ONLINE DISABILITY FORUM GETS 'REAL'

The young founder of what is thought to be Medway's only online disability network says he is delighted at the success of the group's first off-line event, which recently took place at St Justus Church in Rochester.

Twenty-four-year old Joseph Wastell, who himself has a disability, set up the Disability Medway Network on Facebook only a year ago, to provide a central place for disable people in the area find the support they need.

Nineteen groups and charities took part in the event, which was hosted by the church - of which Joseph is a member.

Joseph, who is committed to getting the voice of disabled people heard said: "I believe that the way to improving people's life chances is to build up their confidence. Many disabled people are missing out, simply because it can be so hard to find out what groups are out there to support them."

Following the first meeting, Rev Trevor Wyatt, Vicar of Christ Church Bexleyheath and Chair of Bexley Interfaith Forum said:

"The evening was a very uplifting experience for everyone who attended. We went into the worship space where the Sikh faith tradition was explained to us, and there was then the opportunity for questions and answers. Throughout the evening we were able to talk together and build friendships.

He continued: "Someone may not have a Sikh gurdwara or mosque where they live, but maybe through their work or child's school they will meet someone of another faith; this is about us loving and meeting our neighbour."
