Pip Ponders.....

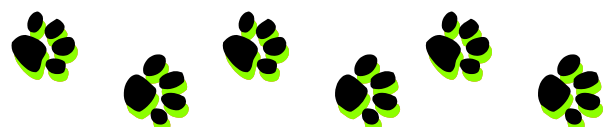

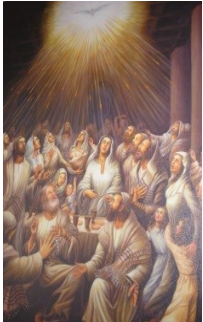


Prayer for Pentecost

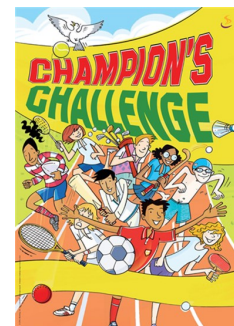
Ten Things About Pentecost

Pentecost Sunday falls this year on 8 June. But many people, including Christians, may not know why the day is special or what is celebrated. Unlike Easter and Christmas, when colourful eggs, Easter bunnies, Christmas trees and Santa Claus are harbingers of the upcoming Christian holidays, there are no such social markers by secular society ahead of Pentecost. For those who would like a quick and basic understanding of what Pentecost Sunday is, 10 things are listed below:

1. Pentecost Sunday marks the day when the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles.
2. Pentecost Sunday occurs 50 days after Easter.
3. The Bible records Pentecost in Acts 2:1-13.
4. Pentecost comes 10 days after the Ascension of Jesus Christ.
5. Pentecost is also known as “the birthday of the Church”.
6. Pentecost fulfils Jesus’ promise to send the “Helper” and “Spirit of Truth” in John chapter 16: 5-15.
7. Pentecost launches the large-scale spreading of the Gospel after Jesus’ ascension. Acts 2:41 records that after Peter spoke to the crowd after receiving the Holy Spirit, some 3,000 people were baptised.
8. The Pentecostal movement derives its name from the New Testament event in the second chapter of Acts.
9. Jews also celebrate Pentecost, but not for the same reason as Christians. The celebration by Jews of Pentecost is to observe God giving the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai 50 days after the Exodus. The Pentecost in Jewish tradition takes place 50 days after Passover.
10. In Western Churches, Pentecost is usually represented with the colour red, which symbolises the fire of the Holy Spirit.

If it is less than £40,411, your congregation (or linked charge) is being supported by other congregations.</p>	<p>£13,098 of your total contribution will be used to support the Church’s work in: resourcing congregations for Christian education and outreach; providing social care services in Christ’s name to further the caring work of the Church to people in need; accompanying partners around the world on our shared Christian journey; contributing the Church’s opinion in public debate and on issues affecting Scotland and the World; providing central day-to-day service work in administrative, financial and legal matters; and in planning the General Assembly and ensuring the Moderator represents the Church.</p>

As you will see, the contributions your church makes ensure a very diverse ministry is maintained and that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is shared in many ways and places. Many churches have made additional Ministries and Mission contributions throughout the past year and these have also been gratefully received.

Reflections on **trypraying** Vigil



20 million adults in the UK pray*

13 million pray at least once a month*

9 million pray every day*

1 in 3 people believe God will answer their prayers*

trypraying deliberately focuses on the Lenten Season when the “spiritual temperature” is expected to be at a maximum as Christians set aside time for reflection on Jesus Christ—his suffering and his sacrifice, his life, death, burial and resurrection. On Saturday 12th April Currie Kirk participated in a 24 hour Prayer Vigil as our contribution to the **trypraying** initiative involving some 50 churches in and around Edinburgh during Lent 2014. The initiative was widely publicised with 60 Lothian buses carrying highly visible advertising and banners on church buildings, ours being on the front of the Gibson Craig Halls.

As we did on previous Prayer Vigils, time was divided into 24 – 1 hour “slots” of which 12, from 9am to 9pm were in the Lounge in the Gibson Craig Halls and the remainder, from Midnight to 9am and from 9pm to Midnight on the Saturday, were in people’s homes. Prayer “hosts” were appointed for each of the daytime slots and an open invitation was extended for anybody to join in for as little or as long as they wanted. As was done last year, we produced a booklet to help focus our prayers, this year’s booklet being themed on the Fruit of the Spirit.

Excluding “hosts”, 22 people participated in the Vigil, an increase of 16 on last year. It is estimated that more than half of the participants were from the local Baptist Church, with 6 from Currie Kirk and the remainder from other local Churches.

Those who attended or acted as “Hosts” for the Vigil were invited to complete an Evaluation Questionnaire and from the returns to date most found it a meaningful experience on their Lenten journey. Here are some of the responses:

- *“I felt a great sense of peace wash over me and was moved to tears;*
- *The Booklet was very useful and meaningful. I will regularly use it; very appropriate to general life;*
- *Might be better if “hosts” took a time of praying to keep the Vigil going (welcome for half an hour, pray for half an hour);*
- *Praying in my own home in the middle of the night was a very special experience;*
- *Best feeling ever;*
- *Would rather pray in the Church; don’t believe location of the Gibson Craig Halls necessarily encourages participation;*
- *I got encouragement and a quiet and peaceful time with The Lord;*
- *Challenged to pray more for our brothers and sisters in Currie Kirk, and that we as Christians in this village learn to support and pray God’s blessing on one another”.*

There was a comment on trying to improve publicity generally and also of the need to provide better signage at the Gibson Craig Halls. If we undertake a Vigil next year these suggestions will be kept in mind along with the idea of splitting “hosts” time between welcoming and praying.

Thank you to all “hosts” who helped make the Vigil possible and all participants who supported the day of prayer.

And here is a great prayer story from another Church:

*“While at our church café today I noticed someone standing outside so I went to the door to talk with him. He’s a young guy who lives in the neighbourhood who I’ve met before, given a **trypraying** booklet to and witnessed to. He said, pointing to our **trypraying** banner, that he’s been doing that every day and he didn’t know what was happening, but*



this peace came over him. He read through the [trypraying](#) booklet and is somewhat amazed that his prayers are being answered. He has come off drugs and is now coming off methadone and wants to get baptised. He asked us what it was and did we do it!"

We have also heard of several cases of people in despair over personal or family problems and having seen the advertisements on Lothian buses were greatly encouraged in their prayers.

We were encouraged by the support in the Vigil from the local Baptist Church and echo their sentiment that we pray for one another as we endeavour to show God's love in this community.

Vacancy—The Way Ahead

On 11 May, our minister intimated that after six years in Currie she was moving to Greyfriars, Edinburgh to undertake the post of Associate Minister. Lezley takes up her new role on 1 July and her last Sunday with us will be 22 June. On that day we are due to have a light lunch in the Gibson Craig Halls at around 12 noon in aid of the Church of Scotland's HIV Programme and this will be the ideal opportunity for us to say our farewells to Lezley and Andrew so please join us if you are able on that day.

During the vacancy, a wide range of issues have to be dealt with, and many people have to be informed and consulted. The Church has a rather detailed procedure to be followed, and I will summarise, as best as I can, these arrangements, although by the time this article is printed some of the steps may well have been intimated already to the congregation.

Beginning with the Presbytery meeting of 13 May, the following was agreed (this is an extract from the Presbytery Minute):

1. agree to Mrs Stewart's demission;
2. declare that the charge of Currie will become vacant on 30 June 2014;
3. instruct the Presbytery Clerk to bring forward the appointment of an Interim Moderator;
4. note that the Presbytery Plan states that the congregation have permission to call a minister on a Basis of Unrestricted Tenure;
5. agree that the number of persons to serve on the Nominating Committee should be thirteen;
6. authorise the Presbytery Clerk to intimate these decisions to the congregation of Currie.

The Presbytery is working on the appointment of an Interim Moderator whose role will be to preside at all meetings of the Kirk Session and at all congregational meetings in connection with the vacancy. As to the day to day needs of the Parish a locum will be appointed, so technically a charge is never vacant. Normally the Locum takes Sunday Worship and provides two day's pastoral cover per week.

A Nominating Committee (formerly called Vacancy Committee) will be formed in due course. The work of the Nomination Committee generally takes a number of months and therefore it could well be some time before a new Minister is inducted.

There is no doubt that a ministerial vacancy is a very significant time in the life of a Church. What happens in this period and what decisions are made will affect Currie Kirk's future life. We are entering a time of opportunity and excitement. That can also bring with it anxiety and concern! The Lord's words in Joshua 1.9 are:

"Be strong and courageous ... do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

In the months ahead, while all of us will have a role to play in serving the needs of the Parish, especially pastorally in the looking after each other, let us do so with confidence, for our future is in good hands, the hands of our loving God.

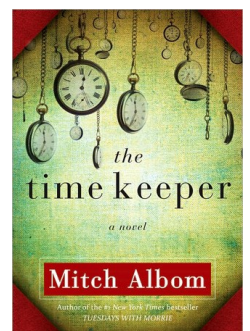

 '99 Flake to decorate



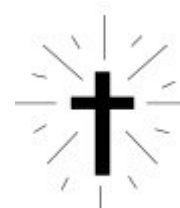
