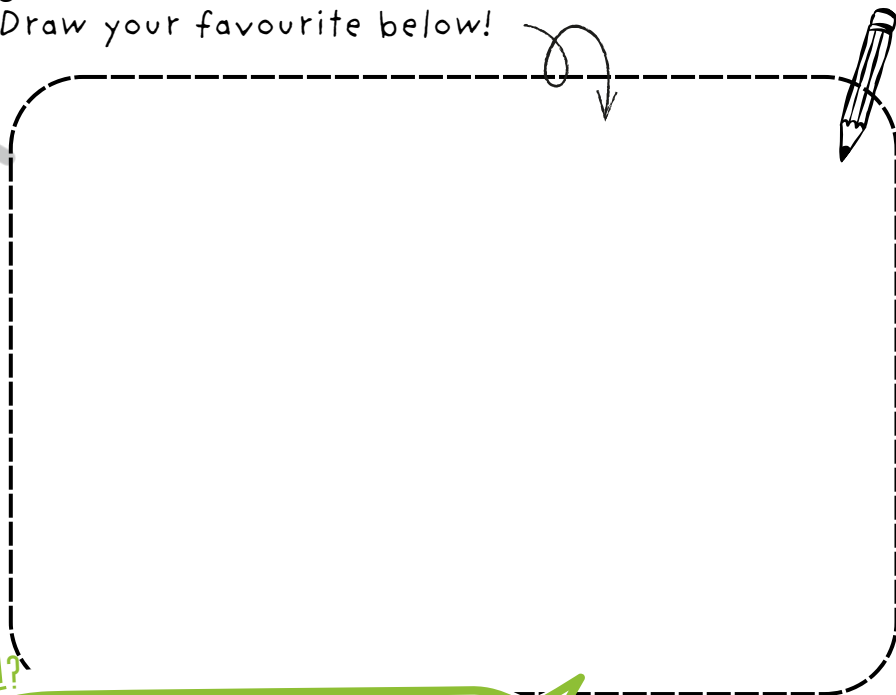

Congratulations! You are now an archaeology and nature expert!

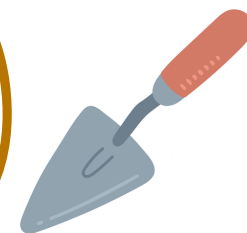


TIME TRAVELLER TRAIL

Explore the archaeology of your churchyard and discover how people have been connected to nature for thousands of years!

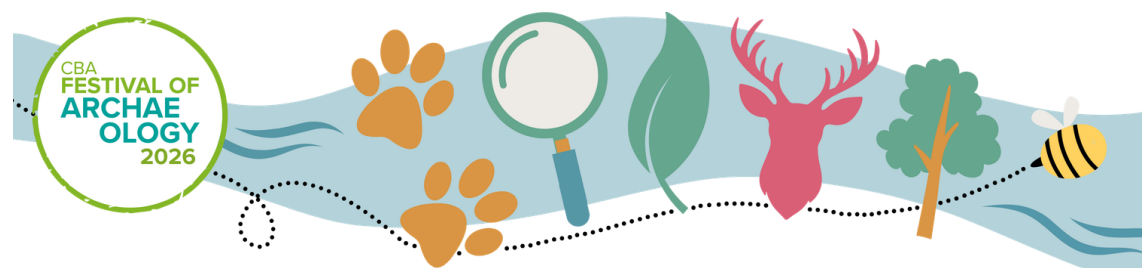
WHAT IS ARCHAEOLOGY?
