

A Message from The Manse

Dearest Friends

unday 24 September was, for me a lovely day. In the morning we celebrated Harvest Thanksgiving in Currie Kirk and in the evening I attended a prayer meeting in the Community Church across the Kirkgate. Several local pastors from the Nigerian Church in the Currie Community Centre, and Juniper Green attended along with Heather our new Youth and Family outreach worker and friend.

In the evening, after singing many uplifting praise songs together, we prayed for unity among the Christians of Currie and said prayers for all the people of Currie and the joint valley area whom we serve. I loved the sense of solidarity I was shown and the inclusive, outward looking way people spoke and prayed. Churches which behave like private clubs only for their own people's sake don't reflect very well the expansive love that Jesus tried to share so broadly to all people and Christ has always called his followers to unity. Jesus prayed, Father I pray for those who will believe in me, that all of them may be one, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they be one in us so that the world may see them and believe. John 17:20

I am therefore excited that we are going to begin a **new** morning prayers-for-all meeting in the Gibson Craig Hall Lounge on the first Wednesday of each month from 11—11.30 am. Pop along early at 10.30 am this Wednesday 4 October if you would like a cuppa first. The format will be relaxed—there will be a time for sharing and a time for private prayer together as well as a time for silence too. BB celebrating 100 years of Junior Section






psychological mystery was "The Couple Next Door" by Shari Lapena.

Link to Hope—Family and Elderly Shoebox Appeal—2017

nce again Currie Kirk, via the Mission & Outreach committee, is linking up with the charity "Link to Hope", who last year supplied nearly 44,000 Family and Elderly shoe boxes to refugee families in distress in Eastern Europe just in time for Christmas. Their annual Family Shoebox Appeal has been running since 1992 and has delivered smiles to thousands of people in Eastern Europe over the years. In fact, more than 700,000 shoeboxes have been delivered to hundreds of different locations.

The Family Shoeboxes of gifts are given to families who often have to make a choice between buying food or fuel at Christmas time—buying presents is just not a priority. Many of these families do not have running water, heating or electricity. Some live in appalling conditions, often living in just one or two rooms, and life for them is a real struggle to survive.

At Christmas time, these basic shoeboxes are filled with many goodies and necessities from chocolates and small toys, to candles and shampoos, handkerchiefs and toothpaste, and covered with Christmas paper to transform them into a colourful gift that brings much needed help and joy to families and elderly people in great stress and trauma.

During the month of October, Currie Kirk will be handing out leaflets which contain all the necessary information to fill a standard shoebox with some of the items mentioned above. The average cost of filling a box is £10, plus £2 towards transport costs, but please feel free to hand in items that will go a long way to filling up a shoebox. Items are outlined in the leaflet. Boxes can be handed in to the church office at the Gibson Craig Halls, 156 Lanark Road West, during its working hours.

The closing date is Friday 3 November for collection. Currie Kirk has always provided generously to this great cause. Please help to make this year one to remember for those children and families in need in Eastern Europe.



Diana Darke is an Arabic speaker, a journalist and travel-writer, with over 30 years' experience of living and working in the Middle East. This house has enabled her to become deeply embedded in Syrian society and culture. When the war forced her to leave, she turned it into a refuge for Syrian friends escaping the violence.
