

THE PARISH LETTER

I write this article just a few days before Ascension Day. Within a week or so following Ascension Day we will be celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

It is, appropriate, therefore, to write a few words to celebrate this occasion as we look back over 70 years of reign and service. The Queen's service to our nation, in state, charity work, diplomacy and Commonwealth support, and by being a fixed point in an ever-changing world, is something it is too easy to overlook or take for granted. This Platinum Jubilee is an opportunity for the nation and the world to say 'thank you' for all she has done and presided over, at home and abroad.

For she has not only held the titles of Defender of the Faith and Supreme Governor of the Church of England: it is clear that she has taken her sovereignty as a vocation – a calling to serve and lead.

She has spoken to the world of faith every Christmas, and, uniquely at Easter during the pandemic, with well-chosen, caring and insightful words of comfort, joy and encouragement, grounded in her faith of Jesus Christ. Queen Elizabeth is a remarkable woman of faith, an example to so many, whose service and commitment is worthy of great celebration and thanksgiving. The Queen's faith is grounded in Jesus Christ.

As you read this article, we will be moving towards Trinity Sunday, and the



longest season in the church's year.

As I was completing the Course in Christian Studies last year, I was made aware of an icon by Andrei Rublev, and I would like to share some thoughts with you about this icon. A copy of it is included below. The most enduring image of the Trinity is surely the icon written by Andrei Rublev, in which he interprets the Trinity as the three mysterious visitors to Abraham and Sarah described in Genesis 18.



The three visitors in this icon are depicted as angels, signifying they belong to heaven rather than earth. They are sitting around three sides of a table. Their faces are essentially identical, representing the equality of the three persons of the Holy Trinity. Rublev presents them as gender neutral – and if you look, you will see faces and hair that could be considered feminine, and yet bodies, hands and feet that are distinctly masculine – a mix that comes across as beautiful and otherworldly rather than strange or disjointed.

The angel on the left (Father/Creator) is wearing a cloak of an indefinite hue, pale pink with brown and blue-green highlights, symbolic of the impossibility of portraying God in visible form. Above this angel is a building, symbolic of the Church and worship of God.

The angel in the centre (Son/Redeemer) is wearing a dark reddish-purple tunic and a dark blue cloak, which are the customary garments for Christ in most icons. The colour of the tunic is symbolic of Christ's human blood and his royal status. The blue signifies the mystery of his divine nature. Above



this angel is a tree, the Oak of Mamre mentioned in the Genesis account of the three visitors, but also symbolic of Christ's crucifixion and the wood of the cross.

The angel on the right (Holy Spirit/Sustainer) is dressed in a green cloak, traditionally the colour of life and renewal, and a blue tunic of divine mystery. Above this angel is a mountain, symbolic of the spiritual journey or spiritual ascent toward salvation.

On the table, between the figures, is a dish containing the meat Abraham prepared for his guests. It rests at the focus of the circular arrangement of the angels as a symbol of the Eucharist, the continuing renewal of the Covenant between God and humanity.

All in all, it is a beautiful image, one that draws you in whether you know all of those details or not – because you don't have to know all of that to know that the icon is incomplete. There is an open spot at this table, a place for a fourth person to sit down. And we – each of us – are invited to sit there.

God loves us and wants to be in relationship with us. This is what we can take away from reading Genesis chapter 1. The point is not that God created the world, but *why* God created the world. The answer being that God loves humans. This is clear, as we are the only ones out of all of creation that are made in God's image, and we are given stewardship over everything else created. Male and female, we are God's image bearers.

We are icons. And God wants us to sit at the table, to share conversation and a meal, to be a part of the divine love that binds the three-in-one together. Yet just as surely as we are called into relationship with God, we are sent out into the world.

The Gospels tell us that the disciples went to the mountain to which Jesus directed them, and from there they were sent to make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and to teach about God's great commandment to love one another.

Our Queen has embraced this faith during her 70 years reign, and this is our call too. It is not enough for us to only take our seat at the table. We must go forth and keep the promises made in baptism, and in so doing transform the world.

May we always answer the call both to sit at the table and go forth into the world. And in the words of Paul, "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of us." *Alan Marjoram*.

I am most grateful to Alan for coming to my rescue at such short notice and providing this 'Parish Letter', when Asa was signed off sick. Ed.



REPORT FROM THE APCM HELD ON MONDAY 16 MAY 2022

The meeting was made up of two parts: firstly to elect two Churchwardens for the coming year and the second part to elect members to the Parochial Church Council and to receive reports relative to our church. Twenty five people were present for the meeting, fifteen apologies were received where was everyone else??

Colin Brown and Dennis Johnson were elected (unopposed) as Churchwardens to serve for one year.

Stuart Pegler was elected to the PCC for three years; Elaine Brown and Peter Clark were elected to stand for one year (all unopposed). We are now a PCC at full capacity! Please remember that the PCC is here to serve YOU. If you have any issues or things you would like discussed by the PCC, please do let the wardens or me know.

Reports were presented in a book; these related to the church finances, the fabric of the church, the Deanery Synod, All Saints School and The Annual Report of the Parochial Church Council

A short meeting of the PCC took place immediately following the APCM when the officers of the PCC were elected and the committees formed. The committees meet as and when required and report back to the PCC. The exception to that is the Standing Committee which can conduct business on behalf of the PCC when there is not a meeting scheduled to take place.

Please pray for your PCC as we start this new year and for the decisions that will need to be taken.

Diocesan Announcement

At the 9:30 service on Sunday 23rd May the Archdeacon, Elizabeth Snowden, was in the congregation and at the end of the service made the surprise announcement that Revd Asa Humphries had resigned from his post as Priest in Charge of the Benefice of Heybridge with Langford and All Saints Maldon,

This means that we will be again in 'Vacancy' (Interregnum) and await further news from the Diocese as to where we go from here.

The situation regarding Jorden Palmer, who will be moving into the Vicarage with his family this month, and was to become a curate under Asa's guidance, is also not clear at this time.

In view of this sad situation, we need to pray for a positive resolution.



The Free Will Offering Envelope Scheme

The Free Will Offering Envelope Scheme has been very successful since its introduction many years ago and we are extremely grateful to the members for their generous and considerable donations to All Saints.

However, as many parishioners have moved to direct bank payments, the scheme is becoming relatively costly (circa £150pa) and cumbersome to administer, for the remaining members. Currently less than 20% of the pre numbered envelopes are used.

We would therefore like to encourage any of you to consider switching to a direct monthly bank transfer for which the Treasurer (Eddie) or Recorder (Mike) would be most willing to advise or help set up. Similarly, if you are concerned that you might in future have to reduce or stop these payments, we could help you achieve this very quickly.

We appreciate that this might not be appropriate for all of you and so can gladly continue with the Brown Envelope Scheme if needed, but with a reduced and renumbered system for 2023.

Some Thoughts

The Ukraine still dominates most of our thoughts and I think I would like to start by thanking Julie Ovenden for her great efforts to help support the people of Ukraine. Along with her band of helpers Julie has now successfully organised and sent off the second batch of food and medical aid to help alleviate some of the suffering being experienced by the people living in that very unfortunate country. Additionally, money has been donated through our church and this has also been sent to the appropriate organisations. Thanks Julie.

Still on Ukraine, I have heard of a very unfortunate incident occasioned by the war. One of my old friends who lives in Norwich has a wife who is Russian. My friend and his wife



also have her elderly mother living with them and she is Ukrainian, the daughter having been the result of her mother living in Russia when younger. The problem for my friend, who has satellite Television beamed in from Russia for his wife, is that the two women support different sides and most fervently so. The wife watches Russian State television and believes every word that the Kremlin puts out whilst her mother watches British TV and naturally supports her homeland of Ukraine. It seems that the two women argue incessantly about the fighting and at times want to hit each other. This is obviously a difficult time for all of them so my friend has banned any news broadcasts and forbidden (as much as he dare) the two women to discuss the matter in the house. Just a sad side issue of this terrible conflict for a mother and daughter to be at each other's throats!

We were in church on 15th May when Father John held the service and gave a very interesting sermon regarding some contentious issues. He firstly spoke about the issues concerning women priests and how, within the Anglican church, arguments still persist on whether or not women should be allowed to be priests. He then went on to talk about same sex marriage and once again gave, in my opinion, a fair summing up of the situation. On each of these two subjects he gave both sides of the story with sensitivity and clarity and I thought at the time that I had not heard these subjects discussed in church recently and it gave me the incentive to check things out myself when



at home. The third thing John told us about was concerning the early Christian church, where effectively two kinds of Christians appeared, those who were 'Jewish' Christians and those who were 'Gentile' Christians and this could sometimes cause difficulties between the two groups. In each of the three subjects discussed there was conflict, and John made the point that tolerance was needed from each and all of us where others held different opinions and views from our own.

Congratulations to Colchester for gaining City status. Thought to be Britain's oldest recorded Town, I have always thought that Colchester should be a City. It was at one time the Roman Capital in Britain and now rightfully is the home of Essex University. Ten years ago, Essex never had one City but now has three.

To finish, I am sorry to hear that Reverend Asa is unwell, and I think we all wish Asa a speedy recovery and hope that he will soon be restored to full health. Asa, Laura and the children certainly have a place in our hearts and in our prayers until that happens

How to Handle a New Curate. Ten Tips.

- 1. With care! Put yourself in his or her shoes. Only a few days ago Curates were trying on their dog collars for the first time and probably feeling pretty self-conscious. They will be both excited and daunted at the prospect of putting 'Rev' in front of their names.
- 2. With respect. The new curate has been trained and set apart by ordination as a minister in the Church of God. If it's the Church of England, the first year will be spent as a Deacon; after that, most will be ordained priest.
- 3. With prayer. This is the secret ingredient. And the most important. From now on, give your curate a regular mention in your prayers. And tell them you're doing so it will encourage them no end.
- 4. With humanity. Clergy aren't perfect. It's an old joke but a good one, that if you don't like the clergy you've got, remember there's only the laity to pick from. By the way, clergy spouses and children aren't ordained, so don't expect them to be theologians.
- 5. With expectation. As the Curate climbs the pulpit steps, pray that God will take over and speak through him or her. This isn't 'Britain's Got Talent', so you are neither a judge nor a member of an audience. You are a disciple, eager to learn and, with God's help, to change.
- 6. With generosity. Find out if they can afford to make ends meet. As well as covering family and household expenses, they should be buying theological books from time to time. These can be really expensive.
- 7. With understanding. Curates have to continue their studies and that will include participating in diocesan training schemes. If married, they must also spend quality time with their families. They shouldn't be working seven days a week.
- 8. With honesty. If you want to criticise, make sure it's constructive. Don't try to wound or settle scores have something positive to say at the same time.
- 9. With hospitality. Invite them to a meal and while you're at it, invite a non-churchgoing neighbour as well.
- 10. With humour. Enough said!




















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
A short story from the Bible

HOLY DAYS

5th June Day of Pentecost, Whit Sunday

Pentecost took place on the well-established Jewish festival of Firstfruits, which was observed at the beginning of the wheat harvest. It was seven weeks after Easter, or 50 days including Easter.

A feast day to celebrate the country's wheat harvest does not sound exactly world-changing, but that year, it became one of the most important days in world history. For Pentecost was the day that Jesus sent the Holy Spirit – the day the Church was born.

Jesus had told His disciples that something big was going to happen, and that they were to wait for it in Jerusalem, instead of returning to Galilee. Jesus had plans for His disciples, but He knew they could not do the work themselves. They would need His help.

And so, they waited in Jerusalem, praying together with His other followers, for many days. And then on that fateful morning there was suddenly the sound as of a mighty rushing wind. Tongues of flame flickered on their heads, and they began to praise God in many tongues, to the astonishment of those who heard them. The curse of Babel (Genesis 11: 1- 9) was dramatically reversed that morning.

That morning the Holy Spirit came to indwell the disciples and followers of Jesus. The Church was born. The Christians were suddenly full of life and power, utterly different from their former fearful selves. The change in them was permanent.

Peter gave the first ever sermon of the Christian Church that morning, proclaiming Jesus was the Messiah. His boldness in the face of possible death was in marked contrast to the man who had denied Jesus 50 days before. And 3,000 people responded, were converted, and were baptised. How's that for fast church growth!

Of course, Pentecost was not the first time the Holy Spirit had acted in this world. All through the Old Testament there are accounts of how God's Spirit guided people and strengthened them. But now, because of Christ's death and resurrection, He could INDWELL them. From now on, every Christian could have the confidence that Jesus was with them constantly, through the indwelling of His Holy Spirit.

REFLECTED FAITH SERIES: "THE MEANING OF COLOURS — PART 2" By Jo White

Last month we looked at the changing of colours in the church's vestments and altar cloths during March, April and May this year. This month of June sees them changing again, but this time for around 20 weeks.

We start the month still in the season of Easter; strictly speaking, in the time after the Ascension. The first Sunday in June is the feast of Pentecost. This was and remains a Jewish Festival. At the time of Jesus, it was a joyful celebration of the first fruits of the Harvest, which was why all the apostles were gathered together in Jerusalem, as was expected of all Jewish men.

As they gathered following Jesus' Ascension, the Holy Spirit came upon them. This is what Christians celebrate at Pentecost, and therefore the colour is red. The following day the colour changes to green, and remains green until the 30th of October, the Feast of All Saints' which will be white.

This gives us approximately 20 weeks of 'green' with the occasional day in between of white or red to celebrate an apostle, saint or a specific feast day. So the question is 'Why?' Why so long?

This time is often referred to as 'Ordinary' time. So what is 'ordinary' about it? I don't know about your life but mine tends to go along fairly steady with just the odd up or down time. Most of my days are 'ordinary'.

In church lectionary terms this period of 'X Sunday after Pentecost' follows one main gospel's teachings and miracles of Jesus. It's almost like He gathers us together for a summer school and takes us up a mountainside and teaches us there. It's a time for leaning and growth.

This month

Like the green grass feeds the animals, this month spend some time just looking at a patch of grass or the leaves on trees from a distance.

See the different shades and hues and when you next hear the gospel reading imagine sitting under those trees on that grass with Jesus Himself.

This inevitably meant that, within the hour, the entire parish knew of the discovery of what had already been transformed into a priceless pre-Raphaelite treasure. Our churchwarden has yet to learn the fact that if you tell someone something in complete confidence, they assume it means they can only tell one other person at a time.

By evening, mutually opposed camps had already formed. Miss Timmins wanted the treasure to be placed in a side chapel, as a shrine, preferably with candles permanently burning beside it. She envisaged St James the Least of All becoming a place of pilgrimage, and that this yet-to-be revealed cherub may work miracles of healing.
