Prayer Diary

May 2021

Election Season

May is the month for elections in the UK and this year we have more than usual.

I have had a long personal connection with this democratic process. The importance of which, and the privilege I enjoy of being able to live in a country with regular free and fair elections, was very much part of my upbringing. Whether this was through delivering elections leaflets for my father, a local councillor for over 25 years or the "rite of passage" symbolised by voting in my first General Election just two weeks after my 18th birthday, or nearly 20 years working as a local government Returning Officer and Acting Parliamentary Returning Officer.



But, despite the fundamental building blocks of a fair and just society that our election processes provide, it is not always that easy to find candidates to stand to serve on the governance bodies and committees that support our democratic institutions.

And, what is true of the nation is also true of the Church. Next month will see the deadline for the close of nominations for the next Diocesan Synod, which will serve the Church in our diocese for the next three years. Elections for Diocesan Synod in July will be followed with further nominations and elections later in the summer for Bishop's Council.

As Christians, God calls us to serve others and through that service honour our Lord, Christ Jesus. The Easter season reminds us of that perfect service shown by Jesus through the cross, *"For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as ransom for many."* Mark 10:45

Service on Diocesan Synod, Bishop's Council or supporting committees, may not be our first choice in Christian service. Maybe it is because this form of service has an unfair reputation for being a bit dull, bureaucratic and tedious, but Jesus never said service was easy.

Maybe it is because we are concerned that if we were to put our name forward it might be perceived by others as arrogant or showing-off, yet Matthew (5:14-15) tells us *"no one lights a lamp and puts it under a bowl; instead he puts it on a lampstand, where it gives light for everyone in the house. In the same way your light must shine before people, so that they may see the good things you do and praise your Father in heaven."* In Peter's letters to the Church in Asia Minor(1Peter4:10) he urges Christians, *"Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms."*

Or, maybe, we find it hard to see in ourselves the true gifts God has given us.

As we journey through this Easter season, a time of rebirth and joy in the resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ, *and elections*, let us pray that God will lead us towards whatever gifts he has given us and support us in using them in the service of others, including through the Diocesan governance structures. It is also a good time to give thanks to God for those who have served us in the Church over the last triennium, to thank them for their time, their wisdom and willingness to make decisions in the furtherance of our Diocesan Mission purpose of *worshipping God, making new disciples and transforming communities*. Is God calling you to join in this work too?

"Serve the Lord with Gladness! Come into his presence with singing" Psalms 100:2

From Lament to Action

The Archbishops' Anti-Racism Taskforce has published its report 'From Lament to Action' proposing a suite of changes to begin bringing about a change of culture in the life of the Church of England.



It issues a warning to the Archbishops that a failure to act could be a "last straw" for many people of UK Minority Ethnic (UKME) or Global Majority Heritage (GMH) backgrounds with "devastating effects" on the future of the Church.

The report sets out 47 specific actions for different arms of the Church of England to implement across five priority areas: participation, governance, training, education and young people.

Without these changes the Church risks denying and disregarding the gifts of a significant part of the nation, the Taskforce makes clear.

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York said in response to the report:

"Racism is a sin. Of this, we have no doubt. Anything which diminishes the value and beauty of each individual person, made in the image of God, is sinful. There is no place for it in the world, and we are determined to make sure there is no room for it in the Church.

But it is here. We have seen, time and time again, people being bullied, overlooked, undermined and excluded from the life of the Church, from the family of God. It breaks our hearts, and we are truly sorry.

We welcome this report from the Anti-Racism Taskforce, which we commissioned last year to help us understand what progress we might have made towards tackling racism in the Church of England."
