Currie Kirk—The 'LOOP' System

any of the congregation who wear hearing aids have been experiencing erratic and intermittent hearing loss issues with the LOOP system installed in the Kirk. The LOOP system which was installed in the 1980's was integrated into the new Audio Visual (AV) System four years ago and by and large has worked consistently over that period.

At present, it is not consistent. The original company who installed the new AV system made some minor adjustments to the LOOP part about a month ago, but this has sadly not worked. Consequently, I have actioned an independent review of the LOOP system by another company and this is in progress.

It's been a very frustrating time for all but if I could encourage you to be patient for a wee bit longer, then this would be greatly appreciated.

When I have more information I will of course advise you.

A Message from the Manse

Dear Friends

n the 21st of June, during the Summer Solstice, the longest day of the year in the Northern Hemisphere, thousands of folk made a pilgrimage to Stonehenge to watch the sunrise. No one has ever fully understood why the stones were erected at Stonehenge but the accepted theory is that the stones were erected to mark the position of the sunset during the winter solstice and the sunrise for the summer solstice—the longest and shortest days of the year.

It is incredible that over three thousand years ago, people wanted to make some record of the rhythms of the sun and the movements of the cosmos.

Even when humanity could only conceive of a flat earth, we were mesmerised by the meaning and the beauty of the created world upon which we live within the vastness of stars and space and a sun that rises and sets and a moon that moves predictably and meaningfully through monthly phases that influence the earth and its tides.

The Psalmist recorded in Psalm 8

When I look at the sky, which you have made, at the moon and the stars, which you set in their places what are human beings, that you think of them; mere mortals, that you care for them?

Care Van.

s many of you know members of Currie Kirk volunteer once a month go out with the Care Van handing out soup and rolls, coffee and biscuits to the homeless in Edinburgh. We also hand out clothes and are always desperate for men's jeans and jackets, sleeping bags and blankets—if you're having a clear out

please consider handing on any of the above items to myself, Gordon Clephane or the Gibson Craig Hall. I'm delighted to report that there is now a new Care Van! All very modern and well equipped for the purpose (as long as the doors are well shut so the soup flasks don't roll along the floor)!

Currie Kirk had a team out in June—whilst we were serving soup at Waverley Bridge, I met someone I worked with over 30 years ago who is now classed as homeless. He admitted to having some mental health problems and was living in temporary accommodation in Leith until he got himself sorted out. When I mentioned I thought I recognised him he knew me instantly and remembered all the colleagues we had worked with at that time. He had married, moved away, left his wife and then returned to Edinburgh without a job or a home. Sadly his wife is an alcoholic and continuing to drink. It certainly brought back a lot of memories from the early 1980s and I was pleased to be able to share these with him. On the same night I managed to speak to one of the regulars and asked him about another regular who always turned up at the Care Van and at the night shelter, always neatly turned out and clean. He had been in hospital with a serious illness and was then persuaded to go and live with his son and family in Edinburgh. Tuesday night brought home yet again that homelessness can strike at any time but also that we can support even in such a small way. The people we serve and talk to were certainly in my prayers on Tuesday night.

This year I am taking part in the Edinburgh Kiltwalk (24 miles) on Sunday 15 September in aid of Bethany Christian Trust. If you'd like to sponsor me please get in touch. £3 helps provide 3

homeless people with a packed lunch, a hot drink and advice from the Care Van; £15 helps provide support and accommodation for a young person who may otherwise be homeless.

Edinburgh –New Appeal

Direct Aid Any of you will remember the knitted hats and clothes delivered back in 2018 to the Syrian Refugees in Arsal, Lebanon. Currently the situation is quite desperate with the Lebanese Government putting pressure on the refugees to rebuild their shelters in an unrealistic timescale, else return to Syria. Below is some information on the situation there and if you would like to help, please donate as directed.

In 2013-14 some 100,000 men, women and children poured across the nearby Syrian border into the small town of Arsal in Lebanon. They were escaping the indiscriminate shooting & barrel bombs that were destroying their homes in Syria. Now they were 'refugees'. The UNHCR & other agencies supplied tents to provide them with basic shelter from the elements.

By using their savings or small amounts of money earned from odd jobs and work in the fields, many refugees were able to improve their tents, building partition walls of blocks to separate off kitchen and washing areas, sometimes adding an extra partition or room. And if possible outer walls and solid roofs were added to protect them from Arsal's extreme climate—heavy snow in winter and searing heat in summer. A shelter shared by families of 6 to 10 adults and children is always going to be cramped and uncomfortable; but still many were able to create something like a home. Until now.

The Lebanese government has decreed that block walls in refugee shelters must not exceed 1 meter in height. This is justified "on security grounds": official statements say that with higher walls, tents could become defensible bases for terrorism. This is hardly credible: it is just another ratchet in the pressure which the Lebanese government is putting on the refugees to return to Syria, despite the well-attested prospect of even greater hardship and real danger there.





It is estimated that some 15,000 children and their families in 4,000 tents or brick shelters, are affected by the ruling. The Lebanese army at first proclaimed Monday 10 June as the deadline for compliance. Terrified that they would be arrested or their tent bulldozed, many refugees started to comply, breaking down the walls which they had struggled so hard to build up, which had given some basic privacy to family members, and, most important of all, some protection from severe winter storms.

The deadline has now been extended to 30 June, to give time for the enormous and painful task of demolishing block-built walls and rebuilding with plastic sheeting and timber and to find means of disposing of the rubble. NGOs at work include Edinburgh Direct Aid, many of whose helpers and friends in Arsal have been directly affected by this. It is taking full responsibility for some of the smaller encampments. If all goes as planned, the cost of its initial commitment will be close on \$10,000. But already the team are coming across many unexpected contingencies—small outlying camps that are not officially registered, and vulnerable individuals such as widows and disabled needing special help. EDA is a small charity already committed to vital projects for the refugees in Arsal. But this work is essential and urgent to ensure these families have some sort of shelter.
