

St Francis Employability

Throughout the pandemic, St Francis Employability has encouraged good neighbourship within the local community by asking people to look 5 doors down, left, and right, to ensure support reaches those most in need.

The 5 doors down project began in March 2020 as a response to the national lockdown and the evident need for food support within the city. Initially, it started with a team of willing volunteers who were able to create food parcels from donations to provide essential food to the most vulnerable people in the community. As well as food parcels, the team were also able to provide breakfast and lunches on a click and collect basis. Since March the project has grown immensely with St Francis Employability becoming a registered food hub with the Trussell Trust where people can come and fulfil their foodbank vouchers and receive other essential items.



From September 2020 the 'One Stop Social Supermarket' was opened in response to a need for ongoing support for many of the households who used the food hub services. The social supermarket takes food support one step further and looks to address why people are needing help with food. Through the social supermarket, households pay approximately £3.50/week and receive about £20 worth of shopping as well as support in other areas, including support with benefits, debt, housing, CV's, job search, English lessons and much more. The aim of the social supermarket is to move people away from food support and towards independence by helping them overcome their barriers.

As well as providing physical support, St Francis Employability have also acted as covid champions by and creating a covid support line which was used to help people understand symptoms, book tests and vaccines. There were also several workshops based on COVID and the team provided the local community with hygiene packs to support good hygiene.

St Francis Employability have also been able to support the local community with CV writing, Job search, benefit advice, housing support, ESOL lessons, skills training, virtual coffee mornings and much more. Earlier this week we were visited by a local MP who thanked the team of staff and volunteers for all that they have done to support the local community during such difficult times.

Please continue to pray for the work of the St Francis & St Francis Employability, and for the discernment & appointment of their future parish priest this Autumn

September 2021

Hope

September always has a certain air about it for educational professionals. The smell of new stationery, fresh exercise books, and the promise of new students to walk alongside. It is a season of hope. Last September this hope felt dimmed by rising Covid-19 cases. The school year was a recurring cycle of bubbles, distancing, contact tracing and isolation. School teams demonstrated their adaptability, resilience and steely determination to be there for their communities.



There is always, however, a reason for hope. Indeed the Christian story is one of what might seem from the outside a ridiculous hope. Christian belief is centred on a God who becomes incarnate, dwells among us as a human, and is murdered for being "different" and making the powers that be uncomfortable. But he is not defeated by death and rises in his human flesh and takes that fleshliness back into the Godhead. Once again God in three persons, trinity, looks upon the flesh of creation and can say "it is good". We do not have to do anything to earn this – it is a gift once for all. We are not left alone with God the Father and Jesus viewing us from afar, because the third person of the trinity, the Holy Spirit is amongst us, loving us, supporting us, giving us the strength to go on when things seem hopeless, until Jesus comes again to restore all creation back to what God intended it to be.

This hope is what I have returned to again and again throughout the pandemic. Indeed every time I speak to a head teacher or governor about the challenges of school in a pandemic I sense the Holy Spirit saying "It's all good, I've got them".

Since February, the Deanery Leadership Team (DMPC) have been meeting to listen and hear from all the parishes in our deanery. We’ve invited parishes & pioneer churches to join together for our Deanery Learning Community where we have met together (on Zoom so far) to listen to each other, share the opportunity & challenges, hear inspiring stories & theology on leading churches into mission & discipleship, listen to the voice of God and make plans for how we are going to respond.

This integrated, Spirit-led process will continue in September as we begin to share, consult & discern a Deanery Vision for the 2020’s.
