

# Racial Justice Logo Competition

The diocesan Racial Equality Advisory Group (REAG) and Racial Equality Steering Group (RESG) have announced a competition for school children to produce a logo that promotes racial justice and equality for the groups to use.

Both the REAG and the RESG work strategically to build racial equality and justice throughout the Diocese of Coventry. Both working groups adhere to the goals set out in the report of the Archbishops' Racial Justice Commission entitled From Lament to Action. This includes identifying and removing those processes, attitudes and behaviour which discriminate against members of the global majority based on skin colour, ethnic origin, language, and cultural differences.

The groups are looking for logos that are creative and colourful and in A4 size. Everyone will be a winner as all entrants with complete designs will be featured in the Big Reveal on Racial Justice Sunday 12 February 2023 at Coventry Cathedral. The selection process for the three winning designs (one from three different age categories) will include CofE school staff, a public vote and a panel of artistic judges.

# Prayer Diary

## November 2022

### True Friendship



True friendship is a precious gift from God. We read in Proverbs 'Some friends play at friendship but a true friend sticks closer than one's nearest kin.' (18.24).

Sometimes it takes an upset or affliction in our own lives to discover who our true friends really are. But now think about this amazing truth. God wants to be your friend. Just as Abraham is called 'a friend of God' because he trusted God (James 2.23, 2 Chron.20.7, Is.41.8), so we are invited into that same friendship with God. In the Eastern Church, Jesus is called

*Philanthropos*, the friend of all humankind. But his friendship is not general or amorphous, it is specific and personal. He calls us by name. We know, for example of particular friendships he had with Mary, Martha and Lazarus – whom he describes as 'our friend' (John11.11). Jesus says to his disciples – and that means us, today – 'I no longer call you servants, but friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father' (John15.15).

Jesus invites us to share our lives with him and – amazingly - offers to share his life with us. What might that mean for us? With our closest friends we share the real stuff, our joys and our pains, our hopes and our fears. We cry with them, we laugh with them. We speak to them freely, we listen to them without judging them. We can be who we truly are with them. Whatever we are like, whatever happens, they stick with us. It is into just such a friendship that Jesus invites us, sharing our lives fully with him. But, of course, human friendship is fallible. We let each other down. 'Even my close friend, someone I trusted, one who shared my bread, has turned against me.' Ps.41.9. The friendship of God is something on which we can depend. The more we can dare to trust and obey God, the more we can enter into and enjoy his friendship (John 15.14).

I have been encouraged by the warm responses from clergy, PCCs and lay people when I have visited parishes to discuss the issues around racism and how we can unite in our Christian faith to address the issues of this evil. The church should be a place of unity, love and openness and as we uphold these virtues it can be a starting point to tackle the issues of racism. God's love for us all is expressed in that He sent his only Son to die for all.
