

Meeting of Parishioners

The Vicar welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Election of Churchwardens

- The election of the Churchwardens is open to any parishioner living in Great Ayton and they are eligible to vote even if they are not on the electoral roll.
- Churchwardens are elected on an annual basis and we are pleased to say that we have received two nominations for Churchwarden for this year.
- Both Margaret Vicki Nath and Robert Pepper were nominated by Martin Simmons and seconded by Alison Lambert and the Vicar is delighted to declare that there were no further nominations and they were both duly elected.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting

Those present, who are on the electoral roll, were invited to stay for the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

Apologies for Absence

- A list of the names of people giving apologies was read out.

Minutes of Meeting held 16th March 2016

- The minutes of last year's Annual Parochial Church Meeting had been circulated with the Annual Report.
- The minutes were proposed by Christine Smailes and seconded by Pauline Titchmarsh. All agreed.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

- There were no matters arising.

Electoral Roll Report as at 1st March 2017

- Alison Lambert advised that the Electoral Roll at the Annual Parochial Meeting in 2016 stood at 292. Following the revision of the roll for 2017, which closed on 26th February, the number appearing on the Roll is now 289 a net decrease of 3 for the year. This is due to 7 new applications being accepted and 10 names being removed from the list (5 deaths and 5 who are no longer eligible to be on the roll).
- There are still a significant number of Church members who are not on the Roll, particularly younger members.
- Applications for enrolment can be accepted after the conclusion of the Annual Meeting and throughout the year not just at the Annual Revision.

Presentation of the Annual Report for 2016

- The Annual Report for 2016 has been published and distributed in several formats.
- There is a tremendous amount of work that goes on in the church and thanks were given to all those who have contributed their written words to the Annual Report and for all the work that they carry out voluntarily during the year to make Christ Church such a successful Church.
- Formal adoption of the report was proposed by Geoff Jaques, seconded by Helen Dickinson and agreed by all present.

Financial Report & Presentation of the Audited Accounts for year ending 31st December 2016

- Ken Taylor presented the financial report for the year ending 31st December 2016 – full details of the income and expenditure are available in the Annual Report.
- Highlights of the year were the Heritage Lottery Fund grant that was received and largely spent during the year and the grant received for Feasibility Study for the Church Hall.
- Generous donations were received to pay for a new organ blower that was deemed necessary following the restoration of the organ.
- Charitable giving has reached a record number of recipients.
- Income and expenditure in respect of the church's General Fund were virtually balanced (there was an in-year deficit of £375).
- Income into the General Fund reached £141,056 as a result of a high level of donations, grants and legacies received.
- Expenditure from the General Fund of £141,431 included our Freewill Offering to the Diocese of £86,040, ministry expenses, maintenance and running costs, mission giving, salaries and administration and miscellaneous expenditure.

- Our reserves are £39,494 which equates to approximately 3-4 months operating costs.
- Fabric expenditure has included repairs to the storm damaged roof (net of insurance claim), re-pointing of the stonework and renewal of the drains by the bell tower, replacement of the organ blower, additional work to protect the organ and the removal of the hedge and dead tree in the grounds.
- Details of the organ restoration project were given showing a breakdown of expenditure.
- Details of expenditure of restricted funds were given – this expenditure was in respect of All Saints Church, the Church Hall, major projects and miscellaneous funds/agency funds.
- £36,807 was distributed to 60 charities throughout the year.
- It was highlighted that there was no mention of the significant amount of food donated to The Foodbank in the charity donations – although it was confirmed that cash contributions donated to The Foodbank are mentioned in the 56 charities supported. It was agreed that it would be useful to write a paragraph in the Annual Report to acknowledge the significant value of the food contributions – thanks were given to Dorothy and Gordon Wood for coordinating the collection of food for the Foodbank and thanks to all those who have contributed so significantly.
- Details of the Budget for 2017-2018 were given:
- Income is budgeted as £136,000. There are 179 members of the planned giving schemes, including 144 who gift aid.
- Expenditure is balanced at £136,000 to include a Freewill Offering to the Diocese of £88,200 (an increase of approximately 2%) – we are one of the biggest givers in the diocese (possibly 5th or 6th as a benefice).
- The PCC agreed at their last meeting that this budget be submitted for approval at this Annual meeting.
- The Budget was proposed by Robin Harmar, seconded by John Dickinson and agreed by all.
- Ken thanked Helen Dickinson, Ynez and John Clarke, Jean Goat, Robin Harmar and all the Sidespeople for helping to look after the money.
- The Vicar said a very big thank you to Ken Taylor for all his work on the accounts – he is a very efficient treasurer and carries out his role in what appears to be an effortless manner ! Thanks to Ken and his team who help him.

The Vicar's Comments

- The Vicar was pleased to report that the church is still a significant part of people's lives - particularly at important occasions. He advised that, in the last year, there had been: **22 christenings** in Christ Church – thanks were expressed to the team who support the baptism ministry – clergy, sidesmen and anniversary card distributor.

- **17 weddings** – we had our highest year in living memory, with a further 23 weddings at Newton and a blessing at Angrove Park. Thanks were expressed to the wedding team of vergers and musicians.
- **44 funerals** – Christ Church bucked the trend with people still using the church to mark these occasions. There is an excellent team in the village, both inside Church and with Funeral directors, florists and funeral teas.
- Attendance figures are fairly steady
- £774,000 has been received in the Diocese from fee income from Weddings and Funerals, with Stokesley Deanery contributing £55,689 (7.2%) of this and Christ Church and Newton accounting for 25% of the Deanery total.
- Those who ran all the different groups associated with Church were thanked: Little Fishes, Sunday School, WLTD?, Come & Praise, and the Church Visitors. We also had Workshops, Charity Auctions WWI Anniversaries and Coffee Mornings. The support each month for Middlesbrough Foodbank was commendable and thanks were expressed to Gordon and Dorothy Wood for organising and encouraging it.
- Church reaches out to others in many ways, including appeals and our giving to many charities and causes. The Christmas Appeal for Roseberry School in Darjeeling broke all records, and as Christmas 2017 will be our 25th Annual Appeal, the Vicar is hopeful we will do even better this year!.
- We reach out to the community through Spire, the Website and social media
- The organ has been successfully restored and returned. Thanks so very much to Martin and Vicki and the team who led this successful project.
- Margaret Lewis has celebrated 25 years as a Reader - all in this parish – she received a certificate from the Archbishop in York Minster in November 2016.
- David Rowland has retired after 50 years of polishing the brass at Christ Church (amongst other things!).
- On 6th January 2017 the Vicar was also licensed as priest in charge of Nunthorpe parish for a year to help them through their latest vacancy.
- Other members of the team have also been helping to take services, working across the deanery. This will become more of a feature in the future.
- We are a strong parish in the Deanery and it is important to support other parishes.
- Thanks were expressed to Julie Bourke and her pink laptop for her 10 years as PCC Secretary – she was presented with a bouquet of flowers.
- Thanks were expressed to Martin Simmons for 4 hectic years as Churchwarden – we have seen the organ restored, asbestos removed, diseased trees removed, damp cured in many places, the church pointed, roof repaired and the coffee lounge roof replaced. He has been a welcoming and encouraging presence in church. He is a man of Christian faith and integrity and has been a great asset to our church and a great support as Churchwarden over the last four years.
- The Vicar thanked all the Parish Staff, Church Officers and all mentioned in word or photo who do so much for our Church life.

- Our thoughts and prayers are with Nick Land as he attends a Discernment Day for Reader Ministry on Saturday 18th March.

Election of members to the Church Council – 9 vacancies

- There are 9 vacancies on the PCC – there had been three vacancies during the year and the term of membership ended for Julie Bourke, John Dickinson, Mark Stowell, Ken Taylor and Anna Wilson. Rob Pepper became Churchwarden at this meeting and, as such, his position on the PCC became vacant.
- Readers are nominated and seconded annually.

Ken Taylor proposed Jon Gresham of Baldwins be appointed as our Independent Examiners. This was seconded by Malcolm Race and all agreed.

Questions about Church Matters - Recommendations or Resolutions for consideration by the PCC.

The Vicar thanked all present for their contributions to the meeting and asked members of the PCC to stay for a brief meeting following the APCM.

Martin expressed great thanks to Paul for his enthusiasm, energy and the way he works with people. It was agreed that we are very lucky to have him.

Stokesley Deanery Synod

In 2017 the Parish was represented by Nick Land, John Dickinson and Rosemary Wheway. There is one vacancy. The clergy also attend.



There were three meetings in 2017 held at various venues in the Deanery. Apart from the business of information sharing and financial necessities some meetings begin with an informative talk and any member of the congregation can attend the talk and stay, as an observer, for the business meeting.

In January, Deanery Synod met for an Action Day entitled “Dreaming the Dream”. This was led by Revd Tim Robinson, Rural Dean of North Ryedale and discussed Deanery resources and priorities.

In February we had a business meeting as it was the last meeting of the three year term. Accounts were accepted and it was explained that from the next meeting we would have an Area and Lay Dean heading a Deanery Leadership Team which would have a minimum of six members. This team would work with Synod to produce a Deanery Plan to describe how Mission and Ministry will be developed beyond the level of benefices.

June was the first Synod of the new Triennium and the Area Dean, Revd John Ford, presided at a Eucharist. The new Deanery Leadership Team was announced and feedback was given on the Deanery Action Day, in particular reaching young adults and the work of the Deanery Liturgy Group.

In October we had a presentation led by Jo Bowden on “Why am I so shy about saying I am a Christian” which was followed by group discussions.

Each year the Deanery organises four Lent services. In 2017 these were held in Stokesley Parish Church and had four excellent speakers:- Chief Superintendent Kerrin Wilson, Durham Constabulary, (our own) Nick Land, Revd Sue Greenwood Nunthorpe Methodist Church and Rt Revd Dr John Thompson, Bishop of Selby. The theme was “Faith in the World” and each session ended with a short act of worship.

CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT



The congregation can be reassured that the Church silver and other items of value continue to be kept safely and securely and records continue to be updated.

2017 has been a very busy and challenging year for Paul as he has been responsible for Nunthorpe Parish as well as our own. He has done an excellent job in Great Ayton, Newton under Roseberry and Nunthorpe and we are blessed to have him as our Vicar. I am sure he would agree that the support of his staff has enabled him to take on that role and they have worked very hard and deserve our thanks for all the extra work they have taken on.

We have continued general maintenance to the fabric of Christ Church, All Saints Church and the Church Hall. No new major projects have been undertaken this year and to date no crises have occurred. We hope to look at updating our lighting in Christ Church in the near future.

Our Organ restoration project is still ongoing. The organ is safely back in situ and we are working to complete the project with the 3 year series of concerts and workshops. The aim of these is to introduce both young and old people in the area to organ music of all different genres. 2017 saw concerts ranging from Stops and Strawberries, a family afternoon in church to a Come and Sing Faure's Requiem. Nigel Ogden from Radio 2 also performed earlier in the year to a full Church. Adult and children's workshops run by Professor Baker from Halifax were both successful. Both concerts and workshops will continue and are already arranged for 2018.



On 31st December we welcomed our new organist and choirmaster Ewan Murray who joined us as Michael Aisbitt stepped down from the role. Ewan is young, talented and enthusiastic and I am sure he will be a great addition to Christ Church.

2017 has sadly seen the death of a number of our congregation who over the years have contributed so much to the life of our church in so many different ways. They will all be greatly missed. There is always a large group of people working behind the scenes, the flower ladies, the cleaners and the Sidespeople to mention but a few. They keep the church looking beautiful and the services running smoothly, our unsung heroes who we wish to thank.

Financial Report 2017



2017 was a relatively quiet year financially, dominated in the early months by the completion of the organ restoration project. Overall, our unrestricted reserves fell slightly from £39,494 in 2016 to £38,214 this year. Unrestricted income fell from £144,087 last year to £134,112. There were a number of contributing factors – a fall in one-off donations, no legacies and no fundraising events. Planned giving held up well considering the large number of bereavements we suffered during the year.

Unrestricted expenditure fell from £144,462 in 2016 to £137,495 this year. Maintenance and repair costs were much lower than in recent years following completion of a major repair programme in 2016. However, one source of unplanned expenditure was the decision by

the PCC to support the renovation project for the Church Hall by funding the costs of producing architectural drawings, obtaining planning consents and preparation of tender documents.

The PCC agreed to increase our contribution to the Diocesan Common Fund to £88,200, roughly in line with inflation. Elsewhere our operating costs were generally in line with the budget. We again donated £10,000 to mission giving from general funds. Our recent practice of encouraging recommendations from members of the PCC was continued, and we again supported a number of local, national and international Christian-based charities. As is our practice, collections from baptisms were donated to three children's charities- Zoe's Place, Daisy Chain and CLIC Sargent- the choice of charity being made by the parents.

During the year we ran four major appeals. Our Easter appeal raised £2,669 for the work of Christian Aid in relieving suffering in East Africa following the severe drought. We supported the British Red Cross twice during the year, to help with relief efforts following the London fire and later following the destructive Caribbean hurricane. Our Christmas appeal raised a further £3,183 for School Aid India- its founder, Helen Jones, again gave us a progress report on the work being carried out to complete the building project and to fund the poorest pupils moving on to secondary education in Darjeeling.

Overall, our mission giving from funerals and weddings, special services, appeals, and donations from general funds reached the excellent total of £34,943 distributed among 56 different charities.

Our organ restoration project was completed during the year with the focus moving to community involvement by the Friends of Music group in organising concerts, tutorials and other activities to encourage people of all ages to take an interest in the organ.

The Church Hall had a successful year with reserves increasing to £3,616 - much effort was put into developing the hall renovation project and by the year end applications had been made to two major grant agencies to provide project funding. Following the quinquennial inspection, the finances of All Saints' are becoming precarious as maintenance costs are barely covered by donations from visitors and special services.

Our church has always prided itself in its generosity towards people in need around the world and in supporting the mission of the church in our Diocese. If we are to maintain this tradition, we must find ways of increasing our income. The Giving in Grace programme was well supported when it was launched in 2014 - perhaps now is the time for us all to re-assess what we give to the church?

The management of the church's money is a team effort involving time and commitment by many people- to John & Ynez Clarke, Helen Dickinson, Jean Goat, Robin Harmar and all the Sidespeople – a huge thank you to you all!

All Saints Church



It was another challenging year for All Saints', mainly in the context of a continuing decline in the number of volunteer guides available to open up the church, though ageing and ill health in our demographic group mean that this is no great surprise.

In particular 2017 saw the sad loss of Ray Huddlestone, who as well as being a guide for many years had also organised the rota and helped with many other tasks. Ironically he died just a few months after his friend Eric Boyce, another stalwart of All Saints' over the years. Our thanks and thoughts are with their families and all those who for various reasons have had to give up their duties.



Nevertheless visitor numbers were up on the previous year to nearly 1,400, mainly because of an increase in the number of group visits, especially from local schools. Getting young people interested and involved in the church is a vital part of sustaining the life and well-being of the church and something

in respect of which we probably need to do more. It is a testament to our dedicated guides that we still managed to remain open most of the time and so a special thank you to those who took responsibility for group tours, and kept the church open at weekends.

Fortunately the Quinquennial Inspection came and went without revealing any costly repairs needed to the fabric of the church, though expenditure on the inspection as well as routine items such as insurance means that outgoings again outstripped our modest revenue. I shall be calling a meeting of guides and all those interested in All Saints' sometime in March, mainly to consider the issues of Church opening, guide recruitment, and fund raising.



To end on a positive note: the rewards of being a guide can often be taken for granted but I know from talking to all our volunteers that they are very real and can range from the pleasure of welcoming and talking to visitors from all over the world to the satisfaction of helping someone to discover an old family grave. A

lady from Surrey visited the church in October, explaining that she was researching her ancestors. Imagine her surprise when, after all the ivy was removed, a legible inscription on a headstone revealed that it was the resting place of her great, great, great grandfather's brother, Joseph Brittain, who died in 1855. (See photo above)

For me as Custodian the aura of All Saints is ever present and I only have to see over a hundred people packed into the church for our candlelit Carol Service to know the value of keeping this ancient monument alive.

Introducing David Fox



David has taken over the important role of Safeguarding Officer from Gail. David attends the Sunday morning service and is married with two children. As Safeguarding Officer he cannot work personally with young people. He is dealing with all the applications for DBS check, which are now all done Online, and notifying people of the level of training required. The initial levels are now online, but some people require higher level training delivered by attendance at a course, and David will be in touch with people to advise them.

Christ Church Visitors

We are currently a group of 19 who visit 24 people on a regular basis and, we hope, make a difference to their lives and spiritual growth. There are more housebound and/or elderly people in our parish who would benefit from this service so more volunteers are always welcome. Sometimes we visit for a short time, for instance following a stay in hospital, until someone is able to return to Church.



We continue to meet regularly with the clergy so that they can monitor our visits and we review our guidelines annually. Occasionally we undertake some training and have discussed End of Life Care. We are continuing our plan to become a Dementia Friendly Church and have met with the Sidespeople for further training.

Our aim is to visit anyone in the village in need – the housebound, lonely, sick and infirm – but this does not exclusively mean those who were regular churchgoers. We visit people mostly in their own homes but several of those visited eventually move out of the village to Care Homes and our Visitors travel as far as Catterick as well as Stokesley, Middlesbrough, Eaglescliffe, Northallerton and Guisborough to stay in touch. They also visit hospitals if this is appropriate.

The group supports the monthly and Christmas Coffee Lounge services and also transports some of the people who would otherwise be unable to attend. These are open to **anyone** who appreciates a weekday afternoon service.

PRAYER

“Through our lives and by our prayers your kingdom come”



We are very fortunate at Christ Church that our church building can be open from 9.00am until dusk each day of the week providing a quiet space for prayer/reflection which is well used by individuals. For all who may prefer to pray as part of a group ‘Simple Prayers the Sentamu Way’ is a regular weekly ‘open to all’ prayer time in Church on Friday mornings from 9.45 – 10.15am.

During Lent 2017 a small group of us took the opportunity to take part in a weekly four session prayer course at St Cuthbert’s Church, Marton, organised by Stokesley Deanery.

In the week leading up to Pentecost, in May, our Archbishops Welby and Sentamu called for a global wave of prayer - asking individuals and churches to join together to pray that their friends, families and neighbours might come to know Jesus Christ. Occasions and opportunities were organised in our various Deanery churches so that we could visit each other for prayer/worship together. During that time a weekly cycle of Prayer Walking for all areas of our village began at High Green and has continued weekly street by street since then. Details of this are on the Prayer Board in Christ Church.



Early in October Bishop John Pritchard led a very special morning in the Coffee Lounge. “Will the Real Jesus Please Stand Up” explored many facets of Jesus’ life, in order to help us see more clearly how His life challenges our own lives today.

The Contemplative Prayer Group continues to meet weekly for prayer on Wednesday afternoons. The group organised a prayer morning with Father Kevin from Ampleforth, which took place in Christ Church Coffee Lounge during February and was very well attended. A day at Ampleforth Priory, also led by Father Kevin, was enjoyed by a group of 18 people drawn from each of the churches in Great Ayton on a glorious summer day in June. Reverend Lesley Ashton was invited to guide a quiet morning at the Friends’ Meeting House early in October – again a good attendance.

Imagination and creativity together with use of the screen are helping the ongoing development of enthusiastic and lively prayer times at Little Fishes and Come and Praise.

We give thanks for the group who faithfully lead our Intercessions at 9.15am throughout the year – an integral part of Christ Church’s prayer life – We pray for new people to come forward to be involved in this ministry in the coming year.

Bible Study Group

The Inspector commented that:

- The excellent partnership between church and school is exemplified by the inspirational headteacher and vicar. They are both pivotal in ensuring exemplary leadership at all levels and good governance within this thriving church school.
- This is a welcoming Christian family community with a strong spiritual and moral compass which serves its children and their families. This ensure its young pupils get the best possible foundation for life. As a result, pupils are confident and articulate and thrive, both academically and personally.
- Marwood's Christian vision and values strongly endorses their aims of 'Happy Friends Learning Together' within a spirit of love, forgiveness and friendship. Such values are known and lived out by the entire community
- In this nurturing environment, pupils make good progress and achieve well.

During the Spring and Summer terms Years One and Two took part in Organ workshops, learning about the organ and how it works, listening to it being played and having the opportunity to sing with the organ accompanying them, learning some songs in two parts. This culminated in



a number of the children taking part in the Stops and Strawberries event – sitting in the choir stalls and singing a couple of pieces accompanied by the organ. We are indebted to Phil for completing all the remedial work that arises throughout the year and for undertaking his long term project of upgrading the coffee lounge kitchen. It is a joy to see them all working so well together, thank you so much.

The 200 Club continues to provide valuable funds for the hall, we are indebted to Helen and Julie who run it so expertly and to all of you who contribute to it, thank you all very much for your support. We are indebted to all users of the hall, both regular and one off users. Without your support we would not be able to run this facility for the benefit of our community. Thank you all very, very much. We will always strive to improve the facilities as we see fit, suggestions from you all are always welcome.

The big drive this year has been to work on the renovation project which will upgrade the toilets, kitchen, passageways and create new storage areas. Plans have been drawn up by SPA architects, planning permission for the small amount of external work has been granted by Hambleton District Council and tenders have been returned from the contractors. The work will cost approximately £100,000 and as I write now we have two applications pending for funds with Impetus Environmental Trust and the North York Moors Leader fund. The outcome from both these grant issuing bodies will be known by the end of March. Should we be successful then the work will be undertaken this coming summer. If on the other hand we don't succeed in raising the funds in this way, we are further forward in that we now know what we want to do and the cost of doing it, a step in the right direction.

Finally, can I make a recycling plea to all our users - we do not have any glass recycling facilities so all glass should be taken away for recycling and not dumped in our refuse bins. It only finishes up in landfill sites when put in our bins, which is not the right place for it.

Thank you to you all for your support in 2017, it is very gratefully received.

8am Holy Communion Our Book of Common Prayer Communion early on a Sunday morning attracts 20+ worshippers each week who enjoy this quiet, more reflective service which uses the language of the Book of Common Prayer.

9.15am Parish Communion Our Parish Communion remains the main act of worship still attracting 100+ worshippers each Sunday, and we also welcome in our Sunday School during term time. The Choir are there every week to lead singing and add anthems, and we enjoy a variety of preachers. When the Church Parade joins us we now go to a non Eucharistic Format to make the service shorter so the young people can attend before all the Sunday morning activities begin.

Sunday Specials Although not having a regular Sunday evening service any more, we do enjoy many specials throughout the year including Memorial Services, Songs of Praise, Love in a Box, Christingles and several Carol Services.



Once a year we also host our Praise & Party with a short, lively service in Church followed by afternoon tea, to which the housebound are Guests of Honour.

We also share some Sunday evenings with other Churches in the village for such occasions as Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, Easter, Pentecost.

Christenings/ Baptisms On many Sundays we also have a Christening Service, welcoming the newly baptised into the life of the Church. We tend to do these as standalone services, for the number of guests now attending Christenings can often be 80+ - too many to include in an early Parish Communion. We pass on invitations to all baptism families to Little Fishes, Who Let the Dads Out and Come and Praise. We had 19 Christening in Christ Church or All Saints last year, and my thanks go to the team who support these services and give a welcome.

Weddings These dropped to just 9 at Christ Church in 2017 (and 15 at Saint Oswald's) Its amazing how in just a few years we are disappointed in what would have been an excellent number just a few years ago. Our drop is mainly down to the vicar being unable to attend wedding fairs due to the increased commitments he has had throughout 2017 as Priest in Charge on Nunthorpe. This link ended in February 2017 and he is back to his first wedding fair on 8th April!



Many thanks to the team of Alison & John - Vergers; Michael and Chris - Organists: Elsa & the bell ringers: Jackie Gough - Leven Flowers. We have a great team.

Funerals Amongst the 46 funerals taken from the village in 2017, there were 18 people who had been regular worshippers at Christ Church, many of them until shortly before their deaths. We said goodbye to many faithful and committed friends and we miss them and all they contributed to our Church life.



Can I stress that you do not need to be a regular attender at Christ Church to have your funeral here. We welcome anyone from the community, and having the service in the village makes it much easier for mourners to attend. The new practice of going to the crematorium for the Committal first allows everyone to stay with the family for the funeral tea after the service.

We also offer the slideshow projector facilities and Skype links free of charge, and I do service sheets at cost price for families to save them money.

I am quite happy to take services at the local Crematoriums as well, and the same standard is applied to all - the very best we can do.

We follow up all village funerals with a visit from our Pastoral Assistant, letters confirming the free entry into our Memorial Book and collection, an invitation to our Memorial Services and a card on the First Anniversary of death.

Great Ayton has a good village team working together, and my thanks especially to Michael Rea of Ayton Funeral Services for his thorough and efficient service, Jan at Bib'nTucker Catering (The best funeral teas in the area!) and Jackie Gough from Leven Flowers for super floral arrangements. We do work with others too, and I am pleased to say that all do a good job.

Many of the Funeral Teas take place in our Church Hall at very short notice, so may I also thank the other Hall Users for their generous flexibility in helping support grieving families by moving or cancelling where necessary. We do try to keep this to an absolute minimum. **Paul**

Social Media

Social Media is becoming increasingly important for keeping in touch with adults in the 20 to 40's age group. We are currently active on Facebook & Twitter. Our audiences continue to grow.



The two posts reaching most people in 2016 were 746 people seeing our Annual Charity Auction photo and in December 804 saw the photo advertising our Christmas Carol Service – sadly they didn't all come! This year we have had over a thousand folk seeing many of our posts; with 1946 being the highest for the photo advertising the 2018 Charity Auction (posted on 29th December) well ahead of 1496 who saw our “Memory Tree” post followed by 1295 who

saw our December “Dads” advert & 1275 who saw our Remembrance Day photo. Sharing & Liking by individuals has a big impact on the number of people who see a post.

We have two ‘closed’ Facebook Groups – i.e. you need to be a member to see posts and contribute - are increasing in activity. The Little Fishes group has grown from 75 members in 2016 to 84 in 2017; it enables us to keep in touch with one another about matters relating to Christ Church in general and Fishes, WLTDO? and “Come & Praise” in particular. Our Adult Discipleship Group is still in its infancy with 38 members; we use this to share more explicitly theological comment and links. Any member of Christ Church may join to view or enter the debate. Christ Church Choir also has an active Facebook page.



Our Twitter accounts were launched in 2015, at the latest count our vicar @revpevl has 255 followers and the church account @ChristChurchTS9 has 132 followers. We use it to let the world know our news about past and forthcoming events and forward links of national & international interest. It's more difficult to know what audience you really have or what impact you make, however our photo advertising the October WLTDO? got 355 impressions (whatever that means!) closely followed by our Love in a Box photo with 307.

We try and keep our website as up to date as possible, and compared to many others we do fairly well, but please tell us if you see something slip through - or remain too long. **Ed**




Guiding in Great Ayton
