No More Sleep Ins

Dear All

At the last PCC Meeting we made the decision to revert to a 9.15am start for the main morning service on Sundays, **beginning on 3rd October**. We had moved to 9.30am during Lockdown to be at the same time as Stokesley, and when streaming from the study and having other restrictions, this worked well.



Now we are looking to restart Sunday School and Church Parades, the later start cuts out many children who start sports & other activities at 10.30am, so if we are to have any chance of attracting them, we need to remove any obstacles. In addition, it gives more time on Sundays to get to Saint Oswald's when there is a service there at 11am..

We will continue to leave the Book of Common Prayer Communion Service alternating between 8am and 5pm for the time being.

We started singing in Church in August with the congregation wearing masks. Having seen how damp they were on Sunday after a boisterous rendition of *Mine Eyes Have Seen The Glory* to wish Stan and Eileen Jones well as they returned to America, it could be safer to retain this practice as winter approaches as the virus may pick up again. If people are quietly sitting in their seats a distance from others, then masks may be removed when not singing.

Planning for Christmas is hard not knowing what may happen by then, but we very much hope to have more going on than last year. Your safety comes first though, and practices are under constant review.

I have seen people at other events outside of Church without masks who haven't been back in almost 18 months. Church remains one of the safest places to be, so please make an effort to return if you can. We need you.


Any Donations for Harvest Flowers to decorate Christ Church should be given to Marina Charlton (or the Vicar who can pass them on).

The following Sunday 17th October at 9.15am, we will pick up a similar theme, but with the Uniformed Organisations who are returning for a Church Parade. This will be the shorter service and will be over by 10am so that young people can make other activities by 10.30pm. At this service we are appealing for

items for the **Middlesbrough Foodbank** who are very much in need of more supplies at the moment.

At Saint Oswald's at Newton under Roseberry we are having our **Harvest Service on 17th October 11am** during the All Age Service. Items for the Foodbank may be brought and any monetary contributions will be sent to **RABI** - the Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institute - to support farmers in the UK facing hardship.

We hope this variety of services and causes spreads our nets as wide as they can be to help others at this difficult time.



MILK: COW OR PLANT

As Christians one of our 5 Marks of Mission is to “strive to safeguard the integrity of creation & sustain and renew the life of the earth”. Choosing our source of milk is one way of doing that.

More people in the UK are switching from dairy to plant-based milk according to Mintel. The dairy industry has a problem: the 270 million dairy cows on earth burp too much. About 6% of methane emissions from human activity come from cows’ belches and other releases (sometimes the gas goes the other way), says the UN.

Yet while environmental concerns are driving dietary changes, milk made from soya beans - the crop described by Greenpeace as a ‘leading cause of deforestation’ - is Britain’s best selling alternative.


How much greener are plant-based milks really? And how do they compare with each other?

The Poore & Nemecek global study has been challenged by each of the producer groups, but remains a sound basis to begin our search for answers.

The carbon footprint of dairy milk does vary from country to country. “The UK’s footprint of milk production has been placed at 1.25kg per litre, making the UK amongst the world’s best in sustainable milk production,” says Dairy UK CEO Dr Judith Bryans. But that’s still greater than the emissions Poore & Nemecek attributed to any plant-based milk.

Soy milk performs surprisingly well in the study, given recent concerns over its sustainability credentials. Globally, production of a litre of milk from soya beans emits a kilo of CO₂ or equivalent gases. That's 2kg less than cows, 200g less than rice and slightly more than oat and almond milk. Soy milk requires the least water and land to produce, too. These numbers don't include the huge emissions linked to deforestation in the Amazon, the planet's largest carbon sink. Most soy milk sold in the UK is made with beans from Europe or Canada.

Almond Milk has potentially bigger problems. It has the lowest greenhouse gas emissions and its raw materials require the least land to grow, but it is by far the thirstiest plant milk. Producing a single litre of almond milk requires a whopping 371 litres of water (but still rather less than the global 628 litres required by dairy). Alpro sources its almonds from Spain and other Mediterranean countries. "Cultivation in Mediterranean areas, the nearest source of supply to the UK, is a small-scale, traditional industry," says sustainability manager Greet Vanderheyden. "These orchards are less affected by problems related to mass cultivation and most of the production is rain-fed."

Oat milk, meanwhile, fares well in terms of its CO₂ emissions and water use in the Poore & Nemecek study. Oats grow in more temperate climates, so are less associated with loss of biodiversity and wildfires than other crops. And, while oats need more land to grow than rice, soya or almonds, they require far less than cows.

"We use just 10% of the land that dairy uses," says Carina Tollmar, sustainability director at Swedish brand Oatly, which is now the UK's bestselling oat milk player. "Consumers are often so far removed from primary production so they have no idea how much feed cattle require or how much CO₂ they produce."

On the front of every pack of Oatly sold in the UK there's a tab showing how much CO₂ was emitted to produce, package and transport the product to store. The brand is now calling on its peers to do the same.

Other plant based milk is available! Yes, there's rice milk, pea milk, hazel nut milk, coconut milk, cashew milk and probably some I've missed. One recent article placed Hemp seed milk as their number one choice. Apparently, hemp breathes in [four times more carbon dioxide than trees](#), which improves air quality, and the tall leafy plants are a [perfect bee sanctuary](#). Has anybody tried it yet? If so please let me know.

Packaging & Transport can make a big difference to the green credentials of both dairy and plant-based alternatives – but that’s another story!

Preschool Children have different dietary needs so please check before choosing what milk source to use. According to a vegan website there are specially formulated plant based milks - vegan baby formula or soya formula and Alpro Soya Growing Up Drink 1-3+, a soya milk that is specially fortified to meet the nutritional needs of young children.

Where am I? Having tried several alternatives - coconut, soy, almond and oat - none work for me in tea (so I drink it black) nor coffee (sticking with cow). All taste fine with cereal, so we use fortified oat milk on the basis that it's by far the lowest carbon footprint (we can grow a lot more oats in the UK). I guess most of the cake I eat is dairy based as is the cheese. A mixed economy.

Hopefully this article has given you ‘food for thought’. **It would be great to hear from you; please send your (constructive) thoughts to the Editor and hopefully we can continue the debate.** At the end of the day it comes down to personal choice based on knowledge and ethics. It's a big picture and milk is just one part of it. Whichever way you choose, be aware of your impact on the planet – there’s No Planet B.

Lighting Project for Christ Church



A woman recalled, in a letter to a newspaper, that during World War II her aunt always put a hat on before going into the air raid shelter. "She said if Hitler did come, he was not going to find her improperly dressed."
