

A Message from the Manse

Dearest friends,

Harvest is upon us. Today I headed up the Kirkgate to help Sam catch Pokemons with my phone. While wee Sam focused his mind on *harvesting* Pokemons, I admired field after field of beautifully rolled bales of straw next to pastures with cows, horses and flocks of sheep. We continued on—up to Harlaw Reservoir—and bumped into Andrew and Catherine Barr putting the combine harvester and tractor to bed at the end of a warm autumn day of hard-harvesting work.

This is the time of year when we drop off little bags of apples, Victoria plums, cucumbers, tomatoes, rhubarb and runner beans to our neighbours. (Thanks by the way to friends who dropped tasty treats off at the Manse or Gibson Craig.) Harvest is, instinctively a time of sharing and celebration. That is why, once again, we are glad to collect donations for the Trinity Foodbank in Wester Hailes *especially* for Harvest but *also* all year round.

Americans will often tell you that the first Harvest Thanksgiving took place when the early pilgrim Fathers settled in the ‘new world’. However, Harvest celebrations are an ancient tradition. In the Jewish faith, for instance, there are three harvest festivals.

- * The *Pesach* (*Festival of Spring Passover*) is held to celebrate the harvesting of Barley and to commemorate the Passover.
- * The *Shavuot* (*Festival of the First Fruits*) commemorates the Wheat crop, the last grain of the season and the beginning of the harvest of fruit.
- * Lastly in the autumn, the Jewish people gather for *Sukkot* (*The time of our happiness*) when shelters were ritually made out of Myrtle, Citrus, Willow and Palm branches to give thanks and praise to God for the final harvest and the fertility of the land.

Let’s remember that the thrust of this Harvest season is not just about enjoying and sharing nature’s goodies—it is about remembering to give THANKS to God for all God’s good gifts to our lives. Whether you are collecting Pokemons, Pears, or Peas, Cucumbers, Crab-apples or Chestnuts—I wish you every blessing this autumn season.





Data Protection Policy

Nowadays we are all used to giving information about ourselves over the phone, via the internet or by other means. We expect those to whom we give this information to look after it and use it only for the purpose for which it was given and in general to deal with it legally. The main law which governs this subject is the Data Protection Act 1998. The Church of Scotland and Currie Kirk hold personal data about church members and others and must therefore comply with the law.

The Act places obligations on holders of Personal Data and gives rights to people whose Personal Data is held. The Church of Scotland has directed that all congregations should adopt a 'Data Protection Policy' and appoint a 'Data Protection Officer' in order to comply with the Act. In June, Kirk Session approved the adoption of a Data Protection Policy and asked me to act as 'Data Protection Officer' as described in the Policy. The full Policy document is available on the web site (www.curriekirk.org) or on application at the Church Office, but I will give an outline of the main points here.

- ◆ All trustees, office bearers, employees and others given positions of responsibility must carry out their duties in compliance with the Act and the Data Protection policy. Anyone who considers that this policy has not been followed should contact me as Data Protection Officer.
- ◆ Personal Data in terms of the Act consists of data (information) relating to a living individual who can be identified from that data, eg name, address, phone number, email address, financial information, health records, CCTV etc. It can be held on a computer, laptop, ipad, smart phone etc or on paper.
- ◆ Extra care to prevent unauthorised disclosure to a third party must be taken over 'sensitive data' such as ethnic origin, political opinions, religious beliefs, etc. Data held by Currie Kirk indicates religious beliefs and is therefore 'sensitive'. We believe that members and supporters of Currie Kirk know what personal data we hold and what we use it for, and that we can assume their approval of what we do with it. We have already obtained approval from those who are happy for us to use their email address for church communications and will also get approval before publishing personal data in The Kirk News or on the web site.
- ◆ When we collect personal data in future we will provide a statement of our Privacy Policy (already in use in Standing Order and Gift Aid Declaration forms) which can be found on the web site along with the Data Protection Policy.
- ◆ Organisations holding Personal Data must register its nature and the use made of it with the Information Commissioner's Office. The register is public and may be accessed *via* the Information Commissioner's web site www.ico.org.uk. The Church of Scotland has registered for each Presbytery. We are covered by the registry entry for the Presbytery of Edinburgh and our Data Protection obligations are overseen by the Presbytery Clerk.
- ◆ The Commissioner is responsible for ensuring compliance with the Act and can impose sanctions on people and organisations for breaches. These sanctions can include criminal prosecutions and fines up to £500,000.
- ◆ Office bearers and employees holding personal data for Currie Kirk must use appropriate security to prevent loss or unauthorised disclosure. They have been given a copy of the Data Protection Policy and appropriate guidance or training.
- ◆ If any Personal Data goes missing or is thought to have been copied or transferred illicitly I, as Data Protection Officer, must be informed.
- ◆ The Act gives individuals the right to see what Personal Data is held about them (subject to a small fee) and to have it corrected if found to be inaccurate. If anyone feels the need to take advantage of this they should apply to me first.

Please be assured that a great deal of time and thought both at Currie Kirk and the Church of Scotland has gone into ensuring that your Personal Data is looked after as required by the Act. It's my responsibility to see that the Data Protection Policy continues to be adhered to.

At lunch Betty and Cathie were invited to join three ladies—all members of the Guild of Downfield Church in Dundee—one being the mother of our previous minister—Lezley Stewart!! The main speaker in the afternoon was Sally Magnusson who spoke of founding Playlist for Life in 2013, after being impressed by the effect of personally meaningful music on her late mother's dementia, about which she has written a book. The ladies ended the day by singing and dancing to The Heart and Soul Swing Band—who says the Guild is boring!!



On Tuesday 4 October Ian Rintoul will be speaking on "A Village in the City" and we have our Coffee Morning on Saturday 15 October which is in aid of our project "Caring for Mother Earth". The project aims to distribute solar cookers in the rural and peri-urban areas of the Bolivian Andes.
