

 Oh, Happy, Happy Easter!



# Message from Easter @ Easter

*Dearest Friends*

I am so grateful for all the goodwill and kind wishes that surrounded my trip to the USA to preach for Dad's 80th Birthday. The celebrations went well and the folk of St Andrew's Christian Church, Baltimore send their warmest greetings to Currie Kirk.



I still find it incredible that it is possible to wake up in Edinburgh, eat breakfast in Heathrow and be in the USA in time for dinner. In our time, communication and travel have become so quick, so convenient—so different from what travel and communication must have been like in Jesus' day.

Jesus was one man, an itinerant prophet and preacher who changed the course of so many people's lives by his speaking, healing, sharing, caring. Yet, he and his followers travelled only on foot, by sailboat or at best on a donkey. There were no microphones, no internet—just one man with a most radical approach to religion—an approach which encouraged people to build their own personal relationship with God.

It is incredible to conceive of how the early Christian believers took his message of hope, forgiveness, new life and resurrection around so many communities, villages, cities and nations without phone, internet, Facebook, what's-app, email or tweet. Yet somehow, by the grace of God and through the passion of a few committed folk the Good News spread. More and more people not only heard about this Divine man Jesus, his life-story and teachings—but their encounter with the Good News transformed their lives and the lives of their loved ones.

We hear so much 'bad' news these days—news which leaves us feeling uncertain, sad or overwhelmed. At Easter we remember once again that, as Christians we are people of the Gospel, or Good News. We celebrate that in God, death does not have the last word, evil cannot win-out forever, love is stronger than hate and hope will outlive despair. We have a loving God who came to us in Christ Jesus to redeem us again and again and again.

Therefore, let all of us in Currie Kirk resolve, despite all the 'bad' news around, to communicate the Good News we have with neighbours, friends and strangers alike. We remember that it is the living Christ among us who empowers us not only to share, but to participate in the story of Resurrection.



# Behind the Smiles



Jane and Mike Fucella were, for a long time, our mission partners. They spent over 20 years as missionaries in Thailand, sent initially by the Church of Scotland. They lived in two rural locations and then in Bangkok. Since returning to the UK four years ago Jane has written a book about their lives and experiences in Thailand. Church members who read the Fish Wrapper newsletter, which they wrote regularly from Thailand, will recognise the style of writing as well as the illustrations—all pinched from Fish Wrappers and done by Mike.

Behind the Smiles is published by Onwards and Upwards and is available in Christian bookshops, Waterstones.com, Waterstones shops (on request) and Amazon. It is available on Kindle. It is a collection of snapshot chapters, dealing with topics like learning the languages (and dropping some linguistic clangers); pets and wildlife (getting used—and never getting used—to snakes, rats and multiple creepy-crawlies); understanding and respecting the culture, beliefs and religious traditions, incorporating them, if at all theologically possible, into Christian practice; medical emergencies, both family and friends/neighbours; squaring up to the challenge of Thai food—its cooking, storage and choice of ingredients; and the delights and dangers of various modes of transport. Through it all shines Jane’s passionate and tender care for everyone she met and especially for those in her care, nursing and supporting men, women, children and whole families through the early days of HIV and Aids.

Their’s was a holistic mission. They took Jesus’ love to those in the direst need, demonstrating acceptance, forgiveness and hope, and often creating an open door to take the gospel through and into the lives of those they met. This fascinating account of life in Thailand—as Christian missionaries, as neighbours and friends, as husband and wife, as parents, as farmers, as medical experts, as survivors—will be a must-read. ## Christian Aid week 14–20 May 2017



# Good Book Group

*I Let You Go*  
by Clare Mackintosh



This novel not only promoted a great deal of discussion within the Group but—I think it is fair to say—was one of the most enthusiastically reviewed. In fact, most of the Group enjoyed it so much they read it twice! The consensus was that the novel was well written and well constructed.

Clare Mackintosh was named *The Sunday Times* Best Thriller Author and is now an Award winning Crime Writer. She had taken a two year career break as a serving police inspector in search of something more creative. In order to have a small regular income, Clare began as a freelance writer then 'Chick Lit' author. It was a hit and run accident by a joy rider, in her home town and the subsequent death of the nine year old victim, that prompted her to write her first novel *I Let You Go*. The offender was never charged.

Clare could not imagine how a mother could survive the loss of a child or how someone could go through life knowing they were responsible for the death of a child. Clare's own new-born son died of meningitis, her loss and sense of grief were the motivation to creating the central character, in *I Let You Go*, Jenna.

With the death of her son, Jenna's world disintegrates instantly. She decides she has to make a fresh start to escape from what has happened and from her past! Jenna ends up in a small Welsh coastal village.

As time passes, she begins to think there is the prospect of some happiness, yet this book has so many unpredictable twists and turns, that nothing can be taken for granted. Secrets, once thought buried, come out. On her Wedding night Jenna's husband punched her in the face and the viciousness of the subsequent beatings he inflicted was horrendous. Her father used to beat her mother! She reflects back over her life to her Potter's studio, lost in her work, which her husband resented. He was obsessed with her, controlling.

There is a sub-plot running alongside the 'secrecy' surrounding Jenna. Kate is a trainee detective and DI Ray Stevens, her supervising officer, are investigating the hit-and-run, which killed Jenna's son, Jacob. The detective, however, is dealing with his own problems, home issues distracting him from the case.


Some worthy comments from the book group:




## God's Messenger


