A Message from the Manse

Rejoice always! Pray without ceasing and give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. *1 Thessalonians 5:16-18*

Rev John Combe shared some helpful advice in a sermon. He said, "If you find yourself feeling down, start praising God!" He said "because it's impossible to do the two things at once—feel depressed or down <u>and</u> praise God." What a great thought! When we enter the presence of God, we are reminded immediately of all the good things God does for us and with praise and thanksgiving we can think about blessings rather than burdens.

We Brits like to talk about the weather. There has been lots to discuss from heatwaves and droughts to floods and fires. Extreme weather seems to be just one item in our news that perpetuates fear or negativity. Every day we hear about climate crisis, refugee crisis, healthcare crisis, fuel crisis. It's easy to feel overwhelmed or to get paralysed by doubt or fear. However, when we focus on God instead of the problems, we gain a more heavenly perspective. How often God's prophets and angels, indeed Jesus himself said to people in the tough times, "Do Not be Afraid, or Do not worry!" God our Father knows what we needs and is with us in all things.



This past summer, a tornado ripped through parts of Maryland and my father and his neighbours lost a lot of trees as well as power, telephone, internet and running water for several days. But the neighbours came together for the storm clean up and all of us were able to give grateful thanks that no one lost a life, a limb, a home or a car. The storm could have destroyed so much more. While it is easy to focus on the hard things or the problems Saint Paul reminds us (John Combe too) to rejoice, and give thanks, to praise God in all



circumstances for then we will find that fear or doubt gives way to joy and peace.

The Presbytery Plan

Letter has been received from the Deployment Group (DG) wishing to progress the Presbytery Plan through consultation and discussion. After reflecting on the feedback received and having discussed this matter, the DG would like to meet with a few representatives of each congregation to discuss possible, constructive ways forward. That is, given the geographical and historical connections in this area, what positive ideas might be mooted in order to ensure effective mission in this part of the city? This may include the willingness to pursue something like a Water of Leith entity, as mentioned last time, or other ideas. In doing so, it is important to be aware of the parameters on the resources with which we are working.

As this meeting is being held after the deadline for the Kirk News a full statement on the outcome will be published in the October/November issue.

Holiday Club 2022!



hat a wonderful week! This year's summer holiday club took place outside again in the grounds of Heriot Watt University. We partnered with Juniper Green Parish Church and SU Scotland and over the course of the week we had 40 children join us. Our family picnic on Friday afternoon saw nine families stay to eat, chat and play games. We also launched brand new youth nights for those just finishing P7 up to S6 and we had nine young people come along to those.

Our theme for the week was *Seaside Rock* where our Bible teaching focussed on Peter and his friendship with Jesus. We thought about how Jesus called Peter, taught us how we can build our lives on God, considered some of the miracles Jesus did, why he died on the cross and what it meant when he was resurrected three days later. Each day after the storytelling and teaching, there was an opportunity to explore and respond to a big question in Zones. These were a reflection on the fact that we all learn differently and they provided a chance for children (and adults!) to be still, to chat, to do and to create depending on their own preferences. On Friday we had the question "Who is

Jesus?" Here are some of the thoughts children had:



"He's the lion of Judah and strong like a lion." (see pinecone lion picture!)

"His love spreads out across everyone" (see pinecone heart with love lines radiating out)

"God is powerful"

"The memory verse answers it, now I know! He is the living Rock and the saviour of the world."

"Thank you for bringing me into the world. Thank you for giving us a choice, and letting us give ourselves to him and worship him." (In answer to the question "What would you like to say to God?")



Our week was filled to bursting with things to do! We had games, a theme song, snacks, two birthdays, fun activities and a craft bag to take home each morning. We learnt memory verses, drew pictures and wrote jokes for Postman Pete, said prayers and explored nature. One particular highlight was the Golden Palace drama each day. It followed Phil and Christy as they attempt to build a Golden Palace for Sir Robert McDodgy (top building contractor!), who wants it as a birthday present for the king. They get advice from Postman Pete; try to please Gladys Teatime the building inspector, and in the end discover that they're only really good at building out of Lego! Everyone looked forward to the next instalment and the sound of laughter and heckling that came from the children was wonderful.



The youth nights were just as fun. The young people quickly gelled into one group and we had lots of fun playing games, eating snacks and having a water fight. Each night we read from the Bible about someone who encountered Jesus and how that changed their life. They were all asking for the nights to be longer and asking if we could do more nights! We're hoping to build on the foundations of what we started there and grow the experience into something more regular. Pray for us as we try to do that. My huge thanks go out to the wonderful team, without whom holiday club would not have happened! You made the whole experience fun for the children, shared the love and truth of God with each one and made it a joy to lead. Thank you all. Thank you to everyone who prayed, you also partnered with us throughout the week and I'm delighted to be able to share this small treasure with you of what we saw God do. We are also extremely grateful to the Chaplaincy staff for letting us use their building, the Safeguarding team



for unlocking the doors for us, the Estates team for keeping the grounds clear and safe for us to use, and the wonderful cleaner who was a friendly face each morning and cleaned up after us! Thank you.

Queen's Award for Care Van Volunteers





he Care Van, which serves people experiencing homelessness in Edinburgh, has been announced as a recipient of The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.

On Wednesday 3 August I was privileged to be invited to join other volunteers at the City Chambers to watch the presentation from the Lord Provost to Cameron Black, on behalf of the Care Van.

Described as the MBE equivalent for volunteers, it is the highest award given to local voluntary groups in the UK. The award recognises outstanding service by local volunteers who contribute to their communities and seek to make life better for those around them.

Thanks to the dedication of over 600 volunteers, the Care Van provides essential support on the streets of Edinburgh, racking up more than 11,000 visits a year. A team goes out every evening and five lunchtimes weekly to serve hot drinks, soup and snacks to people facing homelessness. Volunteers are on hand to offer assistance as well as distributing blankets, sleeping bags and warm clothes during harsh weather.
