

A Word from the Vicar



Since coming here as Vicar in 1993 many things have changed in the life of our Church.

Patterns of attendance have changed from the generation who were used to coming more than once every Sunday. Now families are spread out across the country with lots of other activities competing for time. Nevertheless, our attendance figures are still relatively healthy, but we need to constantly grow in order to stand still.

We have seen lots of new initiatives begin with young people alongside the tried and tested, with Come & Praise, Little Fishes, Who Let the Dads Out, Sunday School and The Firms. We retain good links with our Uniformed Organisations and schools.

Although we said goodbye to the Mothers' Union last year, we celebrate Praise and Party, the Visitors Group and other Study Groups that bring people together in faith.

Our Church is still seen as an important part of people's lives in the village, for baptisms, weddings and funerals are all considerably up at Christ Church since I first came. The demands of these services are also greater as we offer modern ways of communicating with Skype, Slideshows and recorded music.

Perhaps the greatest difference I find in the Benefice is the large increase in attendance at Saint Oswald's Church through weddings, that has had a knock on effect on everything else we do there.

Both Churches are so active, vibrant and generous. It is a great privilege to be the vicar of Great Ayton with Easby and Newton under Roseberry, and I know I can't manage alone, so this report speaks of a very large team of people who maintain the work of our Church. Meeting of Parishioners

The Vicar welcomed everyone to the meeting and introduced Helen Jones who gave a presentation regarding her work with School Aid India. This was one of the charities that Christ Church had supported in the last year.

Election of Churchwardens

- The election is open to any parishioner living in Great Ayton.
- We are grateful to say that we have two nominations for Church Warden for this year.
- We welcome Martin Simmons and Vicki Nath back as Church Wardens. Thanks were given to both Vicki and Martin for all their hard work last year – they completed numerous projects and their work was greatly appreciated.
- Vicki Nath had been proposed by John Huddlestone and seconded by Rosemary Wheway.
- Martin Simmons had been proposed by Rosemary Wheway and seconded by Claire Sheridan.
- There were no further nominations and they were duly elected.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting

Those present, who are on the electoral roll, were invited to stay for the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

Apologies for Absence

- A list of the names of people giving apologies was read out.

Minutes of Meeting held 26th March 2014

- The minutes of last year's Annual Parochial Church Meeting had been circulated with the Annual Report. The minutes were proposed by Martin Simmons and seconded by Dorothy Wood. All agreed.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

- There were no matters arising.

Electoral Roll Report

- Alison Lambert reported that following the revision of the roll for 2015, which closed on 1st March 2015 the number on roll is 288, which is a net increase of 1 for the year. This net increase is due to 8 new applications being accepted and 7 names being removed from the list.
- There are still a significant number of church members who are not on the Roll, particularly younger members. Applications for enrolment can be accepted after the conclusion of the Annual Meeting and throughout the year not just at the Annual Revision.
- Thanks were expressed to Alison for her work on the Electoral Roll.
- The Vicar advised that 11 people who were associated with church have died during the last year and to consider that we have lost all these people and to have still increased the electoral roll is excellent

Presentation of the Annual Report for 2014

- The Annual Report for 2014 has been published and distributed in several formats. Thanks were given to all those who have contributed their written words to the Annual Report and also for all the work that they carry out voluntarily during the year to make Christ Church such a successful church.
- Formal adoption of the report was proposed by Peter Titchmarsh and seconded by Helen Dickinson and agreed by all present.

Financial Report & Presentation of the Audited Accounts for year ending 31st December 2014

- Ken Taylor presented the financial report for the year ending 31st December 2014 – full details of the income and expenditure are available in the Annual Report.

- The Giving in Grace programme was successful but, as this did not start as early as planned, it had a knock on effect in respect of the level of income received.
- Reserves are now £35,235 and have reduced to the same level as in 2010 – being 3.2 months expenditure.
- Ken gave a brief overview of the budget for 2015-2016 which forecasts a surplus of £2,000.
- Ken made comment on the success of The Giving in Grace programme
 - à 238 letters were sent out to members of our congregation
 - à 85% response was received
 - à An additional £1,806 was pledged per month
 - à Planned giving has increased by nearly 30%
 - à The knock-on effect has been more standing orders, more people gift aiding and more legacies.
- The finances were proposed by Rosemary Wheway, seconded by Margaret Herriman and all were in favour.
- Ken expressed his sincere thanks to the Sidespeople, Helen Dickinson, Robin Harmar, Sheila Levett and Jean Goat who all help him to keep the money in order.
- An idea mentioned at last year's APCM was to sign up for the Easy Fundraising scheme (www.easyfundraising.org.uk), where donations are given to the charity of your choice each time you shop on line. 23 people have signed up to this scheme and £130 has been collected.
- The Vicar said a very big thank you to Ken Taylor for all his work on the accounts – it is an extremely big job and he does it so cheerfully.

The Vicar's Comments

- The Vicar gave his report for the past year focusing on thanking all those who contribute to the life of the church helping to fulfil the vision of 'Generous churches making and nurturing disciples'
- Each person present was asked to stand to show how much they contribute - all stood several times illustrating that everyone helps in so many ways within church and not one is more important than the other – all are valuable
- Christ Church could not be such a vibrant and lively church without all contributions and the Vicar thanked everyone

Election of members to the Church Council – 4 vacancies

- The term of office for Ken Bellamy, Vicky Gawthorpe and Caroline Legg had come to the end of three years. Ken and Vicky have indicated that they no longer wishes to stand again.
- The Vicar thanked Ken who has been a member of the PCC for over 17 years, including years as Vice Chairman – he has been a brilliant source of wisdom and common sense and the 'best Churchwarden we never had'

- A nomination had been received for Caroline Legg and was duly elected onto the PCC
- There remains three vacancies on the PCC

Election of members to the Deanery Synod – 1 vacancy

- There remains one vacancy on the Deanery Synod.

Appointment of Sidesmen/Sideswomen

- Vicki Nath has stood down and Eleanor Batch is a new addition to the regular sidespeople

Appointment of Independent Examiners

- Ken Taylor proposed S.V. Bye be appointed as our Independent Examiners.
- This was seconded by Geoff Jaques and all agreed.

Rosemary Wheway expressed the thoughts of all present when she thanked Paul for his enthusiasm and energy last year and expressed her confidence that his vision for the future will ensure the continued success of our church.

As usual, Paul has steered us successfully to ensure that, not only our own lives are fulfilled, but we have supported others in our own village and throughout the Diocese and overseas.

Stokesley Deanery Synod

In 2015 the Parish continued to be represented by Nick Land, Rob Pepper and Rosemary Wheway. There is one vacancy. The clergy and readers also attend.

There were three meetings in 2015 in various venues. Each meeting began with an informative talk and any member of the congregation can attend the talk and stay as an observer for the business meeting. In February, Ven David Butterfield, Archdeacon for Generous Giving and Stewardship came to inspire us but we had recently completed our campaign and were able to help others. In June, the topic was about helping those with Autism in our churches. In October, Very Revd Vivienne Faull, Dean of York Minster spoke on the purpose of the Minster, recent changes and the Strategic Plan which will run from 2015 to 2020.

Each year the Deanery organises four Lent services. In 2015 these were held in Stokesley Parish Church and had four excellent speakers :- the Bishop of Whitby, Revd Sue Sheriff, Revd Canon Angela Bailey and Revd Dr Gavin Wakefield. Each session ended with a short act of worship.

CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT

The congregation can be reassured that the church silver and other items of value continue to be safe and records continue to be updated and kept securely.

During 2015, not only have regular maintenance issues been addressed but we were delighted to be successful in our historic organ certificate application and in our Heritage Lottery Grant application. We have been granted £91,100 for the restoration of our Binns organ and installation of multimedia equipment. The projector and screen are now installed and in use and during 2016, the organ will be restored in conjunction with a series of



concerts and organ workshops for the community in the coming years. Work is underway to explore further the history of village people connected with the organ with the hope of involving descendants in the future. The tubular bells are back in situ and continue to be rung by a group of young people for regular services and weddings. New heaters have been installed in the Hall as well as repairs and redecoration there. Due to the high winds and rain over Christmas work is now needed both to the Chancel and coffee lounge roofs but is in hand.

It is encouraging to see a variety of services in our church with the successful Little Fishes, Come and Praise and Church Parades as well as Who Let The Dads Out and a Family Fun Day for the younger families and adults. The Bishop of Whitby came in November to take our confirmation service, when 12 young people and adults were confirmed, followed by a party in the Hall. Regular Sunday and Wednesday services are still well attended with welcoming congregations. One highlight of our year has to be our midnight mass service on Christmas Eve which was taken by Archbishop Sentamu to the delight of all who attended.


We were pleased to welcome our new organist and choirmaster Michael Aisbitt this year and also welcomed Rosemary Wheway as a new pastoral assistant now that she has completed her 'recognised parish assistant' course. She is now being followed by several other members of the congregation on the course.

Financial Report 2015

Financially, 2015 was another busy year with over £400,000 going through the church books in the 12 months to end December!



This was the first full year since the end of the **Giving in Grace** programme and I am pleased to say that our planned giving increased by a further 16% compared to the previous year. On a sadder note, we lost a number of our regular givers through bereavement but fortunately some newer members were welcomed to the giving roll. Overall we had a surplus of £4,634 on our unrestricted funds which partly compensated for the shortfall last year. This allowed us to increase our reserves from £35,235 to £39,869 which is back to our target level of 4 months operating costs.

Unrestricted income increased from £117,519 last year to £141,004. In addition to the higher levels of planned giving, we also saw encouraging increases in the general level of donations and fee income. We again took full advantage of the Gift Aided Small Donations Scheme (GASDS) which allows us to collect an additional £1,250 in tax rebates – a change in HMRC rules this year means that we will now be able to recover up to £2,000 from “loose plate” donations.

Unrestricted expenditure increased slightly from £133,810 in 2014 to £136,420 this year. We were able to increase our contribution to the Diocesan Common Fund to £84,000 while keeping our other operating costs generally in line with the budget. We carried out several necessary repair/refurbishment projects during the year, namely, electrical inspection and testing (£1,488), installation of new heating and lighting switches (£1,489) and plaster repairs/re-decoration in several parts of the church (£1,728). Thanks to a generous gift from Mr R Blunsom, we were able to carry out a full refurbishment of the tubular bells. The plinth carpet suffered damage during the erection of the new screen but was replaced following a claim on the contractor’s insurance.

We were fortunate to secure two major grants to support projects in our church. The Heritage Lottery Fund awarded us £91,000 to carry out a much-needed major restoration on the organ and also provide an audio-visual system which has already enhanced several of our services and public presentations. Awards for All provided us with a grant of £9,800 for carrying out a feasibility study into the potential refurbishment of the Church Hall and Coffee Lounge.

We donated over £9,000 to mission giving from general funds. Following recommendations from members of the PCC, we identified several new

beneficiaries this year: Open Door North East (helping asylum seekers) UCCF (student Christian unions), Mary's Meals (providing meals to starving children) and Anglican International Development (working with people devastated by conflict) We also assisted two of our young members on overseas projects.

This year we donated collections from baptisms to three children's charities- Zoe's Place, Daisy Chain and CLIC Sargent- the choice of charity being made by the parents. We were pleased to welcome the nationally-acclaimed folk singer, Yvonne Lyon who not only gave us an excellent evening of music but helped us raise over £1,000 for Daisy Chain, the Teesside-based charity which supports young people with autism.

During the year we ran three major appeals. Our Lent appeal focused on the plight of those suffering from the earthquakes in Nepal while, at harvest, we supported Together Middlesbrough and the Middlesbrough Food Bank. For our Christmas appeal we again supported School Aid India. Its founder, Helen Jones, told us movingly how funds were desperately needed to replace the wooden classroom which had been destroyed by the effects of the earthquakes in the region. The response from the parish was amazing- over £3,880 raised which was a record for any appeal by our church!

Overall, our mission giving from funerals and weddings, special services, appeals, and donations from general funds reached a record total of £36,807, distributed among 49 different charities.

The Church Hall had a satisfactory year with reserves at a relatively healthy level of £3,540 despite the need to replace the two large wall-mounted heaters at a cost of £4,300. Thanks to an enjoyable jazz concert by Anya Faull which raised over £600, the finances of All Saints now look a little healthier.

During the year, we were sorry to lose the services of Sheila Levitt as our gift aid secretary after 16 years service but happily John and Ynez Clarke have stepped seamlessly into this role! Our sincere thanks are due to all three of them. And finally to all those who help to manage the church money- Helen Dickinson, Jean Goat, Robin Harmar and the sidespeople – a huge thank you to you all!

Safeguarding

With the Social Media now being so widely accessible, child protection becomes ever more important. So, we as a Church seek to cover as many aspects of protection as possible.

Checking everyone through the DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) System is our main safeguard when appointing new (or re-electing existing) people working for the Church, either voluntary or paid.

Fortunately my job so far has only involved distributing and checking DBS forms and sending them to York for police checks and then on to the Diocese of York database.

If any aspect of child abuse is suspected or reported to a member of the Church clergy or to me there is a protocol to follow and emergency phone numbers are available at the back of the Church in the Child Protection Policy file.

All Saints Church

A positive year for All Saints in most respects. Although we were again operating with fewer guides, the coverage of duties improved, which helped swell visitor numbers to more than 1200, over 20% up on 2014 but still well short of the halcyon years of 2002/03 when over 2000 visitors were recorded. No room for complacency then.



On a balmy June evening All Saints enjoyed a folk/jazz concert by The Anya Faull Trio from Leeds, who played to a packed church and helped raise over £600 towards church funds. Other donations to the church also saw an increase and so for the first time in a while the bank balance was up.

Sadly we lost the old overhanging beech tree from the vicarage garden. This had become dangerous and so was felled. However, on the plus side it opened up a marvellous new vista to Christ Church (see photo).



After almost twenty years of sterling service as the organizer of the guides rota Ray Huddleston is stepping down from the role, though will continue as a guide. A big thanks to Ray for his unstinting efforts on behalf of the church. He is in the process of handing over to Charles Jeans.

No major events are planned for this year, though I am looking into the possibility of some static exhibits in the church to coincide with the Somme centenary in July. As usual other ideas are most welcome.

Once again a massive thank you to all those who contribute to the continuation of the All Saints story – guides, brass and church cleaners flower arrangers, and all those who ensure the smooth running of christening and commemorative services still held in the church, amongst others.

In 2015 All Saints continued to provide unexpected rewards and surprises for us all – a group of cyclists giving an impromptu concert, a family of weasels seen in the churchyard, a jackdaw trapped in the church, a visit from some Japanese businessmen on a cold wet day – and I'm sure 2016 will give us more joy.

Christ Church Visitors

We have had another successful year with the addition of two new Visitors replacing two others keeping the total at 19. This has made it possible for us to visit 30 people on a regular basis and, we hope, make a difference to their lives and spiritual growth. There are more housebound and/or elderly people in our parish who would benefit from this service so more volunteers are always welcome. Some Visitors have also made contact with people for a short time, for instance following a stay in hospital, until someone is able to return to church.

We continue to meet regularly with the clergy so that they can monitor our visits and we review our guidelines annually. We will continue to meet the training needs of those who visit.



Our aim is to visit anyone in the village in need – the housebound, lonely, sick and infirm – but this does not exclusively mean those who were regular churchgoers. We visit people mostly in their own homes but several of those visited eventually move out of the village to Care Homes and our Visitors travel as far as Catterick as well as Stokesley, Middlesbrough and Guisborough to stay in touch. They also visit hospitals if this is appropriate. The group supports the monthly and Christmas Hollygarth services and also transports some of the people who would otherwise be unable to attend. These are open to **anyone** who appreciates a weekday afternoon service- not just the residents of Hollygarth.

In 2015 we hosted our fourth Praise and Party service followed by tea in the Hall. This attracted many for whom the 9.15 service is just too early. The total attending included 17 people personally invited, of whom 2 were in wheelchairs. Everyone appreciated both the “praise” and “party” and we hope to host a similar event in 2015. We took a selection of food after the party to 13 who were unable to attend. This was warmly welcomed.

We continue to deliver cards on the first anniversary of a bereavement and also a Welcome Pack whenever we see a removal van in the village. These are very rewarding tasks and we would welcome more Visitors so that we can extend our visits to more people. Please tell us if you know someone who would like a visit or you have new neighbours but more importantly **join us if you can!**

Prayer

An integral part of the life of our church but until now not specifically recorded in the Annual Report. However when **Giving in Grace** was launched in the Autumn of 2014, it was supported by *prayer for future outreach and spiritual growth at Christ Church*. Spiritual growth included the intention to *give our prayer life more focus*. Our church building provides many with quiet space for individual prayer and services are well attended but during the past year more occasions specifically to share prayer time together have been made available. Before the Memory Tree was dismantled after Christmas, Paul led a short time of prayer and reflection together. During the week of prayer for Christian Unity a prayer station was set up in church with daily readings and prayers for people to take away to reflect on at home. In Lent a different location and a different prayer focus was chosen each week for meetings together. Prayers were provided for use during the week of the General Election and there were three prayer meeting times in church on polling day. In June our 9.15 am Intercessors gathered, with others who were interested in coming, for an iPET morning - Prayer/Encouragement/Training together, and later in the year an evening meeting in the coffee lounge.

The Contemplative Prayer Group continues to meet weekly and would welcome any newcomers. They have organised meditation mornings led by Father Kevin from Ampleforth and Revd. Nicholas Buxton from Newcastle during the year – both of which were very well attended. A Wydale Renewal Day had a good review from two people who went from Christ Church; we hope that more will be encouraged



to try the next one this spring. **Let's Pray Together** was a weekly prayer time in Advent when people prayed together in the coffee lounge or alongside us at home. When Archbishop Sentamu visited here during his pilgrimage of Prayer, Witness and Blessing, he passed on to us a simple pattern of prayer which he is teaching to everyone as he journeys on throughout the Diocese to help focus attention on prayer. **Let's Pray Together** at present, is a weekly, open prayer time, using his prayer pattern.

Our prayer for the coming year is that there will be many other opportunities to help us to deepen our prayer lives together.

Bible Study Group

Little Fishes

What a growth rate we have experienced in five years! Currently our numbers average 26 Little Fishes and 30 carers/mums. That means lots of participation in the service and hectic times in the Coffee Lounge for refreshments and play. Middlesbrough Food Bank

Our monthly contributions to Middlesbrough Food Bank have continued throughout the year. The collections from our Church and the Quaker Meeting are very generous and often fill the boots of two cars! We have sent £206 which is much appreciated as it helps to fund transport costs from the St. Cuthbert's Church depot out to the five distribution centres across the town.

The Food Bank has helped 2500 people across the town during this last year. The 'Cut the cost of Cooking' courses have given out 180 slow cookers and have a further 80 left for future needs.



As the cookers use less electricity they are a great help to families trying to reduce household costs.

Last September six members from our Church attended an Open Day at the depot and enjoyed an excellent light buffet. This was an opportunity to say thank you and goodbye to Nigel Perrott who helped to set up the organisation back in 2012. His good work is now being continued by Soroush who has much experience of working with asylum seekers and refugees.

Nationally Trussell Trust has helped over 1,084,604 people of whom 396,997 were children over this last year.

Almost 40% of clients experienced benefit delays and changes to benefits also were causing difficulties. It is hoped that Government agencies recognise these problems and seek to overcome them.

Recent job losses across Teesside will mean that there will be an even greater uptake of the Food Bank provisions.

Please accept a sincere 'Thank you' from the staff and all those who benefit from your continued generosity.

Marwood Church of England Voluntary Controlled Infant School

Marwood continues to maintain its outstanding level of provision. A recent review of the school by the Local Authority has highlighted that “outcomes are outstanding and high standards of attainment and progress have been sustained over time. Teaching is outstanding and results in Literacy and Mathematics are well above the national average.”

2015 has been a very busy and exciting year for the staff and children at Marwood School in so many ways.

In February 10 chicken eggs were delivered along with a hatchery just in time for an Easter clutch. The children experienced, first hand, chicks hatching in class and lots of excitement ensued over naming them (Dora, Honey and Beaky). A hen house has since been constructed and the children share responsibilities for their care throughout the school year.



More extensive works followed in the summer months when work began on the conversion of existing building space into a bright and airy extension to the Year 1 classroom. This has provided separate teaching accommodation for Year 1 and new opportunities for different learning activities.

The Spiritual Garden has been enhanced with beautifully decorated plaques made by the pupils as part of work focused on embedding our core values of Love, Friendship and Forgiveness into school life.

In October, the school was delighted to welcome the Bishop of Whitby. The children thoroughly enjoyed his collective worship, in which Bishop Paul talked about Jesus as a good shepherd and the significance of the bishop's crook. Afterwards, the children presented him with an egg from one of the Marwood chickens. His letter of thanks, reports it made a very good scrambled egg tea!

Each month Marwood School, along with parents and friends, is invited into Christ Church for worship with the Vicar. The baptism of Jill Lily (our Marwood baby doll) and our very own Marwood wedding provide the children with a unique opportunity to experience special church services in a child friendly context and are enjoyed immensely by all the children. In addition, pupils and parents are encouraged to attend services in the church calendar such as Love in a Box, Christingle and Sunday school; these services are very well supported. The school supports many charities over the school year including Macmillan, Marie Curie, Save the Children and The Royal British Legion as well as other local charities such as Middlesbrough Food Bank. In addition, over the years it has forged strong links with a school in Sri Lanka with which it communicates regularly.

Marwood promotes strong Christian values in all aspects of its undertaking and it sees the promotion of its distinctive Christian ethos as central to its mission of providing the best possible education and care.

Many thanks are given to the very dedicated team of staff who inspire and nurture the children in their learning; also to Reverend Peverell for his much-valued contribution of time and spiritual guidance and to the very supportive parent body, governors and helpers at Marwood.

The Hall committee has been pondering for sometime now on how to go about tackling some much needed improvements and modernisation, especially in and around the coffee lounge, which has remained much as it was, since it was built in 1972. Through the hard work of our Treasurer, Ken, we succeeded in obtaining a grant of £9800 from the national lottery. Funding was obtained to undertake a 'feasibility study' into ways in which the hall and coffee lounge could be improved for the benefit of all. With the enthusiastic and professional help of DKS Architects of Stokesley this study has nearly completed it's undertakings. Findings will be presented to the PCC in early February, so watch this space for further developments!

One of the aims for 2015 was to repair the sloping serving hatch between the coffee lounge and the hall. Money was earmarked for the work to be done but unfortunately first one and then the other heater in the hall failed. £4000 was what it cost to have them replaced, this took away all our resources, but looking on the bright side we now have two new heaters in the hall and we hope to tackle the subsidence issue, under the serving hatch, this coming summer.

Finally can I thank all the users of the hall, both those who use it regularly and those who come on a one off basis. Without your continued support we would not be able to run the hall as we strive to do so, thank you all so very much.

Service of Thanksgiving In October Christ Church once again hosted the National Service of Thanksgiving for Children in Distress and we were presented with a lovely icon as a Thank You.



Final Service January saw the final service for our Mothers Union Branch, followed by a farewell party in the Church Hall. Some things come to the end of their natural life, and it is important to be able to hand them over with gratitude so energies are released for new ventures. We are grateful for all that the Mothers Union did for us.



Christenings Last year we did 35 baptisms or Christenings at Christ Church. These usually happen after the 9.15am Service due to the large number of guests, but we did have some within our service last year. My thanks to fellow clergy Geoff and Jon, and to the faithful team of sidespeople who come voluntarily to give a welcome. All the children receive Baptism Anniversary cards & letters organised by Vicki Nath.


Media Matters

The Scout Group continues to thrive, with five units enjoying the use of our Scout Hut most weekday nights.

We currently have 73 young members, 12 warranted leaders and a large number of registered adult helpers. Due to lower numbers coming through to the Scout Section, the decision was taken towards the end of the year to reduce the number of Scout Troops from two to one. As higher numbers come through again from Beavers and Cubs, a second Scout Troop will again be opened.

Beaver numbers are very high with a current waiting list of 15 young people of Beaver age. If additional adult leaders could be found, we would like to open a second Beaver Colony.

2015 also saw the acquisition of a replacement minibus, provided by Parents and Supporters. Our minibus is seen as an extremely valuable asset to the group – greatly expanding the scope of our activities.

At Beavers, we aim to make learning and experiencing the world around us fun. All year round we try to get outside as often as possible, although the very wet December and January have made that difficult this year.

Scout Troop

A number of key awards have been made during the year. Of note were the Wood Badges – awarded for completion of Leadership Training - to two of the leadership team, Tony 'Baloo' Dawson and Mark 'Hathi' Stowell. Chief Scout Gold awards were presented to James Jewitt, Jack Vernon, Sam Levett, Joe Jones, Alec Lee, Elise Dawson, Tom Jackson, Thomas Laskey and Isaac Weyell.

The troop made a number of trips out from the Scout Hut during the year to various local locations. A visit to the RNLI in Redcar showed more interest in the new Tractor unit that cost £250K and can drive in water up to its roof, than the new rescue boat - all purchased with donations from the public! We have cooked on the beach at Marske where the dead seabird was avoided for more tasty sausages, fish, and chocolate and marshmallow treats. Cooking in the middle of the woods proved a challenge as most of the wood was damp. The skills of fire lighting using available materials in these environments will be a skill to treasure for life. As well as food, the importance of shelters has been demonstrated and shelters were built in the woods with an abundance of fern material for the roofing and sleeping area collected.

The Summer camps were enjoyed at Great Tower Scout Activity Centre in the Lake District. A number of adventurous activities were enjoyed, including the 'Leap of Faith' which meant we all faced our fears 10 metres up a tree on a small platform jumping out to catch (or not in many cases) a wooden baton and trusting ourselves to the rope and harness to support us. The campfires burnt well each night and all food was prepared well by the Scouts (though the washing up could do with some improvement). A group who went through our camp (now named as Ayton Ridge) was later rewarded with a swap of neckers and badges by two of our keen Scouts who returned to camp carrying their swapped trophies with great pride. We agreed that for all future camps we would seek to obtain one other group's necker in exchange for a Great Ayton one.



We also worked with the local Middlesbrough Scouts and utilized the facilities they have in order to have a night of air rifle shooting as well as a night of archery.

Extending the reach of the Scouts into the local community lead to around 50 sacks of leaves cleared from the churchyard over a weekend, these are all gently now rotting down to be used as a growing mulch.

The Church also lent us equipment and premises for JOTI (Jamboree on the Internet) where we contacted by facetime, text, and email different Scout groups from around 70 different countries. This is the third year we have held this in the Church and its popularity is growing. Over the weekend (8 am to 8 pm Saturday and Sunday) we do invite all Scouting members, their families and friends to be a part of this Global event.
