## HARVEST TIME

Ask many children today where milk comes from, and it is likely that many will say “from the supermarket”. The idea of this white liquid coming from a cow is quite alien to many of our urban population who have become disconnected from the countryside.

When I first went to Saint Martin’s in Middlesbrough, there were several butchers on Acklam Road, so it was obvious where your meat came from as you saw it hanging up in the shop. Today they are gone and meat comes to us ready packaged in polystyrene trays in the Supermarket. Instead of Butchers, the road is now filled with Fast Food Shops.

The sad consequence of all this is a growing disconnect with the Countryside, that fails to appreciate just what our farmers do for us and how reliant we are on them. Because of the global markets that operate today, it could be claimed that our farmers have never been less appreciated in our own country. We pay a pittance for milk whilst dairy farmers go out of business, but then we complain that the countryside isn't full of pretty cows and those farmers want to develop their land. How dare they! But you can't live off fresh air.

Harvest comes to us from the time of the book of Deuteronomy in the Old Testament, where certain Harvests were remembered at different times of the year when they came in ie. The grain and the grape harvests. If the Harvest was plentiful it was a time of rejoicing. If not, belts were tightened, but it made you realise your interdependence with the land and not take things for granted.

In our Country, Harvest Services have usually occurred in Churches in October time, as we see the fields cleared of their crops. It is a time for us to say thank you for all who produce the food for our tables, and to remember those less fortunate.

Don't take what we have for granted. Make a special effort to come to one of our Harvest Services. We will celebrate it at Christ Church on Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> October at 8am, 9.15am and 11am and invite people to bring a contribution for the Middlesbrough Foodbank. At Saint Oswald's we follow the old practice of an evening Harvest Service and Supper, and this is on Friday 14<sup>th</sup> October at 7.30pm in Church. The collection will go to a farming charity, and contributions to the Faith Supper are welcome. Hope to see you.

# Deanery News

**Retirement** Revd Pam Sanders from the Hutton Rudby, Kirklevington, Worsall and Crathorne Group of Parishes has announced her retirement. She will step down on 31<sup>st</sup> January next year, and is moving to Orkney - which is even more remote than Middleton! We wish her well.

**Saint Mary's Nunthorpe** are celebrating 90 years since the building of the Church on the weekend Friday 30<sup>th</sup> September to Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> October. The Church will be open on the Saturday for a Coffee Morning 10 - 12noon with a display of the history of the Church, together with Harvest flowers. At 2pm there will be a special Songs of Praise Service followed by Afternoon Tea. They celebrate their Harvest on Sunday at 10am in Church.



Their Vicar is off on long term sick leave, so well done Saint Mary's in organising this celebratory weekend. Many years ago, Nunthorpe used to be a daughter Church to this Parish.

**Changes to Deaneries** There is a consultation going on at present to see how Deaneries can be more efficient and supportive. A Deanery is the name given to a group of Parishes that work together. We are in Stokesley Deanery which takes in Swainby, Faceby, Carlton, Bilsdale, Kildale, Ingleby Greenhow, Kirkby, Stokesley, Seamer, Hilton, Hutton Rudby, Crathorne, Kirklevington, Worsall, Yarm, Ingleby Barwick, Stainton, Brookfield, Hemlington, Nunthorpe, Great Ayton and Newton under Roseberry (and a few smaller places too).

The elephant in the room at the moment, is that if present trends of giving and income continue, we are unlikely to be able to afford the same number of Stipendiary clergy as we have at the moment. Even if we could, there is likely to be a shortfall as many are approaching retirement. How do we continue to witness and worship as a Church? Can we use this opportunity to grow in new ways as we work more closely across boundaries?

As part of this process, Paul Hutchinson, the Rector of Stokesley, and myself have decided to make stronger links between our parishes to support one another. On several Sundays a year we will swap Churches so that you may get to know him, and the folk of Stokesley and Seamer will see me. This will take place the first time on Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> October when the Pauls will swap Churches..

## A Drop becomes a Deluge

The only miracle recorded in all four Gospels is the feeding of the five thousand. Remember the story? Jesus, after preaching to the crowd, decides to have dinner with them. Biblical scholars put the number beyond five thousand as in that day women and children were not counted in totals like that. The disciples are told by Jesus to feed the crowd. The disciples objected that it would be impossible to feed so many people. Andrew spoke up and said, “Here is a boy with five small barley loaves and two small fish, but how far will they go among so many?” John 6: 8

Amazingly Jesus had everyone sit down to supper and took the small offering given by the boy and started passing out the food. Miraculously the Scripture says that, “When they all had enough to eat... they gathered up twelve baskets of food.” All this from one little boy’s offering! What made the boy’s gift worth so much? It was given willingly and sacrificially. A gift given in faith will always be multiplied by God to achieve His purposes. It was not the little boy’s responsibility to worry about how everyone would be fed. It was only his responsibility to willingly offer what he had to Jesus.

We all share in the responsibility for maintaining the life of our Church. If all people offer something, however small, great things can be achieved. It is even better when people commit themselves regularly to give, for then even when they have a Sunday off they are still supporting the Church. If you just give when you attend your support may turn out to be pretty mean if you don’t come every week, and most people are more generous than that.

It is best to set aside an amount each week that you want to give to the Church, and then to give it either by Bankers Order or at Christ Church by using the weekly offering envelopes, where you get an envelope for each week of the year and bring them all when you come. Our Churches need this support for we don’t receive any central funds and are rightly expected to support poorer parishes.



## CHARITIES WE SUPPORT

### UCCF: THE CHRISTIAN UNIONS

Christian Unions (CU's) are mission teams that operate at the heart of university and college campuses to give every student in Great Britain an opportunity to hear and respond to the gospel of Jesus Christ. These CU's are led by students and are resourced and supported by paid Staff Workers and Relay workers from UCCF. They work in cooperation with local churches.

Amongst the achievements last year were:

- 46,000 students at CU mission weeks
- 30,000 students at CU carol services.
- 9000 students attended fresher week events put on by the CU's.
- 860 seekers attended mission follow up courses.
- 70,000 specially prepared 'Uncover John Gospels' distributed.
- 105,000 visits every month to Bethinking.org, a fantastic Christian resource website provided by UCCF.

At our last Parish Wyedale weekend we used the UCCF produced material 'Uncover Luke's Gospel' , and we have our sights on the latest 'Uncover John's Gospel' for the next one.

Last year UCCF had an income of some £5M of which £305,000 was donated by churches, including £1000 from Christ Church. The proportion of income spent on fundraising and governance was 6%.

When our young adults leave home and head off to universities and colleges, it is reassuring to know that there is a Christian support framework in place that speaks their language, and where they can hear the gospel compellingly explained and attractively lived out.
