A Letter from the Manse

Dear all,

But you will also read, perhaps with some sadness, the report made to the Presbytery concerning the challenge Currie Kirk faces for the future. While the report commends Currie for all the good work it is doing, and for new initiatives begun and planned for, it never-the-less depicts a realistic portrayal of what lots of churches, and not just Currie Kirk, are facing at this time. Sometimes it's harder to see it in black and white, but we know in our hearts that the Church at large is facing a difficult challenge for the future.

But just as there are new shoots in the season of Spring, so there is always life to be seen and found in the life of the church. Sometimes it is sowing the "mustard seeds" of faith that can lead to new shoots and hope. Perhaps this report will help us together as a church, to look again at what we are doing, what we might be able to do differently, and consider where we might have to change along the way. The aims and objectives set out for the coming time will help us to do that, and perhaps the church must go through this "wintering" time for a new Spring to begin.

As you know, I often refer to the church and the congregation as an extended family unit, and just as I would encourage you to pray when a person is under some life-pressures, I would encourage you to pray for our church and for each other, as we continue to strive to follow the calling of Jesus Christ. He asks us to follow him faithfully day by day, and if we have that commitment and resolve to his Way, then we must trust in the future knowing God is with us and goes before us. There is no doubt that the future will be different, but some things remain the same yesterday, today and forever, and the faithfulness and love of God is a constant in everything.

Study Leave Report from Lezley

s you know, I've been away from parish duties for 6 weeks embarking on a Study Leave Project. The time has certainly flown by, and I'm now pleased to be back to my "normal" work again. I'm very grateful to all who carried various responsibilities in my absence, and would like to say a particular thank you to Grant and Margaret Gordon.

Study Leave is available to all ministers after 5 years service, with an annual entitlement of 2 weeks, which can be added up to a maximum of 14 weeks. Having not taken up much of my entitlement in recent years, I had some 11 weeks stored, and felt the time had come to make use of it. Study leave is made available for ministerial development and reflection, and each project has to be approved by the Church of Scotland and Presbytery, and a report submitted thereafter.

What I have been working on, is providing a "Window onto Ministry" and reflecting on the experiences of those ordained to ministry around the turn of the millennium. My own ordination was in March 2000, and an objective of what I was doing was to reflect on my own experience of ministry, alongside that of my contemporaries, and to provide a wider window onto the experiences and health of those ministering today.

So what have I been doing for 6 weeks? The first part of my leave was reading background material to structure and inform the questionnaire that I would base my interviews upon. I also had to set up all the interviews, which proved a challenge in itself ministers are quite busy people! Thereafter, most of the time was used travelling to interview various colleagues about their ministry, and compiling the information from the interviews. I met with 18 participants all over the country, who were ordained between the end of 1999 and the beginning of 2001, and added quite a lot of mileage to my car along the way! Part of my leave was also used to plan worship for Currie Kirk which I normally take time to do in January [although I really shouldn't have been doing that!], and I had hoped and intended that the last week of my leave would be writing up my report, but time ran away from me, and as I write this, I haven't completed the full report yet. Once I have, if anyone is interested in reading it, then please just let me know. The areas predominantly covered are—Ministering since the Millennium, Generational Theory and The Ministry, Experiencing Conflict, and The Call to Ministry.

While it is always difficult to be away from the parish for a number of weeks, both personally, pastorally and practically, I do feel my leave has been worthwhile and of significance to me in ministry. As you might be aware, ministry is often quite isolating, and there is little opportunity for collegiality and the sharing of experiences. I found the opportunity to hear from my colleagues, and reflect on shared experiences both helpful, challenging and inspiring. It has been a busy time, a productive time, and a time which has allowed me to find space and time to reflect in a way that isn't easy to come by in the normal patterns of parish life. I also hope that what has been helpful to me as a minister, is something that will benefit my ministry here in Currie, and perhaps be of value to the wider church.

Local Church Review

s reported in the October edition of Clipboard Currie Kirk has been participating in the Presbytery of Edinburgh's Local Church Review. The Review focuses on helping congregations to assess their purposes, effectiveness, concerns and goals. Areas covered included the story of our church over the last ten years, worship, evangelism, service, discipleship, fellowship, communication, buildings and finance, all brought together in a Report owned by the Kirk Session. This Report, which is in three sections, runs to almost forty pages, the last section of which concentrates on the development of an Action Plan to be implemented over a four to five year time-scale.



A Presbytery team led by the Revd Dr Derek Browning, Minister of Morningside Parish Church, Margaret Pollock and Norma Henderson, Elders at St Cuthbert's and Craiglockhart respectively and Mark Evans, Deacon, Head of Spiritual Care, NHS, Fife met with the Kirk Session and discussed the health and future planning of our Kirk in light of our Report. The Presbytery's Superintendence Committee discussed the Report on 24 January with representatives of Currie Kirk (Sandra Cranford, Grant Gordon and Krys Hume) and the aims and objectives identified in the Action Plan came before Presbytery at its meeting on 4th February with a verbal report from Dr Browning.

A summary of the aims and objectives identified in our Action Plan is as follows:

Worship:

- provide quality worship through relevant preaching, warmth of welcome, friendliness of the worshipping community and the presence of people of all ages, (ongoing);
- install and maximize use of audio visual equipment, (late 2014/early 2015).

Evangelism:

• review letting policy of refurbished Gibson Craig halls to maximize their effectiveness as a tool for evangelism tool, (June 2015).

Service:

- review current system of providing pastoral care including role of the eldership, (December 2014). This will involve:
 - collating statistical data/information from Pastoral Team in relation to number of initial/follow-up visits differentiating between hospital and home visits;
 - ♦ surveying members regarding their expectations in regard to pastoral care;
 - ♦ using an external facilitator.
- review the Teen Café Church project to determine whether its purpose of encouraging teenagers to be attached to the church, to talk and explore life issues has been achieved, (July 2014, July 2016).

Discipleship:

- nurture spiritual life of members and leaders, (ongoing);
- elders to participate in the trypraying initiative, (Lent 2014).

Fellowship:

- Hospitality Committee, together with all relevant Committees, will review existing fellowship opportunities and agree what new initiatives will be appropriate and how and when these should be offered, (December 2014). This will involve:
 - Seeking information from a range of other Churches regarding their fellowship programmes and making full use of Church websites to identify events that could be appropriate to the Currie Kirk situation.

Relationships with the wider Church:

• to continue to build upon and develop existing relationships with churches in the Valley of the Water of Leith, (June 2014). This will involve exploring the possibility of sharing resources.

Ministry Team:

- encourage our minister to make use of time for training and development through the Study Leave Scheme and other appropriate courses, (ongoing);
- encourage people to be part of the Welcome Ministry and to volunteer for roles which complement their skills and interests, (ongoing).

Property:

Currie Kirk:

• redevelop property by extending the Link Building and creating throughout a more open and user friendly environment with appropriate facilities for the disabled and the installation of audio-visual technology, (December 2014).

Gibson Craig Halls:

- following the granting of a Public Entertainment Licence address certain health and safety issues external to the Halls but within the environs of the property, (May 2015). This includes, amongst other things:
 - the creation of a new, gated pedestrian path at the extreme west end of the car park, linking up with the slabbed path along the west side of the Hall (a right of way to the Guide Hall) and also the main Hall entrance;
 - the creation of a new, ramped emergency exit designed to serve both the main entrance and the front Hall, with appropriate alterations to the steps.

Stewardship:

continue the three year Stewardship cycle (Time, Talents, Money) with the focus in 2014 being on money.

Presbytery Plan:

• continue with activities such as Messy Church, Holiday Club, Teen Café and a range of social activities focusing on the mission challenges contained in the Presbytery Plan, (ongoing).

Communication:

- review the effectiveness of Clipboard as an effective tool for communication and the frequency of its production, (September 2014);
- install an audio visual system in the church, (late 2014/early 2015).

In his verbal report to Presbytery Dr Browning said the visiting team found the Currie visit challenging and concerning. The challenge lies in the fact that on the face of it Currie is a well-to-do congregation with sufficient resources to meet its obligations. However, the ageing profile of the congregation means that resources both in people and finance will be depleted over the next ten to twenty years and the concern lies in the need to develop a strategy to address this matter. He commended the Kirk Session for its honesty in this regard.

Dr Browning said that Currie Kirk is not a church that is doing nothing. We were commended for Messy Church, the re-introduction of a Summer Holiday Club, the Teen Café, hospital transport service, the forthcoming redevelopment of the church and its ancillary buildings along with the installation of an audio-visual capability. He also commented that the Kirk suffers from being on a split site, with our halls being at some distance from the church.

The role of the elder was questioned given that responsibility for pastoral care now lies with the recently formed pastoral team. Dr Browning said that this has not led to better pastoral care and there may have been a loss of communication with the membership. Comment was also made that while most of the Kirk Session is happy with a traditional format of worship this does not appear to be attractive to the missing generations of the 20-40 year olds and no change leaves the problem unaddressed. No 'new communicants' or no 'new elders' were also a source of concern.

In summary, Dr Browning said that he wished to affirm that the Currie congregation works hard at what it is doing, but that there are serious questions about how the congregation will cope in the next five to ten years without radical future planning and the embracing of the opportunities that lie ahead.

Issues of Concern from World Mission— Steve McQueen Highlights Modern Slavery at the BAFTAS

12 Years a Slave

"Right now there are 21 million people in slavery, I just hope 150 years from now, I hope our ambivalence will not allow another film maker to make this film."

n winning Best Film at the BAFTA Awards for his film, 12 Years a Slave, Steve McQueen highlighted the continuing travesty of slavery in our world. Many of our partner churches, particularly those in areas of conflict, are living with the realities of human trafficking in their countries, e.g. Syria and South Sudan.

The Church of Scotland is committed to addressing issues of human trafficking and violence against women. By supporting the National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon through A Place at the Table and financially supporting the trauma and counselling work with women and girls affected by conflict run by the Presbyterian Church of South Sudan, the Church of Scotland continues to support its partner churches in tackling modern day slavery.



Fairtrade Flowers: Supporting the Naivasha Farmers

his year, Valentine's Day raised concerns over the source of the dozens of red roses that are bought in the UK. Questioning the ever-decreasing prices in supermarkets, *The Daily Mail* alluded to fears that the only way to produce flowers so cheaply, including those with the Fairtrade label, is through the exploitation of workers in the Third World. The Fairtrade Foundation responded with a statement, showing its commitment to the improvement of working conditions of workers on flower farms in the Naivasha region in Kenya and their focus on the empowerment of workers through supporting the continuing education of workers' children, as well as the contribution towards a new Women's Hospital through Fairtrade premiums.

It is never wrong to question the source of the goods we buy, in fact we all have a duty to be thoughtful consumers; however, in this case it is apparent that it is important to buy Fairtrade flowers, in order to support the positive changes that are being made in the lives of the workers and their communities.


