### Bethany Night Shelter.

s well as being part of the Bethany Care Van teams, Currie Kirk will be involved in the Night Shelter on two nights this winter. Whereas the Care Van goes out every night of the year apart from 31 December, the Night shelter runs nightly from

October to April. Bethany use a number of city centre church halls to allow homeless people a chance of a hot meal, dry and warm bed for the night and a general place of refuge. This year each night will allow 50 users to take up this offer with the numbers going up to 65 through the months of December, January and February. Each church which volunteers prepares, cooks and serves a two-course meal at the venue and leaves enough food for the Bethany workers and breakfast.

We are very grateful to all our volunteers who come along and help to prepare and serve dinner—it is always a mixture of highs and lows from within the church team and with the users we meet each night. We are also immensely grateful to Mark McGill who donates steak pies every year to feed 50 people, and there's always enough left over for seconds!

### Data Protection and Privacy Update The Clock is ticking.....

It is well over a year since Currie Kirk, as required by the Church of Scotland introduced a Data Protection Policy to safeguard the Personal Data held about the people we deal with as members, associates, donors, employees, hall users, suppliers etc. The legal basis for this is the Data Protection Act 1998, which places obligations on the people and organisations who hold or process Personal Data and gives rights to the individuals whose data is held.



The Data Protection Policy, which includes our Privacy Policy, can be found on the Kirk website by following the link 'Data Protection Policy'. A paper copy can be obtained from the Kirk Office. There is also an article introducing the subject in Kirk News October 2016.

I believe that a periodic reminder of the rights and obligations which The Data Protection Policy covers is appropriate and, to this end, I have contacted all those Office bearers, team leaders, Kirk Secretary and others who hold and process Personal Data on behalf of the Kirk. If you hold Personal Data on behalf of the Kirk and I have not contacted you, please let me know.

There is also another reason for reviewing our practice.

The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) is a new EU law that will replace the Data Protection Act 1998 and will apply in the UK from 25 May 2018. The GDPR strengthens the rules around Personal Data and requires organisations to be more accountable and transparent. It also gives people greater control over their own personal data. The government has confirmed that the UK's decision to leave the EU will not affect the commencement of the GDPR.

The UK law has not yet been enacted, and so we can't be sure what all its ramifications will be, but it seems wise to review our procedures now since the new law is expected to build on the existing legislation. The Church of Scotland will be issuing further guidance to churches early in 2018 and so you can expect to hear more then.
