New Year - Fresh Look



A New Year gives you a reminder to have a fresh look at things. Mrs P and I decided that we should look again at our Wills, as we drew them up when the children were young, but they are now adults. You know how it is, you keep on intending to do something, but never quite get round to it.

Now let me say quickly that I am not a rich man - alive, but were we all to perish in a car or plane crash, then certain insurances would be payable. They wouldn't be any use to me or us, so when we first drew up our Wills we thought who and what we could support with our last wishes.

Looking at the list today there is 65% of the money we would now redirect elsewhere. The causes in the first Will reflected our life at the time, but the situation has now moved on. If this Will were now to kick in, then it wouldn't be my last wishes that were implemented. How is it with you? Have you got a Will at all? Is it current? Does it reflect how you would want your hard earned income spent after your death?

Let me tell you three stories without names from experiences here.

The first was a young man (not me) who was told by an older widowed lady without children of her own who thought a lot about him "Don't worry love. When I die I will see that you are alright." As she gave a firm indication that he would be remembered in her will. Sadly she never got round to changing it, and so her estate was left to an older person who didn't really need it and he got nothing.

Secondly, a couple, without immediate family of their own. His Will left instructions as to how the estate was to be left to close family and a generous donation to Church. Unfortunately he died before his older wife, who hadn't made a Will, so different rules applied and the original beneficiaries were cut out, which I suspect wasn't the actual choice of either of them, but what happens if you die without a Will.

It is always slightly disappointing when fairly wealthy Church Members die leaving lots of money and big houses and yet don't remember the Church family they belonged at all. That's why the Third story is of a dear lady in the community who had no close family left her entire savings to be shared equally between Yatton House, Saint Oswald's Church, the Methodist Church and Guisborough Salvation Army. We all received a very generous amount that was so helpful in our work.

Using our money well is good stewardship and good for our health. Let me tell you another story.

John D. Rockefeller, who was one of the wealthiest men of his day, was dying at age fifty-five. He was living on crackers and milk and could hardly enjoy all the wealth he had accumulated. He spent most of his time in bed and claimed he had not had an uninterrupted night of sleep in five years. He was hungry but could not eat even though he could afford the best food in the world. He was weakened by a blood disease and racked with pain from an ulcerated stomach. All his money could not buy him the one thing he needed and wanted the most, his health. So since he was dying anyway Rockefeller decided to do something he had not done much of before, give his money away. He began to give away thousands and millions of dollars. Within twelve months of starting his giving venture he was virtually well and spent another thirty-five years living. He credited much of his miraculous healing to being the result of learning to give.

You don't have to wait until you die to start being generous. You can do that now. We have many folks within our Churches who do support us regularly and generously enable us to be generous Parishes. But it has to be said that there are also quite a few people who we are still hoping will join the regular givers. I keep on writing and asking and haven't given up. My apologies to those who think I keep going on about Giving, but if everyone was generous and committed we would have more than enough.

When it comes to our Wills there's no excuse as we no longer need or can use the money, so lets make sure it is used well to benefit the people and causes we believe in. Make sure you have a Will and it is up to date for you can do so much good with your last act.

Jesus said in Luke 6: 38, "Give and it shall be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." Be generous with God and He will be generous with you.

The Eden Project is a Church Planting Project run by Stockton Parish Church in one of the poor areas of the town. Here is a report from Duncan and Rachel, who are involved in the project. Our prayers are with them.

Firstly, THANK-YOU for your support. We're really excited that you're sharing in what God is doing on Mill Lane. We recognise that God has been at work through his Church here for many years, and we're very grateful for the body of Christ supporting us as we play our part.

This last season has been an exciting one as we officially formed as an Eden Group (to learn more about Eden visit, <http://joineden.org/>). That involved appointing two, part time, assistant team leaders, to support ourselves in heading up the group. They're called Rachel and Jo and are AMAZING, hopefully you'll get to meet them at some point this year. It also involved interviewing each member of the team (there's 14 of us including two children), and each person committing to serve what God's doing here long term. It was so exciting to hear each person's heart for the area and their vision for what God's doing here.

We also ran two events in the run up to Christmas which we'd love to tell you about....

Our first ever puppet show (guest starring the puppet team from All Saints Preston on Tees) was a big hit with children and parents alike! We were well supported by the local school in advertising, and had approximately 40 children plus parents attending the event at the



local community centre. It was a great opportunity to meet some new families, as well as catch up with some old friends from the estate. We were also able to give a gift to every child thanks to a generous donation of goodies from two local churches.



This year was the second year we've sung carols around the estate and the first time we've been joined by the Salvation Army. We spent just over an hour walking, singing and knocking on each door as we passed to offer them a Happy Christmas and invite them to our Christmas services. Once we were all sung out we headed back to the community centre for hot chocolate with some members of the local community.

A breather on Wednesday and then a packed Church at **Saint Oswald's** with full vestry and chancel and standing room at the back. We welcomed Christ Church Choir whose selection of Christmas anthems added to the service. We had many neighbours, wedding couples and friends from Hutton Village who used to walk across for Christmas Eve.

Friday saw Christ Church packed with both **Roseberry & Marwood Schools** and parents for their carol service. A lively narrative well read, interspersed with Christmas songs, some from their Christmas Productions, added to the occasion. The children of both schools did us proud and happy people left Church.



Sunday saw the Carol Services come to a suitable end with a full Church at Christ Church enjoying a feast of Readings, Carols and Choir items. All of our Carol Service collections, plus the Crib Service collection, go towards our Christmas Appeal - now on its 26th Year. This year we supported a local Charity in Grove Hill in Middlesbrough. The Genesis Project run by St Oswald's Church seeks to build Christian Community by Kids Clubs and a Luncheon Club for older folk. We sent a group of our students to help out with their Christmas Meal, and they had a great time.

(Formerly Women's World Day of Prayer)



CHORAL EVENSONG AT CHRIST CHURCH



Whilst many Parish Churches are struggling with numbers attending, our Cathedrals are bucking the trend and seeing an increase in attendance. Perhaps worshippers enjoy losing themselves in the timeless quality of some of the singing? We all have different spiritual itches that need scratching, and Cathedrals certainly manage this. For some its too rich a fare, but for others a wonderful treat to lift them to another plane.

Well the good news is that for all that enjoy this style of worship you don't need to travel to York Minster for we have the combined Choirs of Christ Church, Saint Leonard's Loftus and the Roseberry Church Music Singers under the direction of Richard Bendelow coming to sing

Choral Evensong on Sunday 24th February at 4pm in Christ Church.

They have been before and it was a most worshipful experience .What is wonderful to see are the number of young people who are participating in the combined choir, and they come from all three choirs including ours.

Loftus Church has seen growth in recent years and their Vicar, Father Adam puts this down to the encouragement the children have had from the choir, which as well as helping them belong to the Church and grow in faith, is also giving them a good grounding in musical education

Contemplative Outreach and Centering Prayer

Towards the end of last year the Revd. Mel King, from Saint Thomas' church, Brompton, became the representative for Contemplative Outreach in the North East region of the U.K. Centering Prayer (as the method of prayer is known) is practiced in many countries round the world. It is a silent prayer of the heart based on "The Cloud of Unknowing" and the Fathers and Mothers of the Desert of the 3rd and 4th century A.D. Contemplative Outreach was first formed in the 1970's by Fr. Thomas Keating, Abbot of Saint Joseph's Abbey, Massachusetts, together with two other monks.

At present there is a group here in Great Ayton, with people from each of the churches involved, who meet together weekly for a time of contemplative prayer.

Having the Rev. Mel King as Contemplative Outreach representative marks a new beginning for our area. We are pleased that she has been able to accept an invitation to **The Friends Meeting House on Monday 4 March** to lead a morning on Contemplative prayer with a talk entitled , "Where only love can go." The talk will be about opening to the Presence and Centering Prayer. This is for all who might be interested in discovering new insights or starting afresh with this method of prayer. **The morning begins at 10.00 am and will finish for 1.00pm.** You are welcome to come for all or just a part of the time. Look out or ask for more information later this month via each of the churches in the village.
