Dear friends

It's good to be able to write to you this month as a member of the clergy team at Bolton Parish Church, and may I begin by saying thank you to all those who have made me feel so welcome in my new dual role as Assistant Curate here, and as Area Dean of the new Bolton Deanery — and if I haven't met you properly yet, I look forward to doing so soon!

It's a truism in life that we should be careful what we wish for – because it might come true, only not quite as we expected. That's something I've certainly found to be true in my Christian life – from first feeling the prompting to ministry many years ago and praying 'No, Lord! Not me!' to the call to leave my old parish earlier this year to come to this new role here in Bolton, in the midst of this strange, uncertain time of the pandemic and all the upheaval it has brought to our lives.

'Be careful what you wish for,' was exactly what I thought when my family and I moved to Farnworth back at the end of May, when the infection rates were extremely high. The first knock on our new front door wasn't a neighbour or even a postman – it was the army, telling us to go and get tested!

Being careful what we wish for is also a helpful way for us to approach the season of Advent, especially if, like many of us, you find that Advent is all too easily swallowed up into a longer Christmas season for the majority of people these days.

The truth is, though, we miss out if we rush ahead to Christmas and don't take the time of Advent to prepare ourselves. Advent is the beginning of the new Church Year – and, as it marks a new year, it offers an opportunity for new beginnings and resolutions, a time when we are invited to ready ourselves for the coming of Jesus at Christmas. That's why being careful what we wish for – what we

pray for – in this season really matters.

The story of the first Christmas is one full of unexpected answers to prayer, of people for centuries before wishing for things that would eventually come true in ways they would never have expected. Through Advent we have a chance to remember all those who went before in prayerful expectation that one day God would fulfil his promises to his chosen people – from the patriarchs to the prophets and all the way through to John the Baptist. They looked for the Messiah, the Christ, to come – the Saviour and King from the line of David who would save God's people.

That prayer, that wish, came true – only not quite as they expected, with a child born to a lowly, loving mother in the middle and the mess of a stable, because there was no room at the inn, and who would one day die on a cross for the sake of us all.

So as we approach this Advent season, looking towards the joy of Christmas beyond, let's all take the time to be careful what we wish for – praying for our Carol Services and special events in Church to be opportunities for God to do unexpected and amazing things in the hearts and lives of people who don't yet know him, and haven't yet heard the good news of his love for us in Jesus. And let's be open to God surprising <u>us</u> too, and allow him to open our hearts and minds to what he has to say to us for this new Church year ahead and for our own walk with Jesus. And when the time comes, and not before, let us wish for each other and for all humankind a very joyful and peaceful Christmas!

Flower News

On 31st October, a pedestal arrangement was placed in the nave for All Saints. The arrangement included white carnations, chrysanthemum and roses, with molucella and garden foliage. The following week, members of the Royal Artillery attended the morning service to lay a wreath at their memorial plaque. A pedestal arrangement of red carnations, roses, green chrysanthemums and eucalyptus was placed near to the memorial.

For Remembrance Sunday, the pedestal arrangement in red and green with additional poppies, was placed by the war memorial. An arrangement in red, white and blue, was placed in the nave.

A poppy fall was again created using the crafted poppies made by members of the congregation. This year it was displayed from the pulpit.

The final pedestal arrangement before Advent included red carnations and roses, green chrysanthemums, pink alstroemeria and deep pink roses.

The Flower Demonstration given by Paula Routledge on the 20th November, as part of the 150th birthday celebrations, was a wonderful afternoon much enjoyed by those who attended. Paula's arrangements and displays were amazing and inspirational.

With grateful thanks for donations received during November. Plans for Advent and Christmas are now underway and donations towards the cost of flowers for Christmas and the weeks beyond would be gratefully received by Kath, Alison or the wardens.














Advent Book Group 2021

FOLLOW ME Living the Sayings of Jesus

Following the success of our previous reading groups, we are planning to hold a four week Advent book group which, like our recent groups, will be meeting via Zoom. This year's book is Follow Me: Living the Sayings of Jesus by lan ISBN:9781910519448

The bible is full of instructions for how we ought to behave if we want to be a follower of Jesus, but these often seem to belong to a bygone age, far removed from our busy 21st century lives. 'Follow me' helps us uncover how Jesus's words are still relevant. Using true stories to bring us closer to scripture, lan Black draws connections between what Jesus said and how we live today in all its messiness and complexity.

Some thoughts for Advent

Here we are again at the beginning of a new Church Year. Advent has come around again. Advent, a time of preparation, of recollection, a time for thought and a time for reflection.

Advent is also a time of expectancy. The word Advent comes from two Latin words 'ad' meaning 'to' and 'venire' the Latin verb meaning 'to come'. Hence 'to come to' and we are thinking of Jesus coming to us.

We are looking forward to Christmas and remembering the time when, as our collect for Advent Sunday says, Jesus came 'to visit us in great humility'. He came as the One who had been looked forward to for many generations.

We are preparing to celebrate the coming of someone in the past. Preparing to remember one of the greatest happenings in the history of the world, 'The Incarnation', God taking human form and living amongst us.

We are also preparing ourselves and others to accept fully Jesus Christ as our Lord and Saviour, as the old hymn says and I think that this is a lovely Advent prayer for everyone,

'O come to my heart Lord Jesus There is room in my heart for thee.'

We are continually asking God to come into our lives and into our hearts to rule there as King, as each week we say the collect for purity at the beginning of our Communion Service and we ask God to breathe his Holy Spirit into our hearts and our lives, that they may be cleansed and made a suitable place for Christ to dwell, now here in the present.

We are looking forward to a time in the future when God will come to judge the world. Advent is a time when we should think of the end times and of Jesus' promise to come again, to think about the second coming and if it were to come tomorrow are we prepared, are we in a state of grace.

The world, especially in the secular West has decided to forget Advent and to get on with celebrating Christmas, especially this year. It is, however a purple season, not until the Midnight celebration of Communion on Christmas Eve do we change to white.

Advent is a season of watching and waiting, a time to think about Christ in the past, the present and the future, a challenging season, a time to think about the significance of Christ coming to judge and save.

Advent is also a season of hope. The hope of the Kingdom. Hope based on faith and trust in God. If we did not have these then we would not be preparing for Christmas in quite the same way.

So, let us approach Advent as a time of prayer and preparation, getting ready for the coming of the Lord.

There are special days in Advent which help us to prepare. The Sundays are special and many of us will have an Advent Crown or Ring to help us, by focusing on the Old Testament Prophets and Patriarchs, the New Testament Evangelists, St. John the Baptist and the Virgin Mary, the Mother of Our Lord.

There are other special days during Advent to help and remind us of the significance of the season.

December 6th. St. Nicholas

St. Nicholas was a fourth century saint and bishop, famed for his kindness and generosity, for helping the poor and giving gifts to the needy.

O Lord, come to us this Advent and give to us the kindness and generosity shown by St. Nicholas, that we may always care for others as you care for us.

December 8th. The Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary

On this day we remember Mary's own conception by her mother, St. Ann. We remember Mary's own pregnancy, as she patiently awaits the birth of her own Son, Jesus, as she yearns to cradle him in her own arms.

O Lord, like Mary, the Mother of our Lord, we wait for the coming of your Son. May we have patience and generosity of Spirit to care for others as Mary cared for her son Jesus.

December 9th. 11th. and 12th. Ember Days.

Ember Days are days at the beginning of each season for fasting, abstinence and prayer, especially for God's gifts in nature and the care of the environment and of all God's gifts to us.

O Lord, we pray that your gifts may flourish within us, that we may show forth the light of your presence in our lives by in the love and care that we show for others.

December 13th. St. Lucy

St. Lucy was a fourth century Christian martyr. Her name means "light". The most common story told about her is that she secretly brought gifts of food to persecuted Christians living in hiding. She wore a crown of candles, so that her hands were free to carry her gifts.

O Lord, may the Light of Christ shine in our hearts and minds this Advent as we welcome you again into our lives when Christmas comes. We pray that during these uncertain times, we may, like St. Lucy, strive to bring help and hope into the lives of those who troubled and in need.

December 17th. O Sapientia (O Wisdom)

O come, O come O Wisdom from on high To rule our hearts and minds and guide our ways, To lead us on by knowledge of your love, That we may live by love for all our days.

December 18th. O Adonai (O Lord God)

O come, O come to us Lord God of Might, Just as you came to those in ages past. You came to Moses on the mount in fire. O may your power for ever hold us fast.

December 19th. O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse)

O come, O come, O Root of Jesse come To be a sign to rulers and to kings. A sign to all the nations of the earth, That you are Sovereign Ruler of all things.

December 20th. O Clavis David (O Key of David)

O come, O come, O Key of David come And open up the door of every heart, The spirit and the life of every soul And cause your loving rule to come and start

December 21st. O Oriens (O Morning Star)

O come, O come and shine O Morning Star. Eternal Son of righteousness and light. Enlighten all who dwell in depths of dark, That we may live and walk within your sight.

December 22nd. O Rex Gentium (O King of Nations)

O come, O come, O King of all the earth.

O Cornerstone, O come without delay.

O come to us and save the human race.

December 23rd. O Emmanuel (O God with us)

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

The Last Word Canon John Walsh O.B.E.

Do you come from Bolton?

I am unquestionably a true son of Bolton. Born at Townleys, Bolton is my home town.

What will you be doing on Monday?

No two Mondays are alike. On the first Monday of the month I chair the Diocesan Advisory Committee for the Care of Churches, the DAC. We are in effect the planning authority for all the churches in the Diocese and no two meetings are alike. Another Monday of the month normally I attend the Council's Cabinet meeting.



How long have you been coming to Bolton Parish Church?

It is well over 50 years ago that I first attended services at Bolton Parish Church but we have only really worshipped at BPC on a regular basis for the past 25 years.

What first brought you to Bolton Parish Church?

I was brought up at St George's, encouraged by the parents I attended Church and Sunday School each week.

When the United Benefice was created in the early 1970's joint services at Bolton Parish Church became the pattern of worship. As regular services at St George's reduced in number I attended BPC more often, such as at evensong.

What's your favourite piece of music?

Without doubt it has to be a quintessential piece of English Music and that would have to be Nimrod.

What book(s) are you reading at the moment?

I am not a great reader of fiction, perhaps because of the large number of papers for the various meetings I attend. I do, however, love first editions and have a collection, mainly volumes like James Scholes 'History of Bolton' or Edward Baines 'Lancashire'. I frequently dip into these and other similar books to refresh my local knowledge.

I am, however, currently reading a fascinating book by Ian Robinson titled 'The Town that Vanished - The Rise and Fall of Lancashire's Biggest Mill Town'. It brings back so may recollections of the Bolton of my early years including reminiscences of the Burnden Park I knew so well.

What's your favourite hymn?

Again going back to my upbringing at St George's on the Sunday nearest St George's Day and on Sermons Sunday one hymn was always sung, 'Blessed city, heavenly Salem'. In particular part two, with the opening verse 'Christ is made the sure foundation', has real resonance.

Who inspires you? Why?

At each stage of life different influences have encouraged and inspired. My parents often told me that when we walked past Bolton School when I was only 5 or 6 years old I declared my intention to "go there". They gave me every encouragement to ensure I did.

At School the then Head F. R. Poskitt was both an imposing and inspirational figure. Later at St George's I was inspired to a career in accountancy and more by an old friend known to some at BPC as a bellringer, Harold Owen. There I also was inspired into local politics by a then Councillor Brian Allanson who remained a guide and mentor for many years.

Nationally, it would have to be Margaret Thatcher, whose premiership led to me being a parliamentary candidate in 1983.

Above all these, for almost 50 years my wife Christine has both attempted to keep my feet on the ground and has proved an enormous support in driving me to much of what I have achieved.

Who have been the key people in your past who have encouraged your journey of faith?

Without question, my early faith journey was directed by Rev James Henderson who, as Vicar of St George's, involved me as a server and prepared me for confirmation.

When St George's closed for worship in 1975, my faith was severely tested and it was the then recently inducted vicar of St Bede's, Rev John Smith, who as a curate at Christ Church had frequently conducted services at St George's. John actually conducted our wedding in 1977 and we remain in contact despite him, as he frequently reminds me, being a Nottingham Forest supporter.

Is there a passage of scripture or liturgy which you keep coming back to, which grabs you, or encourages you?

It would have to be either the words of psalm 15, Lord who shall dwell in thy tabernacle, or the collect for the Sunday before Advent, Stir up, we beseech thee O Lord.

If you could visit any place in the world, where would that be?

Neither Christine nor I have a great desire for international travel, preferring to explore the United Kingdom, in particular Scotland which we have visited for more than 40 years.

We particularly enjoy the area around Brora, a small village about 60 miles north of Inverness. We have visited Brora so often I know the exact mileage from home to the cottage we take.
