We Will Remember Them



This Remembrance Sunday will be the most significant one in memory as we remember the 100th Anniversary of the Armistice being signed that marked the end of the First World War. This will be to the very minute one hundred years later.

Our thanks go to many in the village community who have worked wonderfully together to make a memorable display of Poppies linking Low Green, High Green and Camp Corner together with the main display by the War Memorial. Around 9,000 poppies have been knitted, with an additional 47 ceramic poppies made to mark the individuals from the village who died. Two silhouette *Tommys* have been hand made to stand guard by our *Flanders Field* of Poppies. We invite people to visit the displays to pay their tribute to all who have died in war. The ceramic poppies will be sold when the displays come down for £20 each to raise funds for *Help for Heroes*.

Christ Church will also be filled with Poppies for the weekend, many made by children from Marwood and Roseberry Schools as well as Sunday School, and by an incredible co-incidence on the Saturday before Remembrance Sunday we shall Christen a young girl called ...Poppy! That is so fitting, for the soldiers gave their todays that we might enjoy a tomorrow.

Thanks also to the History Group in the Village who have faithfully gathered in Church for every 100th Anniversary of the 48 men from the village who have died. Also, for the most informative talks given by Ian Pearce for each man, revealing not just their personal circumstances, but the horrors they endured in the war.

There is nothing glorious about war, and it effects not just humanity but the rest of the planet too. The First World War is a prime example of something that cost so much and achieved so little. If all the countries concerned could have known the outcome at the beginning, they would probably have all gone back home again. We remember so that we don't let it happen again.

The village Act of Remembrance will begin outside Christ Church by the War Memorial at 10.45am on Sunday 11th November. We invite you to join us, or to keep the two minutes silence privately at home.

On the evening at 7pm on High Green we will mark **Battles Over** with the lighting of a token beacon, a short act of Remembrance and Community Singing.

FREEWILL OFFER 2019

In September we looked at ***From Thankfulness To Generosity (FTTG)*** as a preliminary to deciding on our Freewill Offer to the Diocese to help fund our family of Churches in 2019. The Church of England doesn't get state help, so if we want vicars, then we need to pay for them. So that poorer parishes have vicars too, the more wealthy areas are asked to pay for more than just their own vicar in order to help others.



On the **FTTG** Sundays we looked at both North Ormesby and Loftus Parishes able to be there and minister because they are supported. At the Wednesday meeting we heard two incredibly powerful and challenging messages from Marion Howard, a Health Visitor in South Bank and Kath Dean, a Reader from Saint Chad's in Middlesbrough who told us of the challenges they face every day. Such work can only happen with support. All the people present that evening came away realising their blessings and how much more we need to do to support such good work.

Christ Church PCC met to decide on our offer for 2019, knowing that our Income has decreased over the last year. We are already a generous Parish and often sited as an example to others (although hopefully not by name). We give lots away as we receive so much, and the PCC made a long list of many blessings we have.

Despite our own need for more funds, we decided to hold our giving to the Diocese at the same amount of £90,840 which together with Saint Oswald's offer of £19,704 gives a total of £110,544 This will pay the associated costs for one and a half clergy. (As well as Stipend, there is housing, training new clergy, pension costs for retired clergy and our share of the necessary Administration costs) At Christ Church we have said we will look again in 2019 and see if we can increase this amount.

It is absolutely right that we should be generous and give, for we have been given so much already. At Christ Church we depend heavily on a small group of givers (20%) who give 80% of our Income. If the other 80% who together give 20% of our Income could be more generous and be joined by many members who don't belong a regular giving scheme at all, then we would have no problem in being more generous, as well as resurfacing the car park front and back, and changing the lighting in Christ Church to LED - two projects much needed.

I know there will be some who will compare us to other parishes and think we give enough. If you are sure that God will see it this way - fine - but my guess is that when we stand before him most of us will wish we had been far more generous now. You can thank me then for pointing this out early :-)




We were back again on the Sunday morning for the Harvest All Age Service playing our own style game of Harvest Countdown

The peel of tubular bells in Saint Oswald's Church were given in memory of all the men from Newton who gave their lives in the First World War, and these bells as



well as others around the country, will be rung on Remembrance Sunday/ Armistice Day, which coincide this year.

A hand written plaque hangs in the vestry under the bells to remind us that even small communities paid a huge cost in lives during the war. Rest in Peace.



Roseberry School Darjeeling Autumn 2018

A lot of positive things have happened in Darjeeling this year, although I have not yet seen them for myself. In January, work at last began on replacing our



earthquake damaged pre-school centre. The old much loved wooden hut with its lovely wall decoration was demolished, and the arduous work of stabilising and building up the slope below began. The resulting flat area is much bigger than the floor area of the old building, allowing the team to build a spacious new pre-school base as well as providing a useable outdoor space. Construction is now complete and the building should have dried out

ready for use by the start of the new school year next March. There will be much work to do on equipping the new building, and I am really looking forward to discussing possibilities.

Two volunteer teachers (ex Sunnyside School) went to Darjeeling with their husbands, one of whom donated 6 laptops to the school. The two teachers went armed with teaching materials, books and lots of ideas to offer the teachers at Roseberry while the men setup the laptops and organised a suitable internet connection. The teachers could hardly wait to start looking things up on the internet, and it will be interesting to see how their teaching develops in consequence.

In the spring my son Rob and grandson Thomas visited Roseberry, and Thomas volunteered for classroom work while Rob shot off a lot of video around school. The resulting 15 minute documentary can be found on our website www.schoolaidindia.org via a link in the news section. Hearing our ex pupils talking confirms what a wonderful job the teachers are doing and that the Darjeeling team really are changing lives. We hope that School Aid India will be able to continue its support for their project. **Helen Jones**

We worship regularly – some frequently; some on a Monday, quite a lot on a Tuesday, others on a Wednesday and most of us on a Sunday.


And we pray; some quietly in the silence of their hearts – listening; some while walking the beaches, the hills, the river banks; some alone – others in small groups.
