Remembrance Remembered

It was wonderful to see Remembrance Day back to the good attendances it had been Pre-Covid. In 2020 we had one flag, the wreath layers and myself. This year we had all the Parade and a great turnout of villagers once again.

The setting for the Act of Remembrance was enhanced by the very colourful and moving display of poppies, that now include the large coloured poppies representing the Empire Troops, the Animals and Peace (Black, Purple and White) as well as the traditional red poppies.





New this year were the biographies of all the village fallen - 48 from the First World War and 18 from the Second World War. These had been prepared by the History Society and were placed in a line the full length in front of Church depicting very powerfully the huge loss of life from lads of this village. The display has been much admired and appreciated.

Guisborough Road was full of residents to help mark the occasion, and for the first time in 70 years we had the King's Representative at the Service, Mr Peter Scrope DL. It was a very mild day, but just before we started a mist descended bringing with it a powerful silence.

Our thanks to Karen Peverell & the Poppy team, the History Society, North Yorkshire Police for Traffic control, to all who took part, and to Zoom who had planned to install fibre broadband in Guisborough Road the following week and had coned off all the road on both sides. It was much appreciated!

Shoebox Appeal 2022

Since I arrived in 1993 we have supported Children in Distress and their annual Christmas Shoebox Appeal. I began supporting its predecessor *Romanian Children's Aid* when Eastern Europe opened up after the fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989. Anneka Rice and others discovered huge needs in Romania with children left in "homes" as their parents were terrified of AIDS that they had caught from contaminated



blood products. RCA stepped in to build a Children's Hospice in Cernavoda - and Gwen and David Henley were amongst those who travelled over to help.

It soon became apparent that the needs were greater, as so many children had so little, so Love in a Box was started in the early 1990s with the Charity changing their name to Children in Distress as they were also going into neighbouring countries.

I brought Love in a Box with me when I became Vicar in 1993, and apart from a couple of years when we supported Samaritan's Purse as the Foot and Mouth Disease prohibited lorries travelling from the UK, we have done it every year since.

Roy Wheeler, shortly to be 89, has been the organiser of LIAB since it began, but is standing down this year. Thank You Roy for all you have done and the happiness you have given to so many children who have both given and received the boxes. Roy has travelled to Romania over 30 times to hand out the boxes (26 of them driving there!) We are not sure yet as to whether *Love in a Box* will continue next year.

We thank all who have participated over the years. Many local Churches and schools have taken part, as well as the Royal Oak and many others. I will miss my annual visit to



Ingleby Greenhow School (pictured above left) for my LIAB Assembly.

Co-op Supporting Marwood School

November saw a great event at Stokesley Town Hall where some brilliant causes in the Stokesley and Great Ayton area were presented with cheques representing money raised for them by Co-op members. The local causes included Crash Bang Wallop Youth Theatre, and Sunnyfield Kindergarten. Kirkby and Great Broughton Primary School also received a cheque the day before.



The new local causes which have been selected for the year going forward are Yatton House in Great Ayton, which supports adults with learning difficulties, Marwood C of E Infant School and Cruse Bereavement Services in the TS9 area.

Ceri Tate from Sunnyfield Kindergarten in Great Ayton

commented "the funding has been invaluable for improving our outside garden area. This means that the children can play safely in the fresh air in a stimulating environment which is so beneficial for development at this age."

Marwood C of E Infant School also hope to use funding received after the next round to improve their outside space and enable children to grow different types of vegetables, while Cruse Bereavement Service will now have more funding to support those suffering with loss and grief in the TS9 area.

In the last year Co-op members have raised £117 million across the country for local community causes and out of this £19,800 in the Stokesley and Great Ayton area. Kathryn Wilson has recently taken over the role as Member Pioneer with the Co-op for Stokesley and Great Ayton and said that she is delighted to be able to work with Co-op members and colleagues together with different local organisations to bring the community together. She said that during the current economic climate it's such an important time to consider the roles that local charities and organisations play in our communities

as there is a real risk we may lose many of them if they don't receive enough funding, this would then undoubtedly have a knock on effect with the health and mental wellbeing across many different sectors during an already difficult time.

You can help raise funds for these local causes if you have a membership card and purchase Co-op products. You can choose to split the funds between the three local causes or select one cause. You can do this by either ringing the telephone number on the back of your membership card or by logging onto your account on the Co-op website, or if you download the app it's under the community tab. Then every time you swip your card at least Ip in every £I spent on Co-op items will go to the local cause with an additional Ip in every £I going to the national pot to support charities and groups across the country.

Applying for a School Place

If you have a child who was born between I September 2018 and 31 August 2019, they are due to start school in September 2023 and you must apply for a primary school place for them to start in Reception.

If your child is in Year 2 now, then you will need to apply for their next school for Year 3. The deadline to submit your application is 15 January 2023

You must apply for a school place even if your child has an older sibling at the school you would like them to go to or they are attending a nursery attached to the school.

This information is for families living in North Yorkshire. Families living outside

North Yorkshire will need to contact their home authority to obtain their information regarding school admissions.

Mission Giving 2022

Great Ayton PCC met on Wednesday 16th November to decide on the recipients of this year's Mission Giving to Christian causes & charities. Members of the PCC are asked to champion a cause.

The following were chosen to receive £1,000 each

Rosemary Wheway proposed continued support for the Church overseas by supporting the two main Anglican overseas mission societies - CMS Church Mission Society) and USPG (United Society Partners in the Gospel). Both of these societies work with the world Church and have been supported by Christ Church for many years.

John Dickinson proposed **Together Middlesbrough and Cleveland** who do great work in deprived areas of Middlesbrough and East Cleveland. Their holiday clubs for poor children are especially appreciated.

Jonny Winterschladen once again proposed **Message Trust** that takes the Christian Message into Secondary Schools in the North of England. His son Joe works for the Advance Youth Section. We have supported Joe before and we often hear of the good work being done.

Jane Robson proposed the Clergy Support Trust who are there to support ordinands and clergy who are struggling financially. Whilst never having been a recipient herself, she said she knew many people who have been helped by this charity.

Helen Land proposed Big Kids, a Middlesbrough based children/youth team who work in Churches and schools including the Vicar's old patch at Whinney Banks and St Oswald and St Chad's. They began in 2017 and have been doing great work.

Ken Taylor, having declared an interest, suggested **Northallerton Branch** of the Samaritans. Their workload had already risen due to Covid, and the financial pressures affecting many will put more pressure on them.

Robin Harmar was impressed by the work of **School Aid India** who run Roseberry School in India, whom we have had links with for many years. We know the money is well spent and makes a great difference as it was founded by Helen Jones in our village who runs the Trustees. This completed our eight choices for 2022.

Christmas Appeal 2022

It was unanimously decided that **The Genesis Project** in Grove Hill, Middlesbrough, run by Rev'd Kath Dean and her team, be the recipient of this year's Christmas Appeal.

We have known Kath for many years as the clergy helped cover services at St Chad's & St Oswald's when



Kath was a Reader. In 2018 we asked Kath to come to talk to us one evening when we were running our *From Thankfulness to Generosity Stewardship Campaign*, and she so impressed us with what she told us that we have supported them since.

They have been a recipient of our Christmas Appeal in 2018, and as the work they do has grown considerably over the years, so members of Christ Church - Rosemary, Helen and John - have become Trustees to help them, not to mention Grace's Shed which collects all sorts of household items to be sent to them.

Now ordained as a Permanent Deacon, the Rev'd Kath Dean has been in the media many times raising the profile of their work. The Luncheon Club has grown into an Eco Shop and meals for over 240 people a week, together with Children's Clubs. Many of their volunteers also participate in Prayer for the Day.

Our Christmas Appeal will include the collections taken at all our Carol Services and the Crib Service. Please be generous.
