HEALTHY COMMUNITIES - meeting social, spiritual and practical needs of those we serve is once again a point of focus for our prayers in September. "Helping and serving lies at the heart of our diocesan purpose to "transform communities". The need is greater than ever, since the health of local communities has been weakened by the pandemic – and is further threatened by the cost of living crisis. Churches, schools, chaplaincies and the cathedral are serving their local communities in a wide variety of imaginative ways – some of which are being supported by Diocesan Mission Fund grants. In partnership with Together for Change, the diocese is also supporting projects in the most deprived parishes. For example: Saints Nuneaton; our Rural Life Officers; youth work initiatives; support for poorer communities with food and fuel poverty; and support for refugees.

Saints Nuneaton / Together For Change

A word from Jet Jones – Director of Regeneration and Community Transformation for the Diocese of Coventry and CEO of Together for Change (TfC):

"I have always loved the passage of scripture in Isaiah 61 v 4 that says, 'They will rebuild the ancient ruins; they will restore the places long devastated; they will renew the ruined cities, the desolations of many generations". This passage speaks of the Israelites, inspired by God to rebuild their homes, after they were taken into captivity and suffered the devastation of war.

Today, many Christians around the globe are inspired to renew and rebuild their communities, as families and businesses still struggle with the cost-of-living crisis, seeking help to renew and rebuild their lives.

While undergoing the building project at Saints Central this year, I have been reflecting on this passage of scripture and have realised the impact that 'rebuilding an ancient ruin' has had on the local community. It has inspired fresh hope, big dreams and creating new opportunities for people to see beyond a broken past into a hopeful future. In March 2025 we were pleased to launch the new 'George Muller Hall' as phase 2 of Saints was successfully completed and a new space for young people, community groups and businesses has emerged in a town that is struggling.

Beyond the restoration of a heritage building, we have seen lives restored and renewed as we have supported our churches and communities, raised funds and provided advice, while enabling grass-roots initiatives to flourish.'

This past year, TfC have witnessed God's provision to support our often overlooked and forgotten communities in our Diocese.

PRAYER JOTTINGS – SEPTEMBER 2025

- 1 When I'm concerned about our world1, how do I pray?
 - As you read the newspaper or hear the daily news on radio or television, does any particular item leap out to you?
 - Perhaps the situation seems simply too big to handle, too remote, too desperate? Yet your heart registers its concern.
 - Try focusing on one real human aspect of the matter, one person's face you have seen on your TV screen, one personal detail, one family in trouble, one city dealing with devastation.
 - Take those images, and your own feelings about them, into the consciousness of God's presence, which is at the heart of prayer.
 - As you draw closer to God, you carry those people and situations to God with you. You are making an invisible lifeline across the world and you may never know the effects.
 - Stop to think: Is there any practical help you can give to bring a little humanity into the situation you are praying for?

2 How might we pray in a deeper way for our communities to be healthier? Dr Anita Phillips writes² about Life Zones – Relationship, Purpose and Legacy. How might these zones look life for goodness and growth in communities?

- RELATIONSHIP: For each member: our relationship with oneself developing stronger self-awareness and self-love. In relationships one with another desire to share good and bad news; feelings of being supported and loved; a willingness to ask for and be asked for help. Relationship with God is characterized by being childlike (1 John 3.1), knowing we are called his friends (John 15.15) and that the Holy Spirit lives in us (John 14.26). Thriving in these areas of relationship is crucial.
- PURPOSE: Each of us is created to live with purpose it is a 'reason why'. It meets a need so often crucial in the lives of individuals and churches; purpose is productive in service, not just for individuals but addressing the question: 'What is my role in the community?'
 Community relationships are varied, and Jesus's purpose was fulfilled in community.... 'Which of my communities am I serving?' Where is this thriving?
- LEGACY: Like fruit trees that take decades to be established 'trees exemplify legacy because trees stand for generations.' Of course, this might be financial, and sharing of resources, above all 'Legacy work is all about love, pure and unconditional pouring love into a future that we may not be present to enjoy.' These three relationships, purpose and legacy grow in 'the garden' planted in the soil of our hearts; the fertility of the ground is determined by faith, hope and love the foundation for emotional well-being.

3 CULTURE TRANSFORMATION IN YOUR CHURCH AND WIDER COMMUNITY

'There is no such thing as a perfect church. But there are healthy churches, unwell churches, toxic churches, and dead churches. However, when you choose to do the hard work of upgrading your church's soil and eagerly partner with God to grow healthy fruit, you will experience for yourselves the joys of a tov³ church', say Scott McKnight & Laura Barringer in 'Pivot' (Tynedale Elevate, 2023).

Character Formation – for individuals and the church are made 'the most important mission of your local church.'

Be patient – Vision faces inevitable resistance. 'Patient transformation agents will need to become expert listeners and constant adjusters.' To form a genuine coalition requires patient vision-casting and constant conversation, from which everyone learns and grows.

Acknowledge pain - It can be exhausting and even agonizing at times. *'Church transformation is painful. It is bittersweet. Yet it is worth it.*

It takes courage — Some of your best friends and biggest supporters will turn on you or at least turn away from the transformation plans. 'Take courage in God's work, in the grace of God, and in the power of the Spirit to bring change. Avoid all temptations to coerce o0thers and instead walk in the will of God and let God do the work.'

Finally, expect surprises! – you have no idea what God might do through your church in your community. Planning is a great idea ... until God introduces a turn and a transformation. Be ready to Pivot.'

4 'Sociability depends to a large extent on CONVERSATION It is a means of consolidation of relationship, not merely the passing of time or communication of information. This conversation implies a mutual presence or hospitality, the giving of time and space to another. In a world devoted to fake news and trivialities, the importance of serious conversation cannot be ignored. Adult dialogue is not only a means of attaining a fuller human maturity but also an essential instrument of evangelization in a pluralistic world.... The main obstacles to fruitful conversation are lack of leisure, overwork, lack of patience, excessive search for entertainment, ambition, and long-lasting animosities based on real or imagined sources of grievance.' Michael Casey 'Coenobium: Reflections on Monastic Community' (2021, Liturgical Press)

³ **Tov stands for 'good' in Hebrew**, and a 'culture of goodness, compassion, and justice within a church, as opposed to toxic or abusive environments – it emphasizes prioritizing being "good" over other metrics like success or power.'
