A Window with a Message

In the Millennium year 2000, we marked the occasion in Christ Church by installing a beautiful new Rose window in the West end of Church. It is truly wonderful, bearing many Christian symbols all held together by the triangle in the centre representing the Trinity. Go into Church at different times of day and you always see something new. Early morning it is a deep rich brocade, and at evening it lights up the choir with blue rinses as the sun shines right through. The dove of the Spirit is always the first thing to appear and the last to disappear. Standing behind the altar, as I do, it is my constant inspiration, as that is what I look at all the time.

Of late it has been giving me a more unsettling message. When we installed it, as well as raising funds for the window, we also raised enough to build an extension to an Armenian Evangelical Church in Aleppo in Syria to share our blessing. We did this through *The Barnabas Fund*, who support persecuted Christians, for even back then under Assad, times were hard. We did see photos of them proudly showing off their new extension, although we were never given direct access to them, as they lived in fear of the Secret Police.

Having seen the state of Aleppo in the news recently, living under Assad appears more like a Sunday School picnic compared with the situation today. Aleppo stands in ruins after constant bombardment, and the Christians have fled their Church which is now rubble. Where are they now, and what are they doing? As I look to our West window, lifting the bread and wine of Holy Communion up to God, those questions lay with me, for here in Christ Church we had some connection with them, however fragile. That is what communion is all about.

The Christian faith isn't about being comfortable and self satisfied, but standing together with those going through difficulties, for at the heart of our faith is the Trinity - the Godhead of Father, Son and Holy Spirit - that lives together in unity. We cannot forget our fellow Christians in Syria, and now those in Iraq who most probably face a similar fate. How can we help hold people together? How can we help bring forth reconciliation and peace?

Please pray for them, and for all affected by the violence and barbarity raging in the Middle East. No-one will come out the victor, even if one side eventually wins, for so many terrible things have been done that all will become victims.

Pray too for the Muslim families in this country who have lost sons to go and fight, for whatever happens, they will never come back the same. We know from our own experience with our troops the devastating effects of Post Traumatic Stress, and we fight with rules of engagement to ensure as far as possible that humanity is preserved. In Iraq this doesn't appear to be the case. Memories do come back to haunt you.

We have just remembered the 70th Anniversary of D-Day and are about to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War, when the world saw carnage on an unprecedented scale - and both of these conflicts were predominately in Europe. We know the folly of war and the terrible costs to all, and that when fighting is finished, talking has to begin. If we want to celebrate the peace won in both those wars, let us work for it today.


