

Dear friends,

I'm quickly realising that one of the features of getting older is the increased frequency of medical appointments appearing in my diary. Thankfully, my health is very good but I've got to the age where the NHS offers several regular checks or screening programmes to detect possibilities of serious illnesses. I always knew that living within walking distance of the Royal Bolton Hospital would have its advantages! Like many others, I have very good reason to be thankful to the NHS for these and for so many other services that are offered to us, free at the point of delivery.

It's 74 years since, Nye Bevan inaugurated the National Health Service with a speech at the then Park Hospital, now Trafford General, only a few miles away from Bolton. Neither Bevan nor anyone else at the time could have foreseen the giant leaps forward which were to take place over the years in the world of health care. Transplants of almost every organ in the body, micro surgery and development of a range of medications, to name but a few were, in 1948, still in the future.

If Bevan were alive today, there is much in all facets of the NHS that he would not recognise. What I hope he would see is a service that is committed to the principles that he and many others held dear when the NHS was born. We are often told that the NHS cannot cope, that it is creaking under the strain and that resources are unacceptably scarce. Sadly, there is evidence that these and other complaints are true from time to time, but with a UK population in excess of 65 million, with average life expectancy rising and with inflation

at a 40-year high, surely we should marvel at what the NHS is able to achieve with its resources rather than bemoan that which it can't.

I was struck by these figures recently:

In the financial year 2020-21

- The Department of Health and Social Care spent £192 billion
- The NHS employed 1.2 million full time equivalent staff
- The average visit to A&E cost between £77 and £359
- The average ambulance call out cost £292
- The average GP appointment cost £39

It's all too easy to take for granted what is provided for us and be overly critical if it doesn't quite go the way we would like it to go. Next time we feel inclined to follow either of these courses, perhaps we should pause, and instead, offer this prayer: it takes about 25 seconds to pray and is a much better (and briefer) use of our time than that spent complaining.

God of healing and compassion, we thank you for the establishment of the NHS, and for the dedication of all who work in it: give skill, sympathy and resilience to all who care for the sick, and your wisdom to those engaged in medical research. Strengthen all in their vocation through your Spirit, that through their work many will be restored to health and strength; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



Justice for Christ's Sake James Jones. Published by SPCK ISBN number 9780281086252 £12.99

James Jones, until retirement Bishop of Liverpool and formerly Bishop of Hull, writes with compete honesty, gentle reflection and great insight about his ministry seeking to bring justice in what he regularly found to be an unjust and



unequal world. The chapters of this short book are more than anecdotal stories from a retired bishop; they are insights into the life of someone who has sought to be a voice for the poor, the unheard and the unnoticed. For me, the highlight of the book is Bishop James's account of his chairing of the Hillsborough Independent Panel and of what he was able to offer and to learn through that experience. Other topics covered include race, the environment, prison and suffering – all treated with a level of honesty and challenge which left me wanting to read more. Each chapter ends with a transcript of Bishop James's Radio Four 'Thought For The Day' relating to that particular topic.

This book isn't heavy going and isn't long. It can be read in one go or not as you prefer. In my view, it will not fail to leave you moved and challenged.

We had a most enjoyable day meeting up with fellow flower arrangers and discussing flower related matters.....particularly the Jubilee.



#### IMPRESSIVE CONCERT GIVEN BY YOUNG ORGANISTS

On 7<sup>th</sup> June we were treated to a concert given by organ pupils from Bolton School, as part of our annual Tuesday Lunchtime Concert series. Four boys and two girls played an engaging and interesting array of pieces ranging in date from the 17<sup>th</sup> to the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Among the players was our own current Organ Scholar, William Martin.

For many organists, it is necessary to go into schools to attract young people to the organ; having recently retired from thirty-four years of teaching young students of piano and organ at Bolton School (Boys' Division) I have had constant contact with promising young players, some of whom have gone on to achieve great things! The really good news is that Nigel Spooner, my successor in the position of School Organist (who, as a result of reorganisation at Bolton School, teaches organ in both the Boys' and Girls' divisions), keeps a close connection with Bolton Parish Church by his frequent appearances to play for our monthly Choral Evensong (on the fourth Sunday of each month), which is regularly enjoyed by an impressive number from our congregation! Thus, potentially, a goodly supply of young talent should be available for the foreseeable future.

#### A NOTABLE ORGAN CONCERT

On Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> June we are privileged to have one of the country's foremost organists to come and play for us at Bolton Parish Church; Philip Rushforth, Director of Music at Chester Cathedral, will give a concert starting at 11.00 a.m., and preceded as usual with tea, coffee and cakes (available from 10.30 onwards).

Admission is by programme on the door £8 (conc. £6, under 16s and students free).



Philip Rushforth has had a long association with Chester Cathedral, having begun his musical career there as a chorister, then as Organ Scholar, Assistant Director of Music, and now Director of Music.

After graduating from Trinity College, Cambridge, where he was Organ Scholar, he was Assistant Director of Music at Southwell Minster for eight years, before returning to Chester in 2002. He is very active as a recitalist, having played at many churches and concert halls throughout the UK, including Westminster Cathedral, St. Paul's Cathedral, and King's College, Cambridge. This will be his second visit to Bolton Parish Church. His many CD recordings of organ music have received great acclaim from the critics, and his DVD "The Grand Organ of Chester Cathedral" received first-rate reviews in a number of international musical journals.

His programme on the 25<sup>th</sup> will include music by Bach, Purcell, César Franck, as well as more popular works, such as Elgar's "Salut d'Amour", Alfred Hollins's "Song of Sunshine" and the rumbustious Grand Choeur in D by Alexandre Guilmant.

I often feel that it is a shame that more members of the congregation do not take advantage of the wonderful music available at these concerts – for those who perhaps tend to regard the organ as some kind of "hymn-machine", a concert such as this, played by one of the finest players in the land, could be (and indeed I hope, will be) a considerable revelation!

#### The Last Word: Steph Ives

#### Do you come from Bolton?

I was born in Birmingham but moved to Rotherham in South Yorkshire when I was 6 due to my dad getting a new teaching job in Maltby. I crossed the Pennines to Music College at the age of 18 and have never regretted the change of rose colour!



I first moved to Bolton (Farnworth) in 1982, moved away in 1991 with my first husband who was a Methodist minister and back in 2012.

#### What will you be doing on Monday?

I retired from my job as Head of Music at Bolton Boys' Junior School in July 2021 so now my main task on a Monday is the housework and the washing! However, my husband has recently gone down to a 3-day working week at the age of 65 and has Mondays off so you may see us walking along the canal in Adlington or wandering round Rivington. As my middle son is a chef and has Mondays off I am over in Dodworth once a month visiting him. This coming Monday I will be down in Chesterton, Bicester, visiting 2 of my grandchildren who will be on half term holiday.

#### What is/was your job and what attracted you to it?

I left Music College as a member of the BBC Northern Singers which was a fantastic opportunity but not a 'living wage' earner of a job! In 1987 I started teaching individual piano and singing lessons at Bolton School 2 days a week which soon became full time and then in 1994 I was employed as a class teacher teaching music, RE and English. I never wanted to be a teacher (both of my parents were teachers), I wanted to play the viola in a professional orchestra so I sort of 'fell into' the job at Bolton School where I stayed for 34 years! However, since retiring I have thoroughly enjoyed playing in both the Bolton Chamber Orchestra and the Bolton Symphony Orchestra.

#### How long have you been coming to BPC?

I have been a member of the choir at Bolton Parish Church for 8 years having been brought up in the non-conformist tradition, first in the United Reformed Church and then as a Methodist.

#### What or who brought you to BPC?

Michael Pain, who was a colleague of mine at Bolton School for many, many years, asked me to join the choir when I first moved back to Bolton. #### What is your favourite hymn?

My favourite hymn is Summer Suns are Glowing Over Land and Sea. I remember singing it as a child and love both the words and the tune. It appears to have gone out of fashion these days but I still love it.

#### Who have been the key people in your past who have encouraged your journey of faith?

My parents always went to church and so I have attended since being a small child. Mum was always very involved in the United Reformed Church, singing in the choir, becoming an Elder and at one time taking on the role of Treasurer. Dad was organist and choir master at Rawmarsh Parish Church and organist at Rotherham Crematorium and my gran was a staunch Methodist (the sherry in the cupboard was for medicinal purposes only!!).

## If you could visit any place in the world where would that be?

I am lucky enough to have travelled widely with my job at the BBC and subsequently with my children. I have sung in Brisbane, Bangkok, Barcelona and Brussels, toured Poland and Hong Kong as well as singing at the London proms on several occasions. As a tourist I have visited New York, Washington, Boston, Orlando and Las Vegas in the USA, many European countries including France, Germany, Austria, Spain, Turkey and Italy and have spent a lot of time in Singapore as my eldest son lived there for 5 years. I would like to visit New Zealand as I am told the scenery is amazing and travelling around the country is easy.
