

Prayers for Ukraine across the diocese

At the end of March, Bishop Christopher called on the people of Coventry and Warwickshire to gather in prayer for peace in Ukraine, on Wednesday April 6th at 6.30pm. The Bishop led a prayer gathering at Broadgate in Coventry, whilst other gatherings were held across the diocese.



The prayer gathering at Broadgate attracted quite a crowd of passers-by as children from St Laurence's CofE Primary School read their own prayers and local musicians, including songwriter and broadcaster, Sandra Godley, performed.

Over in Stratford-Upon-Avon, about 60 people gathered on the Bancroft Gardens adjacent to the RSC in to pray, at the same time as the call to prayer was taking place in Coventry. The vigil was led by the vicar of Stratford, the Rev. Patrick Taylor, and included the Coventry Litany of Reconciliation, led by Archdeacon Barry Dugmore.

St Paul's Church in Leamington Spa also gathered to pray. Curate, the Revd Andy Ruffhead said:

"It was a privilege to gather to pray for Ukraine on Wednesday evening, at the same time as churches across the diocese. We prayed publicly in the St Paul's church garden, around a cross which has been mown in the grass. It felt very appropriate to gather around the Cross as we approach Holy Week, standing with the people of Ukraine and crying out to the Lord for peace. We joined with Ukrainian Christians in praying Psalm 31, as well as praying for civilians, soldiers and leaders caught up in the war. We finished with the Coventry Litany of Reconciliation, recognising the need for and power of forgiveness as shown to us by Jesus on the Cross."

Thank you to everyone who joined in with Bishop Christopher's call to prayer. Please continue to pray for peace in Ukraine.



Prayer Diary

May 2022

'For he himself is our peace' (Ephesians 2.14)

St Paul's words are a source of comfort in world where it seems that peace is nowhere to be found. We see the explosion of war in Ukraine, the violent squandering of human life in other parts of the world – including in Armenia, where I paid a recent visit – and we lose faith in our own ability to make peace. But such despair in ourselves can be the beginning of faith in Christ: for he is our peace – this is where peace is to be found.

But how can a single person – even the Son of God – be our peace? How do we locate peace in Jesus? Paul doesn't say that Jesus Christ is merely a 'peaceful' person, or even a person who merely makes us feel at peace. Paul is drawing us into a more profound reality: that the risen Christ holds out the possibility of true peace through our relationship with him. Having conquered death and sin – all that stands between us and God – we find our peace not in someone who was simply fond of speaking about it, or even a kind of non-violent role model, but simply in the fact that there is absolutely nothing which stands between us and him. The risen Christ doesn't merely illustrate peace to us or just inspire us in the ways of peace. Jesus invites us into the full reality of peace.

In accepting this invitation to live in relationship with Christ, our challenge is to look upon all of humankind and see that, likewise, there is nothing between us. Finding our peace in Christ does not mean escaping the world and hiding behind him, but quite the opposite: throwing ourselves into the arms of the other in whom we should have no fear, even reaching out to the enemy. This sounds like a tall order.

But it's as simple as addressing our neighbour with the same immediate familiarity that Jesus used with his friend and follower weeping at the tomb: 'Mary!' (John 10.16). In the peace of the risen Christ, the familiarity and love which we show each other knows no bounds. We rise above labels – we are all on 'first-name terms.' This Eastertide, my prayer is that, as a sign of hope in a bitterly broken world, we would recommit to this culture of true encounter – not only praying for peace, but living it out with each other, as we do in Christ.

St Laurence's CofE Primary School complete Lent challenge

This Lent over 350 pupils from St Laurence's CE Primary school in Coventry took part in a competitive challenge to explore what justice means today.

Thanks to a generous donor, every child in Years 1-6 of the school, which serves the Longford area of Coventry and is part of the Diocesan Multi Academy Trust, were given a copy of the Church of England's Live Lent: Embracing Justice booklet at the beginning of Lent.



Each week during their class assemblies, the children would talk and reflect on the challenges they had taken part in at home, and record how many challenges they had attempted over the last 7 days. In the weekly Collective Worship Assemblies on Wednesday mornings (which have returned to the adjacent St Laurence's Church after a period of online worship during the pandemic) the children explored the different biblical themes of justice in the booklets, based on the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book 2022: Embracing Justice by Isabelle Hamley.

In a special end of term Easter Assembly, which included prayers written by members of the ICONS council for Peace in Ukraine, it was revealed to the whole school community that over the 5 ½ weeks of Lent during the school half term, the total number of challenges completed across the school was 3185! Chocolate prizes were awarded to the top classes in each key stage, with a very close finish in the final days of the challenge.

Two pupils from Year 6 said this about the challenges:

"We personally think the challenges were easy for us. For instance, in Week 3 'Just Relationships', many people may not be comfortable to socialize to people. Justice is not only getting help from others, it is proving you can give, love and show kindness."

Rev Gareth Irvine, Foundation Governor and Vicar at St Laurence's Church said:

"This was a brilliant example of the school and church working together to support children and families in our community explore and live out our values of growing in faith, living in hope, and learning to love. Maybe next year we need to some of the tasks to be even more challenging!"

Revd Claire McArthur joins General Synod

The Revd Claire McArthur, Rector of Stoke St Michael's, Coventry, has joined the House of Clergy of the General Synod following the recent departure of the Revd Stella Bailey who is soon to take up her appointment of Archdeacon of the Gwent Valleys in the Diocese of Monmouth.



Claire was one of the nine clergy candidates who ran in the General Synod elections last autumn. The General Synod rules stipulate that if a vacancy occurs within two years of the election, the votes from the election can be recounted using the Single Transferable Vote system to determine the candidate to fill the vacancy. Following a recount of last October's vote, Claire has been appointed.

Commenting on her appointment Claire says:

"I am delighted to take up the clergy vacancy on General Synod, I wish Stella well as she takes up her new role in Wales. I love ministering within the diversity of the Church of England, but I am aware that there needs to be an honest conversation held at the national level if we are to remain relevant to the communities that we serve. I am passionate about protecting parish ministry and am still in awe and excited that everyone is part of a parish, our national church should be for everyone, regardless of gender, age, disability, tradition, race, socio-economic status or sexuality. I believe that we are all made in God's image and are accepted and loved. We should welcome all. I hope that I will represent my colleagues effectively."
