A Message from the Manse



Dear Friends

hen I found out that I was headed to Rome, I had few expectations! Wow, the place is somewhere to put on your list if you have not 'done' Rome already.

Darren and I arrived at the hotel and popped up to the roof terrace with views over the



rooftops of Rome on our first day. That evening we walked into the Basilica of Santa Maria Magiorre, then wound our way to the famous Piazza del Popolo and back to the hotel via the beautiful Spanish Steps below the church of the Trinita Dei Monti. . . where we strangely arrived at the top to walk down the steps to the floodlit water fountain in the Piazza de Spagna below. The next day we saw the Michelanglo's statue of Moses and then the architectural phenomenon of the Colosseum, and the ancient Palatino hill with all the very real ruins of ancient Roman temples!

It was so lovely to walk in this beautiful city and in the footsteps of history. Our tour guides helped us to imagine the times of before Christ when Roman Emperors considered themselves to be gods. We were able to sense how Emperors like Caligula and Nero lived and also looked down upon the Circo Massimo (Circus Maximus) where they persecuted the early Christians who did not worship their egos in the first and second centuries.

We saw the Arch of the Emperor Constantine. Unlike the brutal emperors before him, Constantine thought that Christians were decent. Christians were often good public servants who were loyal and faithful. (They did not steal or cheat, were kind to slaves and not after their own gain.) Emperor Constantine legalised Christianity in 312 AD and the Christians were no longer fodder for the lions, nor the victims of more crucifixions!

I could fill a year's worth of Kirk News with our three-day trip. Rome has so much extravagant art and beauty. Every building, church, statue, piazza, tells a story of its time or period. Dotted around the city are many obelisks from ancient Egypt too. So as well as

having a sense of life (long long before) Jesus came into the world, there is also so much to learn from the buildings and art from the times after he had come to be part of our life in the world.

The greatest surprise was the Vatican. The Pope at some point seemed to assume the power of an Emperor, deeming him someone who was to be worshipped as divine. There was often conflict between Emperor and Pope. If you go into the Vatican, you will not only see the gorgeous art from the Christian Catholic faith. Many ancient

treasures, priceless artefacts from all over the ancient Roman Empire now belong to the 'nation state' called the Vatican. You will see statues of the gods Apollo, Zeus, Bacchus, Diana, etc. You see busts of Caesar and Hadrian as well as tapestries and maps of the Empire as it was known then. My favourite of the treasures was Emperor Nero's giant bath made out of very expensive marble from Egypt. In those days that marble was worth more than gold!

Whilst I do not understand how all these riches ended up in the Vatican, I am glad they are being kept, curated and cared for. And of course, we threw our coins into the Trevi Fountain one evening. (Picture top right) So I hope to go back one day and see a little more.

he book that we read for April was 'One Enchanted Evening' by Anton du Beke. As a much loved ballroom dancer on Strictly Come Dancing we did wonder how good he was going to be at writing but he didn't disappoint.

Just like its name, it was an enchanting story, one that made you look forward to curling up on your sofa with a glass of wine or a cup of tea to read it. It is set over a six month period in 1936 and it

follows the fortunes of a ballroom star, Raymond de Guise, who rules the dance floor at London's Buckingham Hotel and also the new chambermaid, Nancy Nettleton. As preparations for the grand New Year's Masquerade Ball take place, there is alongside it a swell of anti-Semitic and fascist sympathisers who collide with devastating consequences for Raymond de Guise.

You can picture Anton as the main character, as he charms his way around the dance floor. It's not just about the dancing though. It is also about the guests and those who work in the hotel. There are many secrets. Anton invites you into his world of dancing and you can imagine yourself there. We did have one doubt about the story and that was if it would have snowed that badly in 1936.

Good first novel—hope there are more. We all liked it and gave it a score of 7.6 out of 10.

The book for June is 'Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine' by Gail Honeyman.

Annual Accounts for the Year ended 31 December 2018 and Budget for 2019

The following pages show the General Fund income and expenditure of Currie Kirk for the past year and the budget for the current year.

Before commenting on the Accounts and Budget I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their continued financial support.

Accounts 2018

Income

The overall income in 2018 was £3776 (2%) lower than in 2017.

The key factors to this were:

- Donation income showed a reduction of £3963 (3.3%).
- Income from Charitable Activities (ie weddings, funerals, hall lets) showed an increase of £303 (0.9%).
- Gift Aid Tax Refunds showed a reduction of £1900 (7%).
- Other income of £7334 (including a small legacy, Christmas Fayre monies and a gift donation) were 158% greater than in 2017.

Expenditure

The overall expenditure was £6876 higher than in 2017 (3.6%). The major factor in this were the salaries, with 2018 being the first full year with the Youth & Families Worker and the new Gibson Craig Halls Caretaker.

In 2018, after the usual two instalments of the Church of Scotland Loan were paid, it was decided to pay off the remainder of this loan in full. This was done using what was left in the Kirk Development Fund and a further £3655 from the General Fund. This action saved interest charges of £2282.

The outcome of all of the above left a balance, as at 31st December 2018, in the General Fund of £44720, with all creditors accounted for.

Budget 2019

The budget for 2019 forecasts a 2.8% reduction in donation income from 2018. This significantly lower reduction is a response to the lesser decline of the regular giving in 2018, which was only 1.1% lower than in 2017.

The budgeted expenditure for 2019 forecasts a reduction of 4.7%, which is mostly due to the Church of Scotland Loan having been paid off in full in November 2018.

Areas of increased spending in 2019 will be:

- The Ministries & Mission payments to the Church of Scotland (+3.1%).
- Salaries—apart from the usual increases due to rises in the national living wage and the relevant salary scales the new church administrator is now in place.

The above means that 2019 is likely to end with another shortfall.

It is hoped that the budgeted income will be exceeded and that the actual expenditure may work out at a lower level than forecast to minimise the effect this will have in reducing the financial reserves.
