had been a widow for 19 years, but the demands of my work and my 3 children had made it possible to visit her only occasionally.

That night I called to invite her to go out for dinner and a movie. "What's wrong, are you well?" she asked. My mother is the type of woman who suspects that a late night call or surprise invitation is a sign of bad news. "I thought that it would be pleasant to spend some time with you," I responded. "Just the two of us." She thought about it for a moment, and then said, "I would like that very much."

That Friday after work, as I drove over to pick her up I was a bit nervous. When I arrived at her house, I noticed that she, too, seemed to be nervous about our date. She waited in the door with her coat on. She had curled her hair and was wearing the dress that she had worn to celebrate her last wedding anniversary. She smiled from a face that was as radiant as an Angel's. "I told my friends that I was going to go out with my son, and they were impressed," she said, as she got into the car. "They can't wait to hear about our meeting."

We went to a restaurant that, although not elegant, was very nice and cozy. My mother took my arm as if she were the First Lady. After we sat down, I had to read the menu. Her eyes could only read large print. Half way through the entries, I lifted my eyes and saw Mom sitting there staring at me. A nostalgic smile was on her lips. "It was I who used to have to read the menu when you were small," she said. "Then it's time that you relax and let me return the favour," I responded.
