

A Message from The Manse

Dear Friends

his autumn, Currie Kirk underwent a Local Church Review. Every five years the Presbytery sends a team of ministers and elders to assess how the church is doing in its ministry, discipleship, mission and care to the Parish. This used to be known as a Quinequennial visitiation.

For my part, and the part of the Session it was a very positive experience both to look at where we are and to articulate more clearly our vision for the future as Christ's Church in Currie. I sensed that the visiting team caught a little of our enthusiasm when they wrote the following;

"Currie Kirk is looking up, is looking out and is looking forward. Currie is a village with a clear and identifiable Kirk. The Kirk Session is looking up to the guidance of God in its mission to the parish. The Mission Statement—Currie Kirk where faith and life cross paths—is indicative of that mission to bring faith to the life of the village.

Currie Kirk is looking out to and for the people of its parish and beyond. The vision of Currie Kirk extends beyond its parish in that the congregation is hugely generous in its support of people in need through donations to the Care Van, Fresh Start, the foodbank, then further afield through continued support for Christian Aid, Edinburgh Direct Aid, a Thai AIDS project, and the Guild's commitment to projects at home and abroad. Such generosity has long been a feature of Currie Kirk and is the healthy sign".

The visiting team commended our commitment to reach out to young and old through our various activities and partnerships. Church of Christ has never existed to serve itself but to serve those outside of it with care and love. As a Kirk we are lucky to be connected to a village with a strong community council, good

relationships with schools and other community groups and organisations.

One example of an initiative that brings our community council, schools and Kirk together is the community garden project. At present the garden in the atrium of Currie Community High School is derelict and full of debris. We are all working in partnership to get the debris removed so that we can create, plan and plant a beautiful, lifegiving space for pupils of the two schools as well as other users of the community school. Watch this space, or if you have skills, time or flowers to contribute get in touch.

The visiting team commended us for living up to our Motto:

Currie Kirk, a place where faith and life cross paths.

Lord Kitchener's Call to Arms-McCrae's

Battalion

(The following is an extract from "The Sporting Battalion" and can be found at www.mccraesbattaliontrust.org.uk) - Ed.

he first volunteers for McCrae's Battalion were eleven professional players from Heart of Midlothian, leaders of the Scottish League and considered by many observers to be the most irresistible footballing combination in Great Britain. If Scotland was the home of the scientific game then Hearts and their great Glasgow rivals Celtic represented a glorious future.

On Saturday 14 November Hearts, who remained comfortable leaders of the League, entertained Falkirk. That

morning the chairman of Airdrieonians cast doubt on the War Office's support for continuation of the game. Other papers carried speculation about the introduction of compulsory military service. And of course there was black news from the front, where the position of the British Expeditionary Force was growing more perilous by the day. At half-time the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders made an urgent appeal for volunteers: the initial response was disappointing, but at full-time several men stepped forward.

On Wednesday 25 November 1914 Sir George McCrae held a press conference in the Tynecastle boardroom and announced the enlistment of eleven Hearts players in his new Battalion The news caused a national sensation and was perfectly timed to defuse the anti-football campaign.

In 1914 the Hearts players exchanged the certainty of honour on the sporting field for the decided uncertainty of a different kind of honour on a different kind of field. Their decision took them to the Somme, where the finest Battalion in Lord Kitchener's armies was destroyed in a matter of hours.

YOUNG MEN

Almost three-quarters of the fighting strength became casualties, including several of the Hearts lads and their pals from other football clubs. The Hearts players had saved their sport. Professional footballers had been volunteering ever since the outbreak of war; but none so concertedly, so selflessly and so publicly. The slings and arrows directed at football were always undeserved; but the Tynecastle enlistment was the blow required to silence the critics, ensure continuation and preserve the game's good name.

A total of at least 30 professional footballers are listed as having joined, from Hearts, Raith Rovers, Dunfermline Athletic, Falkirk, Hibernian and East Fife.

It was a tumultuous opening, the start of what seemed like a glorious adventure. The end, of course, was darker and descended into tragedy. Seven Hearts players gave their lives in the war and others were physically and mentally traumatised after they returned from active service.

Sleep in the Park—Saturday 8 December 2018

(A message from the Moderator)

Dear All,

This is advanced warning—I'm looking for some support and help!

Last year, the Moderator "Slept Out" in Princes Street Gardens on the coldest night of the year to support the work of Social Bite and to highlight the plight of the homeless. Many ministers and church folk joined him and together they raised both awareness and funds.

This year, as someone who likes a good sleep and the comfort of her bed, I'm being asked to do likewise—aaargh! Which is why I need your support and help ... please remember me in your prayers.

But please would you consider joining me? There's warmth in numbers!

This year there are to be four places to sleep out and there is also going to be a "Wee Sleep Oot" for younger people (details to be released soon). Could you involve your youth organisations? Local schools? As well as enthuse lots of grown-ups to join in?

The date is Saturday 8 December. I wonder if, at a time of year when we will be remembering a young, homeless couple having their firstborn welcomed into the world in an outhouse, you might consider making this your Christmas project?

The aim is to set Scotland off down the road to ending homelessness through a route that has been tried and tested in other parts of the world. It is ambitious, and aims to bring together all sorts of groups working in this area. It will also be a long term commitment—but for the sake of the all too many on our streets, we need to go down it.

While I might be worrying about being left out in the cold, alone for one night, there are far too many for whom that happens every night of the year. Let's not live with that. Let's be radical and help things to change.

The Good Book Group

ur September novel *The Beekeeper's Promise* was well received by the Group and promoted much discussion. The overall opinion was that this book, once started, was difficult to put down.

The genre was that of historical fiction—in the words of the author, "Other than a few towns that you can find on the map and certain historical events that took place during World War Two, the people and the places are entirely fictitious. The terrible events at Tulle, however, really did take place."



The Beekeeper's Promise was not another story about 'The War' per se but two interconnecting stories about two women living in different periods of time. Eliane's story started in 1938 in a small, rural French town. Whereas, Abi's story took place in 2017. The two threads, however, blended seamlessly together and both were sympathetically written by Fiona Valpy.

Eliane and Abi's stories were inextricably linked because of their time spent at the Chateau Bellevue. Eliane, a young girl, was a beekeeper at the Chateau Bellevue prior to and during the German occupation of France in the Second World War. Her story was one of innocence lost, hardship, bravery, resistance and survival.

Abi's story was also one of lost innocence and survival. She was a woman trying to pick up the pieces of her life after, what turned out to be, an abusive marriage. Abi tried to recover from that dark period of her life at a Yoga Retreat, near the Chateau Bellevue. Early on in her story, she found herself staying and then working at the Chateau.

It was during her stay at the Chateau that Abi heard of Eliane's story and began to feel an affinity with her. The author's language was detailed and descriptive, without being intrusive. The novel told the story of human courage and human frailty, about humanity at its best and inhumanity at its worst...

The average score was 7.1. The next meeting of the Good Book Group will be on Monday 5 November in the Lounge at the Gibson Craig Halls, to which all are welcome.

Bethany Night Shelter.

Bethany Christian Trust

In addition to the nightly evening service of the Care Van round the streets of Edinburgh, Bethany Christian Trust also organise a Care Shelter. The Care Shelter provides people who are rough sleeping with a place to go for the night where they can find shelter, a hot meal and a warm place to sleep.

Started in Edinburgh in 1996 with a 2-week pilot over Christmas, the Shelter has grown over the years to span six and a half months over the winter, from 24 September 2018 until 5 May 2019. The figures so far this winter suggest that around 55 rough sleepers are taking refuge in these shelters.

The service is run by a small team of staff and relies on around 1,000 volunteers from churches across the Lothians. They provide church venues for people who are homeless to sleep in on a nightly rota basis as well as preparing and serving a hot meal. This is where Currie Kirk help out. Currie Kirk is too far out from the centre of Edinburgh to offer its halls so we have offered to provide and serve dinner for at least two nights during this winter. A typical meal over the past few years has included steak pies generously donated by Mark McGill or sausages and mash, followed by homemade dumplings and custard. Once the team have finished serving and clearing up the Bethany staff provide support during the night. Those who use the shelter are given breakfast in the morning before they step out into another cold day, looking forward to some comfort and safety at night time again. The service has been a lifeline for many people over the years.

The Care Shelter is funded by the voluntary donations of trusts and foundations, individuals and communities, as well as receiving some money from the Caring Christmas Tree appeal. We are always looking for warm jumpers, jeans, jackets and socks—if you're clearing out before Christmas please pass on any unwanted men's warm clothing to Gordon Clephane or myself.
