## A Message from The Manse

#### **Dear Friends**

s people of faith, there is always the challenge of how we divide our time between the sacred and the secular aspects of life. This becomes exacerbated at Christmas when the expectations for a commercial experience often outweigh what the story really means to our lives.

We live in an every-day demanding world and we often feel we have to try to "make time" for the presence of God, separate from these demands. As a parent of three kids in High School, with two sets of rugby kits, dancing outfits, work clothes, and other laundry to wash on a daily basis, I encourage you all to seek God not only in sacred places but in your daily demands and routines: on your bus rides; in your conversations with friends; your nagging thoughts, or worries; and moments of wishing you were not feeling alone. It doesn't matter how busy you are, you can still be left feeling you are alone, trying to find meaning in all that is going on with your daily life, with political life, with the mess of the news that you hear day to day. Whilst our country navigates its way through uncertainty, so often we are doing so in our personal lives as well.

Christmas is about remembering, above all, that God came and comes to be with us. Jesus is not a remote historical figure from Nazareth. He, above all psychologists that present on the television, gave us a way to seek a heavenly perspective on day to day living and he made it abundantly clear that God does not sit in a high or holy place waiting for us to attend. God is with us in the nitty gritty stuff, helping us to keep a perspective on things that matter (people, family, caring, health, wellbeing and love) and helping us to let go of the things that don't—particularly nonsensical commercial expectations of Christmas!

God is with us in both the sacred and the secular. The messy birth in a barn during a time when Herod was committing genocide amidst his own people is a testimony to the fact that God felt he had to do something to prove that when God asked his prophets to proclaim: He is "Immanuel" (God with us). He meant it. The birth of this child, comes to us again each year, renewing our hope, re-inspiring our witness, reinvigorating and restoring our belief that the sacred is right here. God is right here in the day to day.

### Armistice 100 A Nation's Thank You

'A Nation's Thank You' was part of a programme of events to mark the centenary of the First World War. 10,000 people walked in a procession past the Cenotaph at Whitehall, after the main parade, to remember and pay their respects.

Having been fortunate in getting tickets for myself and our daughter, Emma, in the ballot, I approached Easter Smart and asked her about laying a wreath on behalf of the Kirk. I was delighted to receive a positive reply. The Lady Haig Poppy Factory in Edinburgh hold a huge range of designs for wreaths, and I discovered they already had a Currie Kirk logo stored.

The event itself was a hugely positive experience. On Sunday 11th, Emma and I reported as instructed for security checks and allocation to one of several 'columns' into which the procession was grouped, waiting on The Mall while the main parade took place. The wait passed easily due to excellent weather, great facilities for the participants (including coffee and muffins!) and interesting chats. We met a lady wearing the medals and carrying some original photos of her grandfather, who had served on the Western Front; a couple who had family medals from the Second World War; and even the grandson of First World War Victoria Cross winner and medical officer Harold Ackroyd. There were ex



-forces people among the crowd, and representatives from schools, the Coastguard and the Police and a few others wearing kilts too.

While we were waiting, we took part in the short service which was conducted at theCenotaph. Being part of a crowd of 10,000 people singing 'Oh God, Our Help in Ages Past' and the National Anthem, and reciting The Lord's Prayer, was moving. Later, we were still waiting while some veterans were dispersing. The disabled veterans and Chelsea Pensioners came past and it was wonderful when our participants burst into spontaneous applause.

We walked out through Admiralty Arch and down onto Whitehall, to process past the Cenotaph. As we approached the Cenotaph, we handed our Currie Kirk wreath to some Scouts, who laid it carefully by the memorial. We dispersed onto Birdcage Walk, and headed to King's Cross for our journey home.

A fantastic experience was made all the more special by representing our local community, and helping to make connections between people in Currie and the main national event in London. We were glad to participate, and honoured to be able to represent the Kirk.

#### Praise Evening for Jak's Den Charity

n the 6<sup>th</sup> October we enjoyed an evening of Praise in the Gibson Craig Hall under the guidance of Stuart McGowan, whom many of you will know from his BB days in the 65<sup>th</sup>. Many of the old tried and tested favourites were sung along with some new ones from the 20<sup>th</sup> century—perhaps next year we might even tackle some from the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

A collection was taken for the Children's Cancer Charity Jak's Den, based in Livingston and the sum of £230 was raised. Allison Barr, Chief Executive, Team Jak Foundation, wrote expressing her thanks for our kind donation and enclosed a Poster of their thanks.

We remember in our prayers those who have been unable to attend due to illness and wish them all a speedy recovery.



Smiles Foundation began working against poverty there 20 years ago. The Foundation is a Christian Charity with projects throughout North West Romania. He has been working in Oradea and the surrounding Bihor County to help to support families, children, the elderly and homeless who are in desperate need of a helping hand.

From the cornerstone of the Family Care Project,



"Smiles" currently supports nearly 200 families on a monthly basis with food packages, medication and social assistance, and has reached out to many special communities.

A Hands On Mission Experience with Smiles is a great and simple way to organise a short term mission trip to eastern Europe. Luke encouraged the Kirk members to get involved. Around 10 mission trips are arranged each year to join as an individual, family or church group. Special trips can be arranged for Church and Educational Challenges and School Groups for Educational Experiences. He encourages youth groups to get involved and also encourages anyone, no matter their age, if they have a skill, to give consideration to joining him in Romania.



### The Good Book Group



**T** he Sealwoman's Gift by Sally Magnusson was our October read. I'll be totally honest—a book based on 17<sup>th</sup> century Icelandic tales, was not one that I would normally read, but that's one of the great things about a book group—it really encourages you to read books you might ordinarily have passed by. This was definitely the case for me with "The Sealwoman's Gift".

This novel is a fantastic mix of real events and saga. The book is based on, what to me was a completely unknown piece of 17th Century history, when Barbary pirates from the Mediterranean plundered coastal areas around northern Europe taking and enslaving inhabitants in places like Algiers and Tunis in northern Africa.

One major source of information for the book was the writings of Olefur Egillson, a Lutheran pastor who was taken in 1627 and who returned the following year to try to raise a ransom from the king of Denmark to release his compatriots. The novel itself centres on Olefur's wife Asta, whose story has been imagined by Sally Magnusson. The story raises important questions about the effects of exile, especially when it concerns the weakening of the faith you were born with and living with a different culture.

We felt the book was incredibly well written. The characters are complex and credible. The descriptions of life in the bleak, but beautiful landscape of Iceland, compared with the comparative luxury and warmth of Algiers makes the novel compelling. A winner for our group, scoring 7.75/10.

Our November read is The Widow's Watcher by Eliza Maxwell. It's a 'free read' for December, with our next meeting on Monday 7 January in Gibson Craig. (7 for 7.30pm).
