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

Advent in Reverse

We have two weddings just into the New Year. I have told both couples that they could still sing Christmas Carols for according to the song, my true love will still be delivering Pipers piping and Lords a leaping on their wedding days. They expressed surprise that it was still the Christmas Season, but given we start it in October there's no wonder we tire of carols by Christmas Day - the start of the 12 day season. In fact, I have even seen Hot Cross Buns already in the Co-op!

Well, my apologies for jumping the gun with an idea for Advent - which this year does actually start on 1st December - for if I wait until December's Spire it will be too late.

We are all used to Advent Calendars. When I was young you got little doors to open, often with a Bible passage inside and various Christmas pictures, and on 24th December the double doors revealed the scene of the stable in Bethlehem of the birth of Jesus.

Today the Bible quotes have gone together with the stable, and been replaced by chocolate, so why not try an Advent Calendar with a difference - A Reverse Advent Calendar.



The idea is simple. Get a box, and on each day of Advent add some food item to donate to the Foodbank. The idea suggests finishing on Christmas Eve, but if the poor in our area are to enjoy Christmas can I suggest starting on the Festival of Christ the King on 24th November and bringing it along on our Foodbank Sunday on 15th December. Try and include in it some Christmassy things like a selection box, crackers and Christmas Pud etc.

Christmas can be a very hard time for poor families, and sadly Bob Cratchit and his family are alive and struggling in many towns and cities today. Their plight can be even worse at this time of year.



The Bishop of Whitby Writes ...

You'll already know all about our Diocese's goals, I'm sure! — **Reaching** people we currently don't, **moving to growth** both in numbers and in discipleship, and **establishing sustainable giving** based on a vision for mission.

Let's remember, these goals came out of a big consultation exercise across the Diocese. We can all engage with them, whoever and wherever we are. Let's ask: Who isn't part of our parish or chaplaincy life? Where are our opportunities to grow? Is our giving realistic and is it truly a prayerful response to God's goodness?

Our goals aren't just about special initiatives. But we are about to move forward with a new focused venture in mission called *Mustard Seed*, and we're applying for national funding to extend its reach. *Mustard Seed* faces the fact that in places of deprivation (of finance, health, opportunity and more) a very small proportion of people have contact with the church or join in its life.

Mustard Seed will have two main actions. The first is to run *Stepping Up* equipping people to show and share the love of Christ in their communities. There'll be a one-year mission apprentice scheme, with some people going on to *Stepping Up Two*, a local leadership programme.

The second action is to have Ambassadors — people with a connection to places with deprivation, but based elsewhere, encouraging an interchange of prayer, energy and giving. The intention is that we shall see *Community Hubs* — places that offer welcome and practical support, combined with opportunities to explore and develop faith, and where Jesus is at the heart of everything that happens.

Initially we are concentrating on the urban areas of our Diocese, but it would be wonderful to see the experience of *Stepping Up* extending to our smaller communities where we know there is deprivation, though it's often less easy to see.

It's early days and it will be next year before we know whether we will get the full funding we are applying for. Please pray for *Mustard Seed*, and for people to find welcome, hope, joy and fresh purpose through a living relationship with Jesus.

Ben is about to play Uncle Fester in the Teesside Musical Theatre Company's production of The Addams Family.



'This is the hour of crisis: it is high time for you to wake out of sleep, for deliverance is nearer to us now than it was when first we believed.' St Paul's encouraging words to the Christians in

Rome are the springboard for the Archbishop of York's Advent book for 2019. With prayers and stimulating questions for reflection at the end of each daily meditation, here is fresh spiritual food for the Advent journey – pressed down, shaken together and running over.

Lead Theft Havoc

Six parish churches in North and East Yorkshire have been attacked by lead thieves during September and the first week of October. Serious damage has been inflicted on St Peter's Langtoft, St Mary's Lockington, St Hilda's Sherburn, St Lawrence's Sigglesthorpe and St Peter's Wawne, where large areas of lead have been stolen, and an attempt was made to steal lead at St Peter's Hutton Cranswick which – on this occasion – resulted only in minor Damage.



A recent sharp increase in scrap metal values on world markets has emboldened criminals to steal the lead sheeting that covers many an ancient church roof. Frequently the roof is out of sight from ground level and the first sign of the damage is serious water ingress, causing major damage to historic structures, fabric and artwork underneath.

The Diocese of York (the Church of England from the AI to the Yorkshire coast and from the Tees to the Humber) includes 467 listed buildings, many with a lead-covered roof. The Diocese is sometimes able to offer help to local parochial church councils (PCCs) to contribute to the cost of installing monitored alarm systems to protect a vulnerable lead roof.

Installation of an alarm significantly reduces the threat of lead theft, but may also result in a more substantial insurance settlement if the worst happens. Diocesan Church Buildings Adviser Keith Halliday said, "This is a national problem for the whole Church of England, and we're working closely with the police and with local churches to support measures to protect churches from these attacks.

"Whether you're a churchgoer or not, these buildings belong to their community and they're a living record of the place they serve. "Everyone is hurt by these thefts, and in the end the best protection against them is vigilance by everyone in the parish."
